ST TEATH SCHOOL REPORT

It's possible that this might just be the busiest month yet in my time at the school, with lots of lovely things happening. Firstly, it has been so good to welcome our parents back in for Parents' Evenings for the first time in ages. Recently we have been restricted to online meetings which, while still useful, are not the same as face to face and the opportunity for parents to see the books of which their children are so proud.

This month, our year 5/6 children had the opportunity to take part in a primary themed 'escape room,' where children had to complete puzzles to unlock boxes in a race against the other children. This was a great opportunity to develop teamwork, creative thinking and resilience- key skills as we progress through life.

This has also been a busy month for sport, with 2 netball teams travelling to Callington to play against the best East Cornwall schools. Our two teams did extremely well, finishing 3rd and 5th respectively. All players have grown considerably as netballers since we started the club in January. The girls' football team, fresh from victory against St Minver, faced Wadebridge in the County Cup semi-final. The game was a tense affair, level, goalless, at the end of normal time. Extra time saw the two evenly-matched sides battle until the very last minute, when Wadebridge scored to knock us out. This week, we played in a 6-team touch rugby tournament at SJS. Our teams: Tornadoes & Warriors, played Camelford, Otterham and St Breward sides. Tornadoes won all 5 games to finish as winners and our Warriors team won the majority of their games to finish 3rd overall - a great achievement.

We have had a variety of visits this month, giving the children the chance to learn outside the classroom through different experiences, such as trips to the Eden Project, Truro Museum, Royal Cornwall Showground, the Fire station. All of these further the children's learning and ensure they fully immerse themselves in the topic.

This month we had Daya, a Sikh lady join our classes and teach the children about diversity and culture. The children had the opportunity to learn about artefacts from other religions, as well as the chance to try food, dance and items of clothing.

We are trying to add to our sports kit now we have more teams and are entering more competitions. We have had a kind offer of a donation. News from WILL BACCHUS and his dogs

Since lockdown was lifted, Will, the son of Lee Bacchus (ex-Head of St Teath school) and his dogs have been going from strength to strength. Will and Rudi ran in three finals at Crufts. One mistake in the first one dropped them from 1st to 6th (it's that close!). He was 2nd in the second final and the pair managed to win the 3rd final they were in. That is their 4th Crufts title together!

After this Will and Rudi were at the final try-outs to get into the Junior Great Britain team. It was a really tough weekend, but they finished with two second places to make them the top pairing overall and they are in Team GB for the Junior World Open Agility Championships in July. The event is in Finland, so they will be driving to Scandinavia, through France, Germany, Poland and Estonia before a ferry takes them and their van into Finland – exciting times for Will and his parents! From St Teath Parish Council to Cornwall County Council

In response to the consultation documents produced by Cornwall Council for the traffic calming and 20mph scheme in St. Teath, we would like to make the following comments and raise our concerns.

Virtual footway outside the school. The feasibly study deemed this unsafe, yet it has been included in this consultation. We are totally against the installation of a virtual footway and request a return to the original design where a physical footway is in place. If this isn't possible, we would rather have no footway at all. We believe, as does your own feasibility study, that a virtual footway will give a false sense of safety. These are funds poorly spent and do nothing to keep our children safe.

Removal of all speed humps.

Our original design includes a set of speed humps at intervals throughout the village. These have all been removed. There are no physical measures in place through the narrowest part of the village, where the highway isn't wide enough for a footway. Why?

20mph extended to the Pre school.

Currently the 20mph stops on North Road, not far beyond the primary school. Our Preschool and sports field are beyond this point and we previously requested that the 20 zone be extended the short distance to Preschool. These are the youngest and most vulnerable members of our parish, and their walking route is not covered by any of the new scheme. Why not?

Section 106 funds.

We have asked on numerous occasions through our County Councillor to see a full and transparent breakdown of the costs. A sum of £80,000 was costed by the council and secured through a section 106 agreement for the scheme. The scheme now presented is a far smaller project. Why can't we see the costs?

We are expected to make comment on this consultation by 13th April, yet you have not, or will not provide us with the costs we have asked for. You will be aware that a planning application was passed, and a new housing estate has now been built with a section 278 agreement on a footway and build-out. This planning contradicts the original scheme designed for the section 106 agreement. Firstly, this seems to be the reason we cannot have a physical footpath outside the school; secondly, it is paying for one of the build-outs in our original design, yet our costs haven't reduced. Why? We do not accept that a mistake made by the planning department should mean our self-funded traffic calming scheme has to adapt to fit a newer section 278 agreement. The developer has the right to an open book costing and will be requesting their funds back if not used for the purposes in the original section 106. Since very little of that original design is in the latest consultation, be aware that the developer is minded to recover his funds.

Ocean housing development

The section 278 agreement forming part of Ocean housing development on North Road is proposed on a piece of land under disputed ownership. The parishioners in question are seeking legal advice and will not give up part of their driveways to accommodate a new footpath. We believe the solution to this is for the original footway to be reinstated outside the school at Ocean Housing's expense. We are sure you will agree this will save costs for both Ocean housing and highways, as well as releasing the works to be completed and the houses (which are complete) to be occupied.

In the last three years there have been two hit and runs in St. Teath, one of which was a fatality. The measures in this consultation do not go far enough in making the roads through our village safe for the community. We will be seeking legal advice and would like to receive a formal written response including a breakdown of costs within the next 7 days and invite a member of the Highways team to discuss the matter further at our next Parish Council meeting on 7th April.

No response has been received and no one from County attended the PC meeting.

Craft activities are available for children. Relaxed right through, there's fun and laughter; we are sure that Jesus was a man of joy and laughter. Everyone is welcome. A METHODIST MINISTERS' VIEW

The Ukrainian situation is the main item in our television news bulletins and newspapers at the present time and will be for the coming months, as the situation unfolds. Amongst all the news stories of destruction, devastation, and death, however, there are good stories of the ways in which people are responding to the crisis through helping with the refugee situation on the front line, as they are in Poland and Moldova for instance. Also, impressive has been the response to the appeals for funds through such organisations as the Disasters Emergency Committee, and the offers of accommodation for those who have left the war-torn country.

You may have noticed that Royal Mail are now franking our letters reminding us of the on-going appeal for funding. All that most of us can do is to continue with our giving and our prayers for the people of Ukraine.

I have a concern that the emphasis on Ukraine may have a serious impact on the appeals for funds of other organisations. One Week in May is used by Christian Aid for its major funding appeal and this year Christian Aid Week starts on Sunday, 15th May. Of course, Christian Aid is very much involved with the Ukraine, but also has on-going projects in many parts of the World that enable communities to develop by providing basic facilities and education programmes. Imagine living in a village without running water available or having to make use of a small parcel of land and very basic tools to produce food for the family. Such things are still the realities of life for many people in our 21st Century World. For some, these realities are compounded by the impact of climate change. Many of the projects, supported by Christian Aid and other agencies, need funding over an extended period of time to realise their goals, and any loss of funding has consequences for those who live in desperate situations, which we would find difficult to tolerate.

I am also conscious that we have organisations in this county and country which need on-going funding such as our Air Ambulance and the Cornish Hospices. All of this faces us, as we wonder what the future holds for us with increasing energy and food costs. I can only ask you to think on these things and respond as you are able.

FROM OUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR

Most of my division (with the exception of Tintagel) has for the last 12 months been caught up in a moratorium on planning applications imposed by Natural England, who now require all new developments in the River Camel catchment area to demonstrate that they are "phosphate neutral" before planning permission can be granted.

As somebody who has lived and farmed in the catchment for over thirty years and having worked closely with the Westcountry Rivers Trust over that time, I am sadly aware of the deterioration of water quality and on one level I support Natural England in taking steps to address the issue. Currently in England only 14% of rivers are in good ecological condition and 0% are free of chemical contamination – a truly shocking state of affairs. There are two main sources of phosphates in our river systems – agricultural run-off (both soil and fertiliser) and sewage from both developments and sewage works.

My frustration is that this local moratorium is indiscriminate and is currently holding up new affordable housing in the area, while farmers are currently offered voluntary grant schemes to improve diffuse pollution, and South West Water are allowed to discharge raw sewage into the catchment whenever they are unable to cope with volume with impunity.

This should only apply during high rainfall events, however data released by the Rivers Trust shows that in Delabole at the head of the catchment, South West Water discharged sewage into the river nearly 50% of every hour of the day from two storm overflows.

Whilst we all know that it rains quite a bit in North Cornwall, this cannot be justified. What is more, there is currently no identified solution to the new Natural England requirements and as our housing crisis deepens, we remain unable to deliver new affordable housing across a wide area.

Unfortunately, the government have recently rejected a Lords' amendment to the upcoming Environment Bill which would have forced greater and faster action by our water companies and so this problem is likely to be with us for some years to come.

I hope later this year to organise a Town Hall event to investigate the issue and bring together all of the agencies involved. This will be open to all Town and Parish Councillors as well as residents from all of the parishes around Camelford, Bodmin and Wadebridge.
