

### ST TEATH'S COMMUNITY CENTRE

How many of you realise, as you sit enjoying a drink and chat among friends in the Community Centre that people in the reign of Henry VIII, 500 years ago, were doing the same thing within these very same walls? In those days it was known as a Church House where ale was brewed and where feasting, funeral wakes, plays, meetings and social events of all kinds took place.

When Oliver Cromwell came to power about a hundred years later, ale was prohibited and the building was turned into a very early form of school – probably a Dame School, a small private school presided over by a School Mistress. The upper floor continued to be used in this way for the education of the sons of farmers well into the 1800s, when fireplaces were added to the ground floor, converting it to a Victorian Workhouse and providing a home for the poor of the parish.

During the last century this stalwart little building was reputedly used as a home for unmarried mothers, and then as a Men's Institute, (dozens of certificates from this time for cockfighting champion-ships festooned the beams before the restoration) while also being used for, among other things, a carpenter's workshop and a barber's shop (although never, as far as I know, as a Sex & Massage Parlour—see photo opposite)

By 1980 the state of the building's ground floor was such that it could not be used for anything other than a storeroom, but the upper floor still provided recreation activities for the men of the village, principally snooker and darts. At this time a group of far-sighted and enterprising villagers got together to form an association with the aim of purchasing the building from the Church and converting it into a "Community Centre for recreation, meetings and social gatherings for the benefit of the inhabitants of St Teath and the neighbourhood". In other words this ancient building was to be restored to its original use all those centuries ago - but regrettably without the brewing of ale.

Negotiations over the next five years then countless hours of labour by a small group of dedicated volunteers (pictured opposite) resulted in the beautifully renovated and restored building we have today. Since the official opening in 1987 (Photo opposite) successive groups of volunteers have worked together as a management committee to handle the day-to-day running of the Centre, which has always been a popular venue for Coffee Mornings, sales, fundraisers of all kinds, birthday parties, Christmas celebrations, anniversaries, yoga classes, art lessons, wakes, meetings and much more.

Recently the huge increase in the cost of electricity forced the present Committee to review the way the Centre is used and work out ways to cover this. A public meeting was held in order to ascertain the amount of support there was for the continued use of the Snooker Room and how much income could be guaranteed from the players. A well-attended, stormy meeting ensued where strong feelings were expressed by both sides. (A record of the meeting and the proposals put forward appears on page 4, followed by a letter to the editor from one of the Centre's trustees on page 5).

The story of this supremely resilient, historic building shows how its survival has always depended on its ability to adapt and change with the times. Perhaps now is the moment to consider new ways to make the most of this cherished village amenity. One possibility the Committee is considering is to open the Centre during the winter to provide families with young children and/or the elderly with a warm haven where they can sit and chat or read a newspaper, thereby saving on their home's electricity bills.

At the forthcoming **AGM on November 9**<sup>th</sup> (see the Agenda on page 5) members of the Committee, all of whom have served for several years, will not be standing for re-election, and we encourage readers to attend the meeting and consider volunteering to serve our community in this very important and worthwhile role, taking our unique Community Centre forward into the future.



# PUBLIC CONSULTATION re ST TEATH SNOOKER WED 17th August 2022

The meeting was called by the Management Committee **(MC)** to find a way forward in view of rising costs incurred in running the Community Centre. The hiring charge for the downstairs room has risen from £12 to £15 per session. Hirers also have to pay to use wall heaters as only background heat is provided by one storage heater. The snooker players were also asked to pay more. Many attended the meeting. Agendas were distributed.

## THE AGENDA LISTED THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE'S PROPOSALS:

- 1) That the snooker players pay an increased amount, £900, from Nov 2022 AGM for the use of the snooker room for a year. (approx £26 per year per player). This is towards the costs of electricity, insurance, cleaning, and water. This amount to be reviewed at the AGM in 2023.
- 2) That a representative of snooker should be on the MC. and attend the AGM.
- 3.) That a list of players be posted in the Snooker room. For circulating information.
- 4.) That the old storage heaters upstairs (2) and downstairs (1) are replaced with more efficient thermostatically controlled 24 hour heaters, paid for by the M.C.
- 5.) That the lighting upstairs is replaced with LED instead of strip lights paid for by the M.C.
- 6.) That the key to the snooker room is put in a keysafe on the door of the snooker room and paid-up members given the combination, paid for by the M.C.
- 7.) That the present 'token in the slot meter' be replaced with a different method of payment.

### SUMMARY OF MEETING.

As questions had previously been asked about how the snooker money was being used, a list of relevant costings was distributed. A verbal account of income and expenditure for the year 1st June '21 to 31st May '22 was given. This indicated that without a further source of income the Centre is running at a loss. Full accounts will be presented at the AGM.

**NEW HEATERS AND LIGHTING** Further quotes are being obtained for upgrades to the heating and lighting upstairs. If this can be done more cheaply than a quote already received by the M.C. it might be possible to reduce the sum asked for from the players.

**MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE REPRESENTATIVE** Although there were 34 people who were paid-up players there is actually no Snooker Club as such. It made having a representative on the committee difficult. Finally 2 gentlemen volunteered who both play snooker. They will be informed of the next MC meeting. The MC asked that at least one snooker representative should attend the AGM in November.

**KEYSAFE ON SNOOKER ROOM ENTRANCE DOOR** Proposed and seconded to fit a coded lock with a digital pad. Proposal carried unanimously.

MONEY-IN-SLOT METER This was approved generally. Details must be ironed out.

# **FURTHER COMMENTS FROM THE FLOOR**

- 1 ) That a Just giving page be set up for donations. This was accepted as a good idea.
- **2**.) That a 3 tariff option be considered when the electric contract runs out. It is the usual day/night plus weekends.
- **3**.) A few present objected to the forthright advertising of the event. Apologies were given to anyone upset by this. The M.C. explained that unless the situation had been forcibly presented no-one would have paid any attention— as has been indisputably demonstrated over many years.

There was no more business.

# LETTER TO THE EDITORS

# **Re: Community Centre Meeting**

I wonder if I was the only person in attendance on Wednesday 17<sup>th</sup> August who felt distinctly uncomfortable with the way the meeting unfolded. It would be an understatement to say that the meeting was bad-tempered, accusatory and full of bad feeling and suspicion – and an atmosphere such as that does not foster improvements and positive change.

The Community Centre is one of the public buildings at the heart of village life and is important historically and socially. All credit must go to the dedicated band of people who restored it so well so many years ago, and grateful thanks must be passed on also to those who have freely given of their time and expertise more recently.

In view of these things, it is particularly sad to see a village such as St Teath, a village that prides itself on its community spirit and generosity, fall into a trap based on misunderstandings and missed opportunities. Had the group that play snooker been able to provide a voice on the Management Committee long before now, and had the Management Committee members been better able to demonstrate their commendable intention to provide cheaper and more effective heating and lighting for the Snooker Room, then the whole sorry business could have been avoided.

What is very hard to understand is the animosity between two groups of people who basically want the same thing, i.e., that the Community Centre, in its entirety, should flourish in the future. It's my belief that no volunteer, competent or incompetent, efficient or inefficient, should be subjected to the level of abuse and antipathy that was evident that evening. Let's hope that differences can be mended, and the future approached with a greater sense of united purpose.

# FROM OUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR

September saw us with a new Prime Minister, and then in very short order a new King with the sad passing of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. Naturally, lots of planned meetings for Cornwall Council and Parish Councils were postponed as a mark of respect, in order to give people the time and space to mourn and reflect upon a reign like no other. As someone who has lost a parent, I hope that the Royal Family took some comfort from the fact that she passed away comfortably at home with some of her children by her side, and that she was active in both mind and body to the end.

Whilst this is undoubtedly the end of an era, it is also, as the throne passes seamlessly to King Charles, the beginning of one. By chance, I had the honour of meeting the then Prince Charles when he visited Boscastle a few years ago. The Cabinet member who was supposed to meet him couldn't make it and I was a last-minute substitute. As I waited in a small courtyard at the back of the Visitor Centre, he surprised me by coming out of the building alone with his arm outstretched. We then had a conversation about our shared interest in organic farming and it was all very informal and enjoyable. He is a thoughtful man who has been ahead of his time with concerns around the environment and climate change and although I have no doubt his future role will constrain his views in public, nobody who meets him will be in any doubt as to his convictions and beliefs in this area.

Our new Prime Minister also faces some extremely serious challenges and I hope that by the time you read this, details of meaningful support for both residents and local businesses over energy prices will have been rolled out to help see us through an incredibly challenging winter. During the summer, she showed an understanding of the crisis in Social Care and its impact on delaying discharges from hospitals. She made pledges to properly fund appropriate levels of support. allowing more people to live with some independence in their own homes. This would indeed be a very positive step forward for Cornwall.

As the cost-of-living crisis deepens I want to make residents aware of a funding scheme available from the Council to help tenants of private landlords to stay in their homes if threatened with eviction. The scheme was initially run as a pilot project in Dec 2021 and through Citizens Advice Cornwall it has helped over 40 households to remain in their homes and avoid homelessness. Additional funds have now been secured to extend the scheme over this winter until March 2023. The scheme is open to both landlords who are thinking about serving notice due to rent arrears, as well as tenants at risk.

Citizens Advice Cornwall will work with tenants and landlords on a case-by-case basis looking at the reason for the arrears and provide advice and assistance to support them in sustaining their tenancy. In exchange for addressing the arrears and providing support, landlords will then be expected to allow renters to remain in the properties for up to 12 months after they have been given assistance. So far, the scheme has been able to assist in various situations from arrears caused by loss of work or sickness, to increasing debt and fuel poverty. The importance of keeping people if possible in their properties close to their social, work and support networks, cannot be overstated.
