

FROM OUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR

On Weds 13th July well over fifty local councillors and members of the public attended a meeting I had convened to hear presentations from a variety of agencies around the single topic of the water quality in the River Camel and its tributaries.

Representatives of the West Country Rivers Trust Environment Agency, Bodmin Anglers, Cornwall Council, Natural England, National Farmers Union, and South West Water each gave a presentation and then took questions. There was an inevitable focus on the levels of phosphates in the river, which has led to a moratorium on planning applications across a wide area of North Cornwall for the last year. The picture that emerged from the Environment Agency data supplied by their Integrated Environment Planning Team Leader, Dan Griffiths was one of consistent improvement in these levels over the last decade with much of the catchment in a "good" condition, whilst not quite meeting the high levels required of the Camel due to its protected status as a Special Area of Conservation.

Both Giles Rickard of the Westcountry Rivers Trust and Kate Allingham, Natural England's local Catchment Sensitive Farming officer, detailed the many farm advice visits undertaken in the area over the last decade which have helped with the improving picture, along with SWW's investment in some of their Waste Water Treatment Works (WWTWs) with phosphate stripping measures. Local Michaelstow Parish Councillor, Peter Jago, gave the local anglers' perspective and reported both a decline in fish and fishing locally. Patrick Aubrey-Fletcher from the NFU stressed the importance of agriculture to the local economy and some of the constraints and pressures that farmers are currently working under. Cornwall Council's Head of Planning Policy, Adam Birchall and their Head of Development Management, Hayley Jewels outlined the importance of taking a precautionary approach to approving applications in the catchment now and the need for robust evidence of any mitigation measures before any new developments can be approved.

Finally, South West Water's new Director of Natural Resources, Carolyn Cadman and their River Basin Planning Manager, Richard Foster, outlined their future investment plans for the catchment. A generous amount of time was allowed for public questions and whilst a lot of the focus was inevitably around planning and the phosphates issue, many of the public were equally concerned around levels of nitrates and sewage discharges.

I was very pleased with the interest and turnout on the night and very grateful to the speakers for their time and willingness to take questions. Taking an in-depth and holistic look into the issues has thrown up, a number of questions that I feel need further investigation:

- How can it be that new developments in the catchment that could feed into existing Waste
 Water Treatment Works are not allowed, but all other areas of North and East Cornwall are free to
 deliver septic tank collections into the catchment via the Nanstallon WWTW?
- If the Council's commissioned consultants are correct in claiming that 78% of Phosphates in the river come from agriculture, why are the Environment Agency noticing such marked improvements in line with investments from SWW in their WWTWs?
- Why are some of our WWTWs discharging untreated sewage so often? In Delabole's case nearly 250 times per year can't possibly be only linked to heavy rainfall events. Doesn't this need investment in capacity as well as treatment?

South West Water are currently encouraging members of the public to make their views known on their draft Drainage and Wastewater Management Plan for each catchment and members of the public can access this on their website:www.southwestwater.co.uk/dwmp

I have had a great first year getting to work with the amazing staff and children of this school and have quickly learnt what a wonderful village this is. I'm proud of what the school has achieved this year and the team and I will look to build on that in the coming year. We appreciate all the support we have had within the community with events, donations and volunteering. The school really does appreciate and value its community links.

This last month has seen so much happening. **Teathletics** stands out as a real highlight, from the opening ceremony representing countries on day one, through qualifying on day 2 and the finals and field events on day 3. Every child got a chance to compete, to participate in sport and to be part of a team. PEARL

The toast-master at Pearl's party was Bill Pearce (Eric) who gave an entertaining speech recalling memories from their long, 83 year friendship, and providing a unique insight into the kind of woman Pearl is. We include excerpts from it below:

"In 1939 Pearl and her parents moved to *Hillows*. Living next door were the Pearce family with boys Eric and Mervyn. There were 3 cottages up the lane: the Pearces lived in the first and the Corys at the top. The Sprys lived in the middle cottage They were posh. It had a name, Rose Cottage, and a flush toilet outside the back door. We had a bucket and chuck-it loo halfway down the garden and a po under the bed for emergencies in the night. Daily we walked the mile and a half to and from St Teath School in all winds and weathers.

At home we played together most of the time, but the old saying, 'Two's company, three's none' occasionally arose. One such day Pearl and Mervyn had plans that did not include me. In the garden was a massive pear tree which forked about 10 feet above ground. They convinced me how brave I would be if I climbed the ladder to knock down some pears and I fell for it. When I reached the fork, they pulled the ladder away and there I stayed, stuck up the tree until Mum came home from work over an hour later.

Pearl married Ken at the Parish Church in 1956 and the bride and groom moved in with Pearl's parents at Ivy Cottage in the village, which was to be Pearl's home to this day. Ken passed away in 2000 and, not one to be on her own, Pearl was later to marry Byron Allen. I was privileged to be Best Man and to give her away at the service. After Byron's death, she married Cyril Pluess, a lonely widower from St Breward. Over the years, when visiting, you would find the men all in turn sitting in a comfortable armchair by the fireside. So began a bit of a joke. Pearl would kindly invite me to sit there but I always declined and sat on a high chair by the table. I considered that armchair to be hotter than the electric chair. I knew of four who had sat there and departed, so I was taking no chances.

Pearl will always be remembered for her incredible fund-raising skills and the British Legion Poppy Appeal in particular, which she began when she was just 11 years old and continued for the next 75 plus years. Her dedication was recognised in June 2000 when she received the MBE from HM the Queen. She had a longer than average chat with her Majesty but I can neither confirm nor deny the rumour going round at the time that she invited the Queen to join the Cornwall Air Ambulance Lottery.

When I became Commercial manager at Plymouth Argyle Football Club in 1972, Pearl became the village Argyle Lottery agent. When I promoted the Air Ambulance Lottery she became the village agent for 26 years, before my retirement in 2014. Pearl also supported countless village initiatives with no one escaping her path.

Pearl has been more than a friend to my wife and me, she has been family. When we lived at *Hillows*, Pearl drove daily to and from St Teath taking our sons, Robin and Paul to school until my wife passed her test. A week before Robin died in the Royal Free Hospital in north London, Pearl made the long journey by coach to see him for a few minutes through the window of his isolation ward and then made the long journey back to Cornwall. I shall never forget that. Weeks later she stood near us on that darkest of Christmas Eves 1985 when we watched dear Robin lowered into his grave. He was just 11 years old.

In raising our glasses to Pearl, we give thanks for her service to the community, for her steadfast devotion to God and his church and for her friendship to us all. A staunch Royalist, we pray she lives another 10 years and receives her 100th Birthday card from Buckingham Palace! To Pearl, a truly extraordinary woman."

ST TEATH COMMUNITY SPEEDWATCH (CSW)

The Speed Watch Team are continuing their regular checks on vehicles entering the village from the Delabole direction. Their results:

On Thursday 7th July from 10.30 - 11.30am out of 69 vehicles, 19 (36%) were speeding: 1 x 42, 2 x 41, 2 x 40, 3 x 38, 2 x 37, 6 x 36, 3 x 35 mph

On Thursday 13th July between 10.00 - 11.00am, out of 70 vehicles, 9 (13%) were speeding.:1 x 42, 1 x 40, 2 x 38, 2 x 36, 3 x 35 mph.

(There were also 3 foreign-registered vehicles exceeding the speed limit, but as these are not followed up by the Police, they were not recorded.)

On Thursday 20th July from 10.00 – 11.00am out of 66 vehicles, 6 (9%) were speeding:

1 x 43, 1 x 40, 1 x 37, 2 x 36, 1 x 35

It is gratifying to see that these figures show a gradual reduction in drivers speeding on entering the village. Well done to those who are heeding the signs. Let us hope that this trend continues.

Comments from residents have been made to the effect that the new 20mph restriction does appear to be slowing traffic down. Comments have, however, also been made regarding the increase in tailgating, where drivers sit too close behind the vehicle adhering to the 20mph restriction and on occasions sound their horn, flash lights and, in one case mentioned, the following vehicle has even overtaken near a bend.

Please do drive within the speed restrictions. They are for the safety of everyone.

A METHODIST MINISTER'S VIEW

As I sat down to write this article the news came through that there were 26 Ambulances at our Treliske Hospital in Truro waiting to admit patients. This is not a new phenomenon but has been ongoing for many months, but despite all the discussions about it the situation does not seem to be improving. It is not just locally that we have this problem but the same is happening at most hospitals in the South West and beyond.

One article which I read on the issue stated that over the past years some 25,000 hospital bed places have been taken out of service across the country. The current estimate is that our hospitals need an extra 16,000 beds to be able to meet the demands of the present time. It seems to me that somewhere along the lines there has been a miscalculation in the business plan for our Health Service. I am assuming that somewhere there *is* a business plan in the relevant government departments.

Part of this debate hinges on work within government departments anticipating future needs. 'Anticipation' is a basic human skill which is taught in various ways. For some 25 years I was involved with young people pursuing their Duke of Edinburgh's Award, when in the expedition training, we encouraged participants to 'anticipate' the likely outcome of their decisions and to plan accordingly. We all in various ways are people who 'anticipate.' Some people are currently anticipating going away on holiday, whilst those people who run holiday businesses have been anticipating their need for staff and provisions. For those in business not anticipating future needs well has the potential for loss of profits and embarrassing situations, as well as consequences for the customers.

As I started thinking along these lines, I realised again just how our creator God anticipated the nature of us human beings, who are created in his image, and planned accordingly in his love, care, and concern for us. His answer was to send his Son, Jesus, amongst us to suffer in the way in which he did to enable us to be reconciled to God from the potential mess of our lives. His anticipation had costly consequences, perhaps all situations of anticipating correctly do. Food for thought and action for all of us.

St Teath joins with Delabole in mourning the loss of **TRICIA MOLLOY** whose contribution to community life over many years has been enormous. Known to St Teath people mainly for her years as Chair of St Teath Parish Council, Tricia was always popular and highly respected as an efficient and above all fair-minded custodian of parish affairs.

A lifelong member of the Methodist Church, Tricia was heavily involved in the Delabole Church Youth Group's annual pantomime and many of us have fond memories of packing into the Wesley Schoolroom in Delabole each year for what was always a thoroughly enjoyable and highly entertaining performance. Alongside this, Tricia played an important role in organising the first of the chapel's annual Flower Festivals almost forty years ago. The festival has over the years been responsible for raising thousands of pounds for the Mount Edgcumbe Hospice.

A few years later in 1990 Tricia together with Esther Richardson set up the Delabole Friends Group to support the Children's Hospice South West, raising funds for Little Harbour, near St Austell, a role which Tricia continued to fulfil until very recently.

In a short tribute such as this, it's impossible to do justice to all Tricia's commitments to local groups and organisations - we haven't even mentioned her work for Delabole School, the Delabole Slate or the Royal British Legion, but a much more comprehensive account of her unique role in enriching local life appears in the August issue of the Delabole Slate.

We are indebted to the team at The Slate, Delabole's newsletter, for help in compiling this tribute and send our deepest sympathy to Tricia's family and many friends, as well as to the people of Delabole.

ST TEATH PARISH COUNCIL

Councillors – Kerri Kitto (Chairman), Tracey Kingdon (Vice Chairman), Will Kitto, Tanya Banks, Bob Fox, Nev Turner and Geoff Gale. The council welcomed Geoff who was co-opted at the July meeting to fill the vacancy left by Darren French. Our thanks to Darren for his valued input into the council and the community over the past few years. Cllr Dominic Fairman is the Cornwall Council ward member.

Change of Meeting Day - meetings are now held **on the first Thursday** of the month in the Community Centre and start at 7.00pm.

Planning – The parish council are consulted on planning applications within the parish. Although we cannot decide whether or not an application is approved (this is ultimately the decision of the Cornwall Council planning officer) we can make comments that may influence the officer's decision. Local knowledge is so important. If you are an applicant or if a proposal concerns or affects you, or if you wish to support an application, we would like to hear from you. You can contact us via the Clerk or attend the public session at the start of each meeting. Planning applications are listed on the meeting's agenda.

Footpaths and Public Rights of Way – Trimming is underway to clear the overgrowth on our footpaths. The parish council, working with Cornwall Council, have taken on the work to clear the public rights of way, replace signage and stiles. We have no authority to enforce entry or instruct landowners to clear any routes that are blocked, but we can report such matters to the Cornwall Council Countryside Access Team and their legal team will investigate.

Queen's Platinum Jubilee –I would like to apologise for an error in my last report. Thanks were given to the Carnival Committee for organising the Jubilee events, but in fact it was the Jubilee Committee, a dedicated group of volunteers who decided to bring the village together to commemorate the Jubilee. Thank you to them, their helpers, volunteers and you, the parishioners for making it a success.

Traffic management and 20mph speed limit – Work on the 20mph scheme is almost complete with just some extra signage to be done. The parish council have again received complaints about the speed of traffic passing through the village and although the 20mph focuses on the centre of St Teath, many drivers are going too fast on the approach to the village. Please be aware of pedestrians, particularly children and in areas around the school and drive with care.

Dog Bins – In addition to the dog bins that are owned by Cornwall Council, the parish council own two themselves and cost for emptying these bins is met by us. At the September meeting Councillors will be reviewing the usage of the bins and how often they need to be emptied.

Volunteer Groups – Thankyou to the litter picking group who spend time making sure the village is litter free. Also, many thanks to the ladies who have carried out planting and weeding to make the village look more attractive.

Seats – the parish council have had to remove the seat at the junction to Tethadene. We hope to replace this once the work on the verge is complete, if this is possible. The seat at the top of Valley View is being replaced.

Lease of St Teath Football Field – The parish council 's request to take over the lease of the football field land has been agreed by both parties and ensures the land remains as a recreation area for the future. We already hold the lease on the land with the play equipment, so the whole site is now under one agreement. The football club continues.

Path from The Square to Treroosal Road - The parish council are aware of the work needed on repairs to the kissing gates and will be undertaking this in the future.

Next Meeting. The date of the next meeting is **Thursday**, **8**th **September 2022 at 7.00pm**. The following meeting will be held on **Thursday**, **6**th **October 2022**.






