In the aftermath of the tragic earthquake, it's hard to witness on our TV screens so much suffering and to feel so helpless to do anything to ease these people's pain. We can't all travel across the world to offer practical help, but everyone can do *something*.

The Cornish charity, Shelterbox was one of the first on the scene providing tents, blankets and essential supplies to families who had lost everything. The cost of one of their boxes is £590. FROM OUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR

By now you may already be aware that the current Conservative administration is proposing a 4.99% increase in Council Tax in Cornwall for next year. This is the maximum amount allowed by the government, who fully expect local authorities to adopt this increase in addition to any central government grants in order to maintain public services.

It will provide the Council with around an extra £15M, but this needs to be considered within the context of the extra demand for Adult and Children's Care which alone will require around £26M.

Social Care is rarely out of the news these days and the knock-on effect in our hospitals and ambulance response times is well documented with phrases such as "bed blocking" and "delayed discharges" now common on the local news. Ever since I was elected in 2016, we have continually underfunded and under appreciated this vital service and the carers on whom many people rely for day-to-day compassion and care.

As the Local Government Association has recently put in a letter to the Secretary of State for Health and Social Care: "Much of the recent narrative on social care suggests that it exists solely to ease pressure on the NHS and is failing to do its job. However, social care is an essential service in its own right and needs to be valued equally as highly as the NHS."

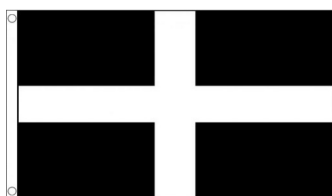
Sadly, I fear that this is a problem that can no longer be fixed by simply improving the funding to local authorities. It is the pay and conditions of the work-force that need to be seriously addressed to attract the next generation of carers who will replace those who have left the vocation for better-paid work or to return to their home countries as a direct result of Brexit. Nationally the Lib Dems have called for a £2 an hour increase in the minimum wage for carers and this is something I would support as a first step.

I call it a vocation deliberately. Not because I feel that the work itself should be reward enough, but because it remains a job which should and needs to be recognised much more as a profession with clear development and progression for employees.

The gates are neither attractive nor fit for our current village community and I would encourage everyone to support their removal and replacement with a user-friendly option at either end of the path.

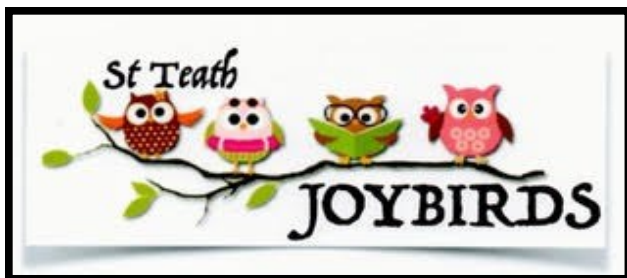

St. Teath JOYBIRDS are a group of about 35 women from the village and immediate surrounds who get together on the second Friday of each month in the Church Hall at 2.30pm. (The name came from a Concert Party, formed in the village about 70 years ago who visited local villages to give performances.)

The subscription is £22 for the year, and we charge £1 entry each month which covers tea, coffee, biscuits and a raffle ticket giving you the chance to win £5.

THE JOYBIRDS IN FEBRUARY

A fascinating and informative talk was given by two members of the RNLI from the Rock Inshore Lifeboat. Their training was explained in great detail and included their recounting the realistic, very large, very cold pool where storm conditions can be experienced. Into this they are expected to jump (and not always in their professional attire either), turn their lifeboat over, right it again and perform other necessary exercises. They can also simulate the down-draught from a helicopter to intensify the difficulty of their tasks, but it all adds to the real-life experiences they will face.

We heard how the paging system works, how many people are involved with using and looking after the lifeboat and how they interact with the coastguards, helicopters and the larger Padstow Lifeboat.

Finally we were shown how they don their amazingly warm, waterproof, made-to-measure clothing and flotation aids. They are issued with the best equipment and garments available, including helmets, the linings of which are inflated to hug their heads giving comfort and warmth.

All this and the RNLI receives no Government funding - the men and women risk their lives rescuing people in difficult and dangerous circumstances and they rely entirely on charitable donations from the public. We were in awe of their work and dedication and our members were happy to contribute towards a generous donation for the RNLI.

PAUSE FOR THOUGHT

Since the retirement of the rector, Rev. Angela Cooper, this benefice which includes the churches of St. Teath, Delabole, Advent, Lanteglos and Camelford, has no full time stipendiary Rector.

Whilst we were sad to see Angela leave, the Church in Cornwall has been undergoing substantial changes, resulting in an exciting prospect for the future in our Benefice. We will not be seeking a like for like replacement for Angela but someone who will combine the roles of Rector and pioneer minister to reach out to the more deprived parts of our communities in Camelford and Delabole.

We are also one of the first areas in Cornwall to have a part time parish nurse combining the roles of qualified nurse and ordained priest. We are delighted to welcome Rev. Geraldine Ashton to our team. Whilst her work as a parish nurse will be focused on the poorer communities of Camelford and Delabole, she will assist with the taking of services from time to time in all the churches.

Geraldine is in the process of completing four years as a curate in training and writes:

"Whilst some curates have always been sure of their calling as a Parish Priest, I have never really known where I would end up, being both a nurse and a priest. Then I was invited to consider a role as parish nurse in Bodmin, Camelford and Delabole. Parish nurses are registered nurses, trained and accredited by Parish Nurse Ministries UK and validated by the Nursing and Midwifery Council. The service focuses on holistic health, wellbeing, healing and targeting the needs of the local community and is inclusive of all faiths and none.

"Parish nursing is a community-based service, promoting health and extra healthcare to support people in times of need. They do not give medical treatments or direct nursing care and they do not replace NHS, local authority nurses or services or specialist nursing charities such as the Macmillan nurses. Neither do they preach or convert people! They do offer health education, health screening, health support, spiritual care and support at the end of life.

"Since the pandemic, there has been so much change and stress on healthcare services, I hope that parish nursing in Cornwall will flourish. Please do not hesitate to contact me on gezzalou@aol.com if you would like to know more about Parish Nursing Ministries or see <https://parishnursing.org.uk>."

Rev. Geraldine's appointment is being funded by the Low Income Communities Fund following a grant to the Diocese of Truro by the Church Commissioner,. Her appointment emphasises that our Benefice has, as Geraldine puts it, "a vision and mission to reach out into the community".

We wish her well and pray that God will bless her work here among us.

A METHODIST MINISTER'S VIEW

I am one who stills buys a weekly local newspaper, although I have to acknowledge that I do not find the content to be as interesting as I once did. It seems to me that the quality of our local papers has decreased in recent years. One of the columns which I always look at is the one written by one of our Cornish Members of Parliament, who seem to have a rota for contributing. In recent months these columns seem to have been written from the point of view of what the contributors think they have achieved, or what their party has announced that is in their opinion positive. Not once have I seen a contribution which deals with the things which are at the heart of our current range of issues or expresses a personal opinion on them.

When this article appears in print, we will be in the season of Lent which in some traditions is associated with a period of fasting as part of preparing oneself to celebrate at Easter. Shrove Tuesday, or Pancake Day as we refer to it, was the day for eating up the meat, eggs and cream in the household prior to the 'fasting' weeks.

The reason for the 'fasting' in the season of Lent was to enable people to focus their minds on the significance of the Crucifixion and Resurrection of Jesus which we remember on Good Friday and Easter Day. Without the death and resurrection of Jesus, the Christian Church and Christian movement would not have had the impact in our history and the lives of people which it has had, and indeed, still does. Although some people find it difficult to think too much about the Crucifixion, but are happy to celebrate the Resurrection, they are at the heart of our Christian belief and were God's way of dealing with things which are at the heart of our situation as human beings.

Through the Crucifixion God offers us the opportunity of knowing ourselves to be 'not guilty' before him, in being forgiven for our wrongdoing and shortcomings, because of his love and concern for us. Through the Resurrection we have the promise of knowing ourselves to be trying to live in the heavenly way both now and for all time with the help of the Holy Spirit. We are afforded the opportunity of knowing ourselves to be right with God and having a purpose for living. Jesus once said (John 10, verse 10) *"I have come in order that you might have life - life in all its fullness."* It is good to ponder what all this means for us.

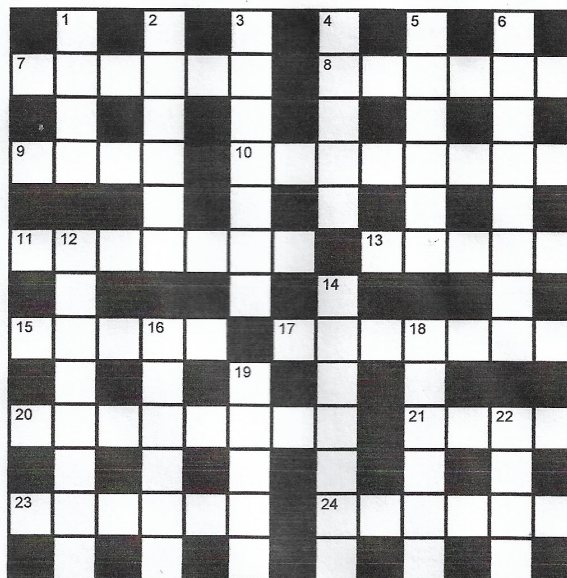
