I am writing this, my final Timepiece entry, in the last few days of education for me. As I told the school community a few weeks back, the last couple of years have been amazing; I've loved serving this school and community, but am now looking for a different work-life balance after giving my all to the job. I'm hoping I can still support events. I would like to thank all the community who have supported me these last two years.

Teathletics was a major event this term, Jack devised an opening ceremony and two full days of running, throwing, jumping and other sporting skills. The children competed as 12 different counties. Sport is such a big focus at our school: something I am sure Jack will continue long after I've gone.





Oak class (year 5/6) performed their production of *Oliver*! This was quite simply a stunning performance under the directorship of Mr. Howard. Seeing how the children have grown each year for our theatrical performances has been something I have loved witnessing in my time. The quality of the acting, stage directions, singing and dancing is mind blowing: with special mention to those who sing solo on stage so well.



There have been lots of super school trips this term. Sycamore Class went to the Hall for Cornwall for The Big Sing event; Willow Class went to Newquay Zoo and in the penultimate week of term, we took most of our year 5/6 children to London.



The children had the chance to embrace culture by visiting the Houses of Parliament, the London Eye and Downing Street. They also went to Covent Garden, Leicester Square, a Sikh Gurdwara and museums.







FROM OUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR

So far this year we have seen the driest February on record followed by double our expected rainfall in March, and now the news that we have globally experienced the warmest week in at least 100,000 years! Climate Change is affecting our weather faster and deeper than predicted and the need to decarbonise our society has never been more urgent. Unfortunately, we are not only failing globally - but also locally.

A report to our Economic Growth & Development Scrutiny Committee at Cornwall Council contains the following information about Cornwall's journey to net-zero with special regard to road transport:

Whilst transport emissions did see a reduction linked to Covid-19 pandemic restrictions, data for 2022 shows that levels have already almost returned to pre-pandemic levels, and we see a steady double-digit percentage increase each year since. In Cornwall alone, daily vehicle kms are expected to increase from 15.5 million kms in 2019 to 18.6 million kms by 2030. It is clear that, even setting emissions aside, this level of growth is just unsustainable and could not be supported by Cornwall's communities, environment and infrastructure.

For this and many other reasons, I recently proposed that we make **Active Travel** (walking & cycling) a priority for our new Community Network Partnership - a group which brings together all the villages I represent as well as the towns of Bodmin and Wadebridge and many rural parishes that surround them. I am pleased to say that this has been supported by local councillors across the area. One of the specific measures I would like to introduce is an extension of the current Sustrans cycle routes to better connect our rural villages with Wadebridge, Bodmin and Camelford whilst avoiding using the A39 and the B3266 and providing safer crossings where required. It could also enable much better connectivity with the Camel Trail for many more residents.

My hope is that these could be used as much for work as for leisure or tourism and play a small part in reducing our dependence on cars, whilst being better for our physical and mental health.

Before the advent of e-bikes the challenge of cycling the Allen and Camel valleys would have been beyond the capabilities of all but the fittest of people, but e-bikes are a game changer when it comes to hills. They are more expensive than normal bikes (but much cheaper than running a car), and if your employer has signed up to the government Cycle2work scheme you can get a significant discount whilst using salary sacrifice to spread the payments over 12 or 18 months.

If you have any strong views on this, please get in touch and I hope to provide regular updates over the coming year.

A READER WRITES...

It is amazing how quickly babies, initially so reliant on an adult for everything, start to crawl. Their parents' eyes have to be everywhere, don't they? Then, it seems no time at all before curiosity gets the better of them and they take their first few, wobbly steps, a joy to behold, and soon toddle all over the place. Before long, they may start at Pre-School, then School and so on, always developing, learning, gaining new skills. Where does the time go?

As children develop, they also grow physically, often at a great rate; quickly out-growing clothes before they are anywhere near worn out, leaving parents possibly in a quandary - what to do with their outgrown yet in still very good condition clothes? Unless there is a family member or friend to whom they can be passed on, and with very few local charity shops, items may either stay in the cupboard or be thrown out; both of which are a shame.

There are also many people who, in this economic climate find it difficult to keep purchasing new as their children out grow their clothing.

The local churches, St John's Delabole, St Teath and St Thomas' Camelford are preparing to take part in, 'The Grace Project', aimed at serving the community by taking the gift of pre-loved clothing [children from 0-12] and re-distributing to those in need, working with Egloshayle Church in Wadebridge, who piloted this project.

We have collection points in the above churches for community members to drop in pre-loved clothing, which will be taken to Egloshayle, sorted and re-distributed within the communities as requested. We are at the beginning of setting up this activity; there will be more details to follow as to how you can request and receive items you need.

So, if you have outgrown clothing, for children aged 0-12 [no used underwear please; but donations of new underwear welcome] please drop into the pink **Grace Project** containers in St John's, [inner porch] St Teath and St Thomas; each church is open during the day.

The children scampered around playing hide-and-seek among the trees and bushes, while the adults partook of the copious supplies of food and drink and a thoroughly good time was had by all.





As a bonus, almost £2,000 was raised to purchase new bell-ropes for the church. Heartfelt thanks go to Sue and Tom for hosting this hugely successful event.

A METHODIST MINISTER'S VIEW

Earlier in the year there was a letter in the Readers' Letters column of a newspaper in which the writer stated that he had been asked by a friend in Belgium why Britain was becoming a third-rate country. I did not see any follow-up to that letter, but as I have been thinking it seems to me that we can be lulled into that opinion.

My thought processes change when I start thinking about some of the work undertaken by charity groups for people whose life situations are much different from ours. For example -

Water Aid, whose advertisements you will have seen on television. They work to get water supplies into settlements overseas. We take water on tap in each house as being the norm.

Our Methodist Church's Relief and Development agency called 'All We Can' has been supplying bicycles to people in Ugandan villages to help them to move around more easily. Compare that to your transport arrangements.

Mary's Meals, a Scotland based charity, is currently supplying some 2.4 million midday meals for school-children in some 18 countries overseas, such as Malawi, and Haiti. Through this, children are able to concentrate on learning, but for many it is their only meal of the day. Unfortunately, the demands on this charity are increasing.

We could add other examples to the above such as the work of Christian Aid, Oxfam or our Cornwall based charity, Shelter Box. The horrifying thing is that the situations these charities address are the reality of life for so many people.

In July the 75th Anniversary of the founding of our National Health Service was celebrated. This serves as a reminder to us of how fortunate we are and reminds me of a hymn which has been around for many years. Some lines of the hymn are: -

Count your blessings name them one by one. And it will surprise you what the Lord has done.

On the occasion when the apostle, Paul said goodbye to friends at Ephesus he commented, *There is more happiness in giving than receiving* (Acts 20:35)

It is sobering to allow ourselves to be challenged by all of the above. Every blessing in your thinking.


