FROM OUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR

I write this just days after the Local Elections and the Coronation—two events which brought about significant change in the country, and both I feel threw up questions about the future.

I was disheartened by the fact that both events were marked by an erosion of our civil liberties. The requirement for voter ID is not only unnecessary but undermines a democracy that is held the world over as a beacon of trust and fairness. Similarly, the right to protest, free speech and the whole principle of policing by consent are cornerstones of Britishness and I feel are threatened by the new powers under the hastily enacted Public Order Act that were given to the police and used in wrongfully arresting a handful of peaceful protesters.

The Coronation itself was a flawless exhibition of pageantry and tradition that reflects our long history. Our armed forces gave an exemplary demonstration of military excellence and I do believe that it is important for the men and women who serve us to have an unelected head of state as their Commander-in-Chief – one who is above party politics. I personally felt that their "hip-hip" salute to the King in the palace grounds at the end of the precession was one of the most moving moments of the day.

However, it is becoming clear that the passing of the crown will be used as an opportunity for more nations to consider formally leaving the commonwealth. It is also clear that the monarchy has much less relevance now to younger people who will increasingly question the personal wealth of the Royal Family and also their burden on the taxpayer. The King has indicated a desire to slim down the monarchy, but I wonder if he will be able to keep pace with public opinion.

A few days before, the Local Elections gave a clear message that voters want change and, given the scale of the challenges facing us it is becoming apparent that a post-pandemic return to business as usual is not going to cut it – even if it were possible.

Without radical action on building affordable homes and council houses the housing crisis will continue to blight future generations for decades to come; our broken food system is eroding the health of the nation at a rate that cannot be met by the NHS; and we live in one of the most nature-depleted countries in the world as we continue to let private companies dump sewage into our seas and rivers. This is without touching on climate change, rising mental health issues and the escalating cost of living.

However, we are blessed with strong local communities in rural North Cornwall and there is much we can do and that we already do to support each other. In this respect I believe the focus on community volunteering to celebrate the Coronation weekend was a fitting tribute and I would thank everyone who made the celebrations so enjoyable in all our villages and then do so much other unsung work throughout the year.

Would you like to learn lifesaving skills for FREE?

The Parish Council has teamed up with Cornwall Training and FLEET Front Line Emergency Equipment Trust to offer locals the opportunity to learn lifesaving skills. Come along to one of our free sessions, booked to take place in the Community Centre on Tuesday, 20 June at 7pm or 8pm and learn how to perform CPR and use a defibrillator. These sessions will act as an introduction as to how to perform and use a CPR. There will be two x 1 hour sessions and you can choose which hour you would like to attend. No prebooking is required, you can just turn up on the day!

This is not a substitute for a full first aid course, but it will give you a basic level of knowledge and hopefully, the confidence that you would know what to do if you ever needed to.

ST. TEATH COMMUNITY SPEED WATCH (CSW)

On 19th April out of 62 passing vehicles, 9 vehicles were being driven at the following speeds within the 30 mile per hour speed restriction zone: **2 x 39mph**, **2 x 38mph**, **1 x 37mph**, **1 x 36mph**, **3 x 35mph**.

Between 2.30 – 3.30 pm on 27th April out of 66 passing vehicles 12 were being driven at the following speeds:**1 x 43mph**, **2 x 39mph**, **3 x 37mph**, **3 x 36mph**, **3 x 35mph**:

Between 2.30 - 3 pm on 4^{th} May out of 37 passing vehicles, 5 were being driven at the following speeds:1 x 38 mph, 2 x 37 mph, 2 x 36 mph. This speed watch was curtailed due to the onset of inclement weather.

Between 2.30 - 3.30pm on 11^{th} May out of 54 passing vehicles 5 were being driven at the following speeds: 1 x 54 mph, (did not slow down as it was driven towards the 20 miles per hour zone: 3 x 35 mph, 1 x 38 mph.



ST TEATH COMMUNITY CENTRE NEWS

The Committee and a small number of St Teath residents attended the open meeting at the Community Centre on March 22nd, 2023 at 7pm.

Proposal to amend existing constitution:

Under charity law, the St Teath Community Centre Association is a charitable organisation and any inhabitant of St Teath and its neighbourhood is entitled to benefit from the Association and therefore must be able to vote on matters relating to it. The existing constitution does not permit voting rights to this extent as it requires a membership. The CRCC (Cornwall Rural Community Charity), who oversee and assist Community Centres, have advised that Membership Associations such as ours are no longer fit for purpose, chiefly for the reason that it is very difficult to devise a procedure to ensure that all those entitled to benefit from the Association (ie everyone in the village) have the opportunity to become members.

At the meeting, we asked for general agreement to: remove the clause relating to Membership proceed with an amendment to the constitution to reflect voting right for everyone.

It was agreed by all those present that this process begin and the Committee will formally seek the approval of the inhabitants of St Teath and its neighbourhood to an amended document with due notice under the provisions of the original constitution. We will proceed under the guidance of the CRCC (Cornwall Rural Community Charity) and ACRE (Action with Communities in Rural England) as well as using the model approved by the Charity Commission,

It is the intention that this new governing document will be more in line with the current models for village halls and will stand us in a better position as we progress to register as a charity.

Any objections can be put in writing to the Community Centre email address and we will consider them alongside the development of the constitution.

NEWS FROM PRICKLES AND PAWS HEDGEHOG RESCUE CENTRE

Greetings One and All! We hope that you are all enjoying the longer evenings and (occasionally) warmer weather. We have been enjoying hearing about all of your hedgehog sightings, we are now well into breeding season and it's likely hedgehog activity will increase due to this. At the Rescue we are now very much on countdown to the first orphaned hoglet of the year as last year May saw the first of nearly 350 hoglets admitted to the Rescue, making up part of a total of nearly 1300!

As many of you are no doubt aware, hedgehogs are now sadly vulnerable to extinction, but there are lots of ways that we can help them out in your back gardens. Here are our top tips:

Provide a shallow dish of water; Let garden boundaries grow wild; Create a bug hotel ;Sow wildflower ■ Please check long grass and

Create a hedgehog highway;

hedges before strimming!

Out in day -I'm NOT ok!

Most importantly of all: -

PAUSE FOR THOUGHT

Whilst some memories of the day will linger long, the Coronation of King Charles III will have ceased to dominate the media when you read this, but this historic event was celebrated in all the churches of the Camel-Allen Benefice: by a prayer vigil for the King and Queen Consort on the eve of the Coronation at Advent; by morning services on the day after at Camelford, St Teath and a joint service of Anglicans and Methodists at Delabole Methodist Chapel; and by a civic service at Lanteglos-by-Camelford at which the lesson was read by the mayor.

King Charles may or may not feel adequate to the task fate has allocated to him ~ he has sometimes said that he will find it a challenge ~ but he believes, I am sure, that God has called him to fulfil this role, whether he would rather it fell to someone else or not. For Charles, being King is his vocation, through circumstances not of his choosing, he was born to it.

No one else has *that* vocation, but each of us has some vocation, given to us and to no one else, in exactly the same way. We are, each of us, born into particular circumstances and with particular talents and aptitudes that are *given* to us, not chosen or earned by us. What will we do with the gifts we have been given? We have the luxury of a choice which, other than simple acceptance or abdication, Charles does not, and there is the strongest possible pressure for him to accept, as he has done, and to do his duty.

We will all fail and fall occasionally (or often) to a greater or a lesser degree, but our vocation does not vanish simply because we have failed to live up to it. Most of us will, at some point, wrestle with the constraints in which we find ourselves and be tempted to imagine alternative paths: What if I had grown up with better or different opportunities? What if I were a man instead of a woman, or a woman instead of a man? I wish I were more attractive, or more intelligent, or more athletically gifted, or younger, or older. And so on. It is indeed tempting to dwell on these what-ifs, but this is an insidious distraction from living out our true vocation.

No one in the world has ever been born into the particular circumstances of Charles:70 years a king in waiting and becoming a constitutional king in the 21st century. But, similarly, no one in history has been born into your particular time and place in life, or into mine. Your vocation and mine are in their own ways as unique as that of King Charles III. Part of his vocation is to embody the very principle of vocation to the world, with the hard act of his mother to follow, a world that has become dazzled and disoriented by its many choices, and a culture which places value on being somebody else, somebody special, someone wealthier, more powerful or more famous than us, so that we can too easily lose sight of the beauty of being precisely the person God has made us to be and of fulfilling the vocation God intends for us, however lofty or humble that might be. We are all made in the image of God and God loves and has a plan for each of us.

So may God preserve each and every one of us. And God save the King!

A METHODIST MINISTER'S VIEW

I was interested to note the emphasis which was put on 'service' in and throughout the Coronation Celebrations. Right from the start of the Coronation Service in Westminster Abbey this theme was to the fore. You may well recall King Charles's reply to the young Chapel Royal chorister who welcomed him. His words were to the effect that he saw himself as having been called to serve as opposed to being served.

As I have thought about those words spoken by King Charles, I have recalled that one of the landmarks of our late Queen was her Service to us. The story of Jesus undertaking a task normally undertaken by a Servant in a Jewish household also came to mind. In that story in the *Gospel of John Chapter 13* in our Bibles, we read of Jesus washing his followers' feet before they shared a meal together. He comments that in doing that he was setting an example for them, so that they would be prepared to be humble in their actions for the benefit of each other, and by inference for other people.

This theme from the Coronation Service was carried through to the Bank Holiday Monday which was marked as a 'Big Help Out Day' to encourage people to become aware of needs in their local communities and to offer their time and talents in response. We have a long history of Volunteering and serving the needs in local communities in this country. In differing ways all of us have benefitted from the work of volunteers, be it through such things as Youth Groups, visits to Stately Homes, receiving First Aid, or sharing in community events. The challenge for us all at this time is to consider what contribution we can make to our community life. In many spheres of life in our local communities I hear of a lack of voluntary help.

I recall some other words of Jesus to first followers which can be found in the *Gospel of Matthew chapter* 7:12 – "Do for others what you would like them to do for you...." Challenging food for thought and action.






