#### FROM OUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR

I have three items which may be of interest to residents this month.

Firstly, as part of my committee work at New County Hall, we were asked to make recommendations about the future of the Cornwall Fire & Rescue critical control room which handles all the fire emergency 999 calls in Cornwall. We were asked to consider the potential for cost savings by outsourcing it to a larger service or partnership out of county. Over several months we took in a large amount of evidence from a very wide range of expert witnesses and made visits to our existing control room in Tolvaddon and the one in Exeter that serves the Devon partnership. I was very pleased to support the unanimous decision of the committee to keep this vital service in Cornwall with a recommendation to increase the funding to facilitate a software upgrade and put the staffing on a sustainable level. By the time you read this I am hopeful that our Cabinet will approve these recommendations, securing the future of the Control Centre and its dedicated staff.

Secondly, you may be aware, Armed Forces Day 2023 takes place on 24 June 2023, with the National Event this year being held in Falmouth after Cornwall Council won a competitive bidding process. Although the main weekend will be held in Falmouth, the Council are hosting a series of smaller events throughout Cornwall in the lead up to the day. They are also encouraging communities, towns and parishes to host their own events to celebrate our armed forces, reservists, veterans and cadets and recognise their special contribution to Cornwall. To assist in the running of local events and for details of how to apply for a grant from the Ministry of Defence to help with the costs of staging events such as road closures, insurance, marshalling, security and first aid, please use the link below

Finally, a new fund has been launched for community-based, not-for-profit organisations across Cornwall, particularly those in rural areas and with little or no track record of securing grant funding. The funding will help organisations to get their initial project ideas off the ground by offering grants of £2,000 to £25,000 towards the commissioning of things like feasibility studies, architects' drawings, business plans, concept designs and other technical pieces of work. It could also be used for community consultation programmes which lead to a wider project. By supporting this initial development work, the fund will put community-based organisations in a stronger position to apply for other funding, such as Community Levelling Up, other Good Growth programmes, Lottery or other grant giving bodies. The fund is open to applications until November 2024. Jodi also demonstrated the ingenious devices now available to make visually impaired people's lives easier and give them more independence. After the usual refreshments, chief Joybird, Lynne Beavis congratulated members on the magnificent fundraising effort reported above, and announced that the trip to Pencarrow on April 28<sup>th</sup> to see the bluebells and smell the garlic would go ahead as planned, weather permitting.

#### ST TEATH PARISH COUNCIL

There have been many changes within the Council since our last meeting in February. We have welcomed two new councillors: Jo Fleet and Sam Burton, as well as a new Parish Clerk, Julie Fairman. Julie started with us mid-February, and although she brings a wealth of experience, this is her first post as a Parish Clerk. We are sure all parishioners join us in welcoming Julie, Jo and Sam. It's no secret that we haven't had the easiest of 18 months and there has been a lot of work involved in effectively setting up a new Council, since our Parish split with Delabole. We feel with Julie and a full set of councillors, we are now in the strongest position we have been for a long time and are all looking forward to working together.

At March's meeting there were many items to discuss, the full details of which will be in the minutes of the meeting published on the website and on display on the village notice board located by the school. It was great to see a very good attendance from parishioners too.

There were many issues for us to get on with, but one item we discussed was looking into the options for giving commemorative coins to all the children in the Parish to mark King Charles's Coronation in May. Another important topic of conversation at the meeting was regarding the kissing gates.

It is important to note first of all that as a Parish Council we were not planning to remove the gates. We were merely seeking the opinion of the community. The potential removal of the gates has been brought up on more than one occasion by parishioners who are concerned about road safety. The suggestion is that this path, without gates, could offer a solution to the problem of walking with prams on the main road and negotiating the blind corner on Treroosel road. I'm sure we can all agree that any road safety measures are worth consideration.

With that in mind we decided, prior to looking into whether this would or should be something the Council could do, it would be wise to 'ask the village'. Following the many responses to the Timepiece articles, councillors would like to take this opportunity to thank parishioners for their passionate views on the importance of the kissing gates. It is clear from this village consultation and the mass of feedback we received that their removal is not an option the vast majority of parishioners want us to pursue.

We would also like to stress that as your Parish Council, we are eager to engage with you as much as possible and there could be more instances in the future when we ask for your thoughts on other matters that are important to our community. This will not mean that we have made any decision either way, it will simply be a way of fact finding and getting your valuable feedback, so that we can continue to reflect and act on your views for the benefit of our whole parish.

St Teath Church choir has had a busy few weeks! Along with our weekly services and rehearsals, in



In recognition of a lifetime of service, **Malcolm Nute**, the nonagenarian stalwart who acted as cemetery warden for decades, the **Rev Bryan and Mrs Ede**, each planted a flowering cherry tree. Other honoured guests included **Barbara Richard**, long-time organist, who planted a bush (and thus became St Teath's equivalent of "First Lady"), alongside **Cllr. Kerri Kitto and her nephew, Liam Curnow**, representing St Teath Parish Council, and **Tania Ede**, co-founder of the St Teath Community Gardeners. (See photos below)

This tranquil space has been undergoing something of a makeover in recent times thanks to the significant efforts of volunteers. #### A METHODIST MINISTER'S VIEW

The phrase 'sticking -plaster politics' has been used of our government in recent months as they have struggled to respond to all the issues which have been raised. We have seen too many pictures of the pressures which our hospitals are working under, with ambulances waiting to off-load patients and crowded corridors. Further to this, one T.V. news programme focussed on the state of repairs of some hospital buildings.

The issue of the state of repair of buildings has also been raised by schools, and tenants in some Social Housing situations. The responses to those situations have been very slow on many occasions, partially presumably because of a lack of finance or sufficient employees.

The current issue is, of course, the legislation which has been prepared in response to the refugee situation. This response to me seems to be lacking in compassion, and borders on contravening international agreements on the treatment of refugees and human rights. We should all be concerned about what is being proposed by our political 'servants' on our behalf.

Many of these issues have arisen, it seems to me, because of a lack of foresight, planning and budgeting over the long term. A panel member on a recent edition of 'Question Time' thought that we were the victims of 'short-term' policies and actions by our politicians. Thinking along these lines led me to thinking about God's plan for each one of us, which comes very much into focus as we celebrate the events associated with Easter – the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus. Crucifixion sounds abhorrent to us but in the era when Jesus was on earth some 2,000 years ago it was a frequently used form of punishment. This goes some way to understanding Jesus sacrificing his life for our wrongdoing to enable us all to be able to share in God's plan for us.

Jesus said on one occasion – see John 15: 13 – "The greatest love a person can have for his friends is to give his life for them" (Good News Bible Version.)

Some 30 years later Paul wrote to his friends in the Churches in Colossae – see Colossians 1:27 "God's plan is to make known his secret... Which he has for all peoples .... Christ is in you ... and you will share in the glory of God."

This plan is for the long term and is unchanging. As we prepare to celebrate at Easter the question is What does it mean to us?

We wish you all joy, peace and blessing as you Celebrate Easter.

Thank you to everyone who came to the funeral for my Dad, Bill Adcock, who passed away peacefully and with friends around him at the end of February.

Dad and Mum farmed up on the cliff, in St Teath parish, since 1965 and over the years were involved in many village activities. Those of a certain age will remember those children's Christmas parties, the whist drives in the Church Hall where locals would vie to win their Christmas turkey dinner. Legendary safari dinners where our parents drove around each other's houses taking a course of a meal at each house, along with liquid sustenance – not something that would be encouraged today! The trips to the White Hart in the evenings at harvest time, for something to whet the whistle and wash away the dust. Bill and Margaret both loved the land and their community completely. The door was always open, the kettle always on, and the chat around the kitchen table always made you feel better. Although they were not born Cornish, one true Cornish local has paid Dad the ultimate accolade by saying he became "the closest thing to a Cornishman that any person born outside the county could become".

Mum and Dad's ashes will be laid to rest in their beloved St Teath churchyard, where the crocus and the daffodils mark each springtime, and the rain makes the grass grow green. Their spirits are in a 'better place' (better even than Cornwall?!).

On Friday, the day we call 'Good', the man they called Christ, was crucified, dead and buried in a sealed tomb. On Sunday, the body was gone and the same man, now alive, met, spoke, ate with many of his friends...

... earlier, this man Jesus, had told his followers that he would rise from the dead; but they didn't get it.

Jesus knew what would happen; that his friends and followers would face the deep pain of loss and grief. After three years of miracles, teaching, sharing and caring, the Jewish leaders were afraid of him, scared he would overturn their power, wouldn't believe he was God's Son, so had him arrested. With trumped up charges, they put him on trial; and in order to get him out of the way before their great Passover celebration, handed him over to the Romans to be crucified. And when the Romans crucified someone, they made very sure he was dead before releasing the body.

Some of Jesus' friends did the last thing they could for him, by taking his body, wrapping and placing it in a new tomb, sealed with a stone. The small dusty tomb, with walls rough hewn into the rock; was cold; dark; lifeless.

Yet, three days later, Jesus rose from the dead. The hopeless end became an Endless Hope, bringing New, Everlasting Life. In rising from the dead, Jesus Christ destroyed the darkness of death forever. It was the beginning of a whole new way, and it still is. 'Alleluia!' Christians will shout on Easter Sunday; 'Hooray' to put it another way.

So, is it relevant now?
Perhaps we can hold on to
the thought that God understands the deep and very real
pain of loss and grief.

Maybe, we can believe that Jesus went through crucifixion [the most awful way the Romans could inflict the death penalty] because of his love for us [YOU and me].

Might we be able to trust that death is not the end, but a new beginning?






