PRICKLES AND PAWS HEDGEHOG RESCUE

Greetings One and All! What a month we are having at the rescue centre so far! Not only have we had our first orphaned hoglets admitted, we also had our busiest day ever with 19 admissions, closely followed the next day with another 12!

He was hypothermic and in now receiving intensive care, treatment for pneumonia and two hourly feeds

Whilst we have all been enjoying the warm, dry weather, the lack of rain means many hedgehogs (and all wildlife) are struggling to find water. Last year, a third of all hedgehogs admitted to the rescue were severely dehydrated. By simply placing a shallow dish of water out you really could save a life!

After minimal sleep but fuelled by a breakfast, the children went along to Newquay Zoo on the Thursday, and were accompanied by year 2. This term, our year 2 and year 6 children have undertaken their SATS with Mrs Davies and Mr Howard respectively. All children did so with a positive mind-set: giving their all. Year 2 were rewarded by a party, while year 6 were taken to Newquay to swim and to trampoline.



One final month to go of term with our end of year production, Teathletics and a trip to London taking centre stage, as well as transition to new classes and our new Reception joiners. Exciting times ahead!

This year marks the tenth birthday of the North Cornwall Book Festival. Curated by internationally renowned author Patrick Gale, this boutique festival includes author events, concerts, workshops, an art exhibition, a local artisan market and the ever-popular pop-up café.

As part of this year's stellar lineup, the festival will be welcoming the queen of crime fiction Ann Cleeves, historian Tom Holland, and novelists Natalie Haynes and Max Porter. Other authors are: Ike Anya, Laura Cumming, Lucy Easthope, Linda Grant, Tim Hannigan, Anna Mansell. Tomiva Owolade, Eleanor Shearer and Kim Sherwood.

Evening entertainment will be provided by one of the UK's most respected singer songwriters Charlie Dore, Devon-based jazz duo Helen Porter & James Budden, and acclaimed live poet Luke Wright.

Attendees will be able to take part in workshops over the weekend. These will include Emma Gunn on foraging, Tomiwa Owolade on writing about people of colour, a poetry workshop from Luke Wright, and sessions on how to break into a career in the arts. There will also be one-to-one *Meet the Professionals* sessions where attendees will receive invaluable feedback from writers, publishers and other creative industry professionals.

Plot holders also share their produce when we have a glut, we drop veg into Lorraine Jasper's box outside her house, as well as in the church porch, for those who are struggling to afford fresh vegetables. Some holders even took produce to the Wadebridge Food Bank.

COULD YOU BE A COMMUNITY FIRST RESPONDER?

Community First Responders are volunteers who support their local community by attending emergency calls ahead of an ambulance.

Recently a new group of responders has been formed with the aim of providing cover for St Teath, Delabole and the surrounding district. Several calls have already been answered in the area. We are looking to add more members to this group and recruitment will start around mid August with full training in October.

CFRs attend particular types of emergencies where it is essential for the patient to receive immediate lifesaving care. This includes conditions such as cardiac arrest, chest pain, breathing difficulties, unconscious patients, fitting patients, patients suffering from a stroke.

We also hope, in the future, to have additional training and equipment enabling us to attend patients who have fallen but are unable to get up off of the floor.

CFRs are not sent to particular types of incidents, due to concerns for their personal safety - these include, road traffic collisions, incidents involving excess drugs or alcohol.

You do not need any previous medical training to become a CFR and age is not a barrier but you do need:

To live in the target area

Hold a full driving licence with less than 6 penalty points

Have good interpersonal and communication skills

Have the ability to observe and accurately record details

Have the ability to take the lead and remain calm in pressured situations

Have a level of fitness to deliver cardiopulmonary resuscitation as a sole responder

Have the ability to complete theoretical training to the required national academic level (level 3)

Whilst there are no absolute rules you are asked to be signed on and available about 12 hours (or optionally more) per week but during that time you may not be called and you can get on with other things.

FROM OUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR

At our May Full Council meeting I was happy to support a motion to back Cornish farming and ensure that the council only sourced local, seasonal food for any catering at meetings or events. As well as being a farmer, I represent a very rural division of Cornwall Council and all my six villages are in strong agricultural settings with farming being the main local industry.

Farming is going through a very challenging time at present with the withdrawal of the old EU direct payments and considerable uncertainty regarding what government and society wants from our farmers. It would seem that the era of cheap food is now over. Whilst this has been exacerbated by the war in Ukraine, without subsidy payments farmers will only be willing or able to produce food at or above the cost of production. This has already begun to show on supermarket shelves with eggs and some veg not available all of the time as farmers choose to produce less rather than lose out financially.

Of particular importance to North Cornwall is the dairy industry. To meet demand and low prices units have become progressively larger and there reaches a point where a herd becomes so large that it becomes impractical to move them twice a day for milking - it then only makes economic sense to keep the cows in barns and yards and bring the food to them. This zero-grazing approach is now allowing some farms to keep herds of well over a thousand cows.

This has been necessary as the supermarkets continue to put price pressure on milk, undervaluing it and the producers, and only treating it as a loss-leader to get customers into their stores.

There is another challenge which is unique to our local area. Much of the farmland in my parishes lies within 'protected' landscapes, with Bodmin Moor designated as a Site of Special Scientific Interest in 1951, the Camel and Allen valleys are a Special Areas of Conservation (designated 2005), and the whole coastal strip is an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (designated 1949). Up until now these designations have put little restriction on farming and have even been seen as an opportunity to attract conservation schemes for those who choose to or to diversify into tourism. However, with the implementation of the Environment Act in 2021 and the government commitment to reach net-zero by 2050 these designations will play a key role in achieving these aims that are now enshrined in statute.

This has already started to take effect within the Camel catchment with Natural England refusing to allow any new housing that cannot be proven to be phosphate neutral and refusing to approve any new slurry lagoons that cannot meet exceptionally high ammonia emission thresholds. They are also currently refusing to extend the large conservation schemes on Bodmin Moor without much lower stocking levels being delivered for the existing funding.

All these pressures will be felt very keenly by local farmers - but they are not going away. The UK has pledged to protect 30% of the landscape for biodiversity by 2030 and the designations that cover our patch of North Cornwall mean that we live in an area where nature friendly farming is going to be the national priority. Our farmers will need our full support to adapt to these new demands that society is placing upon them.

A METHODIST MINISTER'S VIEW

Either through viewing the local news programmes on television in recent weeks, or from photographs in the newspapers you will have become aware of the barge which has been purchased by our government to provide accommodation for the refugees which have crossed the 'English Channel in small boats. The barge was last used to provide accommodation for those working on offshore oil fields and housed some 200 men. The refit being undertaken in Falmouth is to enable some 500 persons to be accommodated. The barge will be placed in Portland Harbour in Dorset 1 understand 2 further barges have been acquired. This is all a part of the Prime Minister's five priorities for our government at the present time, one of which is to 'stop the boats'.

The Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby received some television and newspaper coverage when he voiced his concerns about the proposed treatment of the boat refugees. Others have also protested in various ways. The issue of refugees and their treatment is an international issue.

As I have been thinking about the Government's current priorities I began to wonder if those listed are the right ones for these current times. There seems to be little attention to other issues such as the on-going housing crisis, the cost-of-living crisis and resolving the issues within some of our government funded institutions such as our hospitals, health services and education. These issues affect the lives of millions of people at the present time. What is worrying in addition are the numbers who are leaving the health and education professions because of the working conditions they experience

A number of voluntary based organisations are thankfully responding to these situations such as our foodbanks, homelessness charities, debt relief agencies and refugee welfare organisations many of which have Christian or other faith group roots.

As I was thinking along these lines some passages from the bible came to mind which should be the source of inspiration for our personal and our government's response to these situations. In the Book of the Law in our Old Testament, there are reminders to be mindful of the needs of foreigners, orphans, widows, and poor people. (See Leviticus 23:22 and Deuteronomy 24: 19-21). Jesus' words to his followers were to 'love one another' (John 13:24). Further in the Acts of the Apostles we read of the early Christian followers making provision for the less well off (see Acts 6:1-2),27 and James in this letter to the early church exhorts them to take care of the widows and orphans (see James 1:27).

The above are the founding thoughts for our outlook towards the needs of others, and hopefully inform our thoughts and actions.
