

EDITORIAL

For weeks we have been under starter's orders just waiting for that signal and - we are off! But will this be the smooth running of The Derby or the nightmare obstacle course of The Grand National?

After what seems like an eternity of being told what we can do, who we can see, where we can go, it is up to us. We must make our own decisions - masks or no masks, social distancing or hugs, meeting only outdoors or returning to social get togethers indoors. We take the risks or continue to play safe - it's up to us.

Is the government passing the buck or handing back personal responsibility for our own lives? Like everything else with the pandemic, people can't agree. Even the scientists take different views.

As I write, case numbers are rising dramatically. I did some research. The increase was very worrying, said some experts. We must be cautious. Others saw things differently. High numbers now, coupled with the undoubted vaccination success would mean more immunity in the autumn and winter, the "tricky" time for infection, and flu cases were likely to increase after being held at bay by lockdown last winter. Yet by September all adults should have had the opportunity to have both vaccination jabs. No, they are not 100% effective but...

If we all continue to "play safe", what happens to the theatres and cinemas, the museums, nightclubs and art galleries which depend on us for an income? The UK is rightly proud of its entertainment industry but how many theatres can continue if we don't support them this winter? Think of the newly reopened Hall for Cornwall, Plymouth Theatre Royal, the Minack - they need us. I am not suggesting their survival is at risk but there must be concerns.

As I have said before - and I don't apologise for repeating it - charities need every penny they can raise even if they have received government help over the past year or more. That means fundraisers but would you be willing to take your chances in a packed church hall, community centre or school?

There has been a lot of discussion about the effect on mental health of lockdowns. People need to get out and meet others, to socialise, to see dear friends again. But is "normality" possible? Even though we have been assured lockdowns are a thing of the past and "there is no going back", forgive me for sounding sceptical. Lockdowns - maybe not - but I can't envisage an autumn and winter without a return to some restrictions whether they be the dreaded tiers, bubbles or social distancing.

On the optimistic side - the Village Show committee has led the way to a return of some kind of a village life with plans for September. Will others follow suit or will they be cautious? Even if events are planned, will enough people be happy to support them?

Looking ahead (you do that a lot when working on Timepiece!), there would normally be autumn events like harvest in church and at school, then the all important run up to Christmas. What can we plan when no-one has a working crystal ball?

And yet I am sure the school and pre school will already be arranging a packed calendar for the autumn term. Do we go for it and plan events and club meetings again?

I am glad I am not having to make these decisions but good luck to the people who do.

If you are completely lost, stop everyone and start an argument about repeat.

Strive to achieve the maximum notes per second – that way you at least gain the admiration of the completely incompetent.

Markings for slurs, dynamics, ornaments and breathing should be completely ignored. They are only there to embellish the score.

If a passage is difficult, slow it down. If it is easy, speed it up. Everything will work itself out in the end.

When everyone else has finished singing, you should NOT sing any notes you still have left.

Some friends leave an indelible mark on your life. Even if you don't see them for months or years, their friendship is treasured and the memory of them makes you smile.

I can't think of a greater tribute to that unique man, Alan Dawe. Unique? Yes. I never met anyone like him. That acerbic wit took no prisoners. I remember trying to keep a straight face at church events as he whispered waspish remarks into my ear, struggling to concentrate as prompt for the pantomime, as he sat at the keyboard next to me, wondering if the cast were following the same script as us.

We shared a love of musicals but his knowledge was vast. He had devoted a lifetime to music and encouraging so many singers. Others know far more than I do about his long life in show business but I know that music - and his beloved partner, Jay - were his life, as anyone who attended any of his concerts will testify.

Despite his serious health problems, Alan took on so many commitments.- all the services that came with his roles as church organist and choirmaster, the concerts with choirs and Mini Minstrels. He was a regular at our Christmas Village lunches where we had the annual argument about the right tune for *While Shepherds Watched*. He gave in very reluctantly. Fund raising? Ask Alan. He was so generous in every way and always full of enthusiasm.

But I know retirement was welcome when the time came. "Come over for a coffee now I have time and we will have a gossip". The last words he said to me.

We could probably fill TIMEPIECE with tributes to this extraordinary man but of one thing I am certain none of us will ever forget him.

Alan Dawe was choirmaster and organist at St Tetha's church for some ten years. He was not your typical church musician having had a background as a cruise ship entertainer and West End theatre musician. But he responded to the challenge with great determination and learned to play the organ, which is no mean feat. He was a very skilled musician and made his own arrangements of many pieces of music for the choir, notably the famous four-minute Messiah!

Choir practices were always very entertaining. We certainly looked forward to Thursday evenings. Alan's sense of fun and acerbic wit amused us all and the occasional mis-hits of the cha-cha-cha button on the keyboard added to the enjoyment. And it was very difficult to keep a straight face when he ate chocolates with exaggerated relish, hidden away in the organ loft on a Sunday morning.



Aside from all the jokes, Alan took his responsibilities very seriously. Whatever the weather, Alan was there, even though his health was not good and cold, damp weather made it difficult for him.

Alan retired in May last year. The choir had hoped to give him a splendid send-off with a wonderful party. No doubt with his flamboyant sense of fashion he had already planned his designer outfit, down to the last detail! Unfortunately, coronavirus intervened and Alan never did get his party. But we were so pleased to show him our appreciation and make a presentation during Harvest Festival last October when there was a window of freedom from lockdown. A Covid-compliant small group, suitably distanced, also sang carols on his doorstep last Christmas just to let him know that he wasn't forgotten.

The choir and the church owe Alan a huge thank you for all he did and we will miss our dear friend very much.





A METHODIST MINISTER'S VIEW

The first Sunday in July was observed as 'Thank You Sunday' in some places. Some of you will have seen the references to it on the television news bulletins on that day which is the only reference I saw to it in the range of newspapers and magazines which we purchase. So, I can understand if it has, seemingly, passed you by.

The 'Thank You Sunday' idea was a development of the neighbourhood clapping which we shared in the early months of the Covid 19 Pandemic to give thanks to and honour all of those front-line workers who were, and indeed still are, caring for us in our hospitals and neighbourhoods. The 'Thank You Sunday' concept was to say 'Thank You' to all those who made a difference in all neighbourhoods and are still doing so through their caring for others in many different ways. The news bulletin I saw showed a community meal and a Street Party both of which I think, were in the London area.

One of the sad things which has come to the fore in cafes, restaurants, pubs, and shops in recent months are reports of the rudeness, aggression and ungratefulness shown by some customers. Some of these reports have been from businesses in our own County of Cornwall. It prompts me to ask the question 'Why?', hoping that it is not an evolving trend in our human interaction.

All of this challenges me to ask myself whether I am grateful for all that is done for me or provided for me in so many different ways. Do I say, 'Thank You' to every person that I should or take too many things for granted. Good points for us all to think about.

Life itself is a gift to all of us with the many different things which are provided for us, and the relationships we share in day by day. Some of the earliest passages in our Bibles commend us to be 'thankful' people. For example, in Psalm 92 we read: -

'How good it is to give thanks to you, O Lord... to proclaim your constant love every morning and your faithfulness every night'

As I was thinking on these matters the chorus of a hymn came to me which is: -





ST TEATH PARISH COUNCIL

On the 6th July 2021 there was a full complement of Councillors with the newly co-opted members attending their first meeting. Your councillors are:-

Cllr Tracey Kingdon (Chairman), Will Kitto (Vice Chairman), Darren French, Tanya Banks, Bob Fox, Nev Turner and Kerri Kitto.

The council decided to postpone the first village Neighbourhood Plan meeting that was scheduled for the 13th July. This will now go ahead after the summer on Tuesday, 14th September 2021 in the Church Hall at 7.00pm. Please get in touch if you want to know more or keep your eye on the Parish Council notice board (outside the school) or our website. Cllr Bob Fox is leading this project and will be happy to talk to anyone interested in helping on a committee or someone who could assist with one of the specific topics that need to be covered. If the process moves forward, public consultation events will be held.

We are aware that the seat at Newhall Green is damaged and if this is deemed beyond repair it will be replaced.

Costs are being obtained to repair and repaint the village bus shelter. The roof slates and guttering have been damaged on several occasions by large vehicles, so the council are now looking at ways in which this can be protected.

A team of ladies have been looking at areas in the village where wildflowers can be planted and would no doubt welcome any help. The Parish Council has also obtained approximately 50 trees and more have been requested. These are free to local groups to help promote climate change although species do vary. If gardening is your passion or you would like to plant a tree or have an area where trees could be planted, please let us know.

An item that will be on the agenda for our next meeting will be a discussion on the money available to enhance children's facilities and improve the parking at the recreation sports field. This money has become available from a development that was subject to donating an amount of CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy) money for the benefit of the parish.

Cllr D Fairman (our Cornwall Councillor) has informed us that that Cornwall Council has the money in place to install the 20mph speed limit past the school; and he was awaiting a meeting with the Highways manager to move this forward.






