FROM OUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR

As you may be aware, for the last year there has been an effective moratorium on new development in all the Towns and Parishes that are in the River Camel catchment, due to the excessive phosphate levels in the river. This isn't just a local problem and a recent parliamentary committee inquiry into water quality came to the following conclusions:

- Poor water quality in English rivers is a result of chronic underinvestment and multiple failures in monitoring, governance and enforcement
- Only 14% of English rivers meet good ecological status, with pollution from agriculture, sewage, roads and single-use plastics contributing to a dangerous 'chemical cocktail' coursing through our waterways. Not a single river in England has received a clean bill of health for chemical contamination.
- Bacteria found in sewage and animal slurry can cause sickness. Yet few river users are able to make informed decisions about when it is safe to use rivers downstream of storm overflows and wastewater treatment works.
- The build-up of high levels of nutrients, such as phosphorus and nitrogen, from sewage and animal waste, is choking rivers with algal blooms that reduce oxygen levels, suffocating fish, plants and invertebrates and the impact of wastewater from sewage treatment works and sewer overflows is preventing 36% of water bodies from achieving good ecological status.
- The impact of agricultural diffuse pollution is the most common form of pollution preventing rivers from achieving good ecological status, and intensive livestock and poultry farming is putting enormous pressure on catchments.
- Fats, oils and greases, and cleaning and hygiene products containing plastic, are causing huge problems for drainage systems when they are poured away in sinks or flushed down the toilet

If, like me, you are very concerned about all of this and the continuing decline in the water quality of the River Camel and its tributaries I hope you will come along to a public meeting I am organising to bring together all of the various agencies and stakeholders and to debate a way forward.

EDITORIAL.

Second homes - are they a good thing or detrimental to tourist hotspots like Cornwall?

The people of Whitby have voted in a local referendum to end second home ownership, angry that properties are now way beyond the means of local people. A familiar story and one that resonates in St. Ives where there was an overwhelming vote six years ago to ban any new homes that were not for "principal residence".

I can understand both sides of the argument. How many young people can afford to step on to the first rung of the property ladder? The prices here are soaring and are way beyond the finances of many locals. On the other hand, I know lovely people who visit their second homes as often as possible and make a point of supporting local business and indeed, I see them regularly at fundraisers, anxious to do their part for the village.

The housing availability in our village has undoubtedly been helped by new builds, aimed specifically at local people. This emphasis on affordable housing offers the chance, especially to young families, to have a home of their own while staying in the area they know and love.

I freely admit to dismay when I see very expensive, ultra-modern design homes (I am being tactful here) with drawn blinds and deserted driveways in picture postcard, coastal villages. The houses are obviously empty until the next visit. One family I know prefers to escape to their Tuscany dream home, rather than the luxury property in North Cornwall, which remains forlorn and empty for most of the year.

Cornwall villages are changing but it can't all be blamed on second homeowners. Covid didn't help. People became used to ordering supermarket deliveries, rather than using their local shop. I plead guilty here although I choose deliveries through necessity, Families are looking for the cheapest offers at a time when prices are rising alarmingly and every penny counts - cheapest offers usually mean supermarkets. Yet here too there is a problem. With fuel reaching astronomical figures, journeys are having to be curtailed.

Look at our village on a Saturday morning. It used to be so busy with customers going from the shop to queue at Kevin's and stopping to chat on the way. Now the hub of the village depends on Churchtown and the White Hart. This has a knock-on effect. People who were in the village to shop would often drop in at coffee mornings. Will they bother now?

A drastic change in the bus services means St. Teath is a village for car owners. People like me will have to consider a move to somewhere where access to vital things like medical appointments is easier.

St. Teath is changing. For better or worse?

ST TEATH NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

Report on the Public Consultation.

All the comments made by you, the people who live in the parish of St Teath, have now been collated and a report produced. This has been looked at by the working group and individual members have been tasked with looking further into each of the key areas.

34% of the households registered on the electoral roll were represented in the submissions made. 65% of those responding were aged 54 or over and 62% of those responding had lived in the parish for 11 or more years. This means that we still need to access the ideas and opinions of the younger groups living in the parish and the people who have moved here in the last 11 years.

Of the five key areas, the opinions about building development were the most evenly split and reflected the above profile of respondents. Resolving these key issues will form a major part of our thinking.

The other four areas of questions produced some clear answers on ideas such as cycle paths which were not popular, improving rural footpaths in the parish which were popular. There was a positive response for retaining and creating the provision of open space, restricting the size of any housing development, and making design, parking, and energy-saving part of any planning applications. Positive comments were also received for the idea of mixed housing development where first-time buyers, those wishing to move up the ladder and the elderly are all catered for. Some ideas suggested the creation of a policy which encouraged small scale economic development, but this should be of local benefit rather than tourism.

Of course, one of the major concerns of our parish is over the number of second homes and houses used as holiday lets. Finding a workable policy which will manage this will require very careful consideration if it is to tie in with national and county policies, which are often threatened but very rarely acted upon.

These are only the main points of the report which contained many good ideas both for and against the different proposed areas where localised policies would bring benefits to the parish. Our task is to create coherent and acceptable policies which will enhance the future of the parish. Hopefully this will be ready for a community-wide discussion in September, which will include an open public meeting.

A METHODIST MINISTER'S VIEW

In late May over a period of about three weeks we were harassed by a gentleman on the telephone telling us a story about our computer website having been hacked. He wanted us to open our computer to put the matter right under his instruction. We were suspicious and took some advice and ascertained that the organisation he claimed to be from was a bogus one, in other words he was a persistent scammer.

We have, as well, through experience, become suspicious of organisations which telephone us offering a free survey of a part of our home. We have discovered that this often opens the door to high pressure salesmen offering dubious products.

The above are examples of some of the dishonesty which exists in our society and through which the people involved are profiteering. Many of us, of course, would distance ourselves from being employed in such schemes, but the examples are 'symptoms' of the nature of the society in which we live.

In early June we were all sharing in various ways in the Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations. At that time, many comments were made in the television programmes and the national press about the importance of the Christian faith to her, her dedication to the task and the Service ethic she brings to it.

My Mother-in-Law had a saying of 'After the Lord Mayor's Show comes the dung cart.' Perhaps a euphemistic saying to use in the context – but the day following the Jubilee Celebrations we learnt that our Prime Minister was to experience a vote of no confidence in his ability to govern. It raised a range of issues of the Party-gate Scandal: honesty, truthfulness and integrity at the heart of government. 


