A Methodist Minister's View

In late October, I overheard a man saying that he did not want to think about Christmas until 1st December. Some might say that the comment represents a man's view of Christmas. In the television magazines produced for this Christmas, you will doubtless find advertisements for savings schemes to help you plan for Christmas 2024.

Christmas is important for various people in differing ways. I recall a bookshop owner telling me that Christmas was important for him because his seasonal sales account for one-third of his profits for the year. For other traders, Christmas is the focus of their commercial organisation – just think of the number of businesses that produce and sell only Christmas goods.

It raises the question in my mind as to what does Christmas really mean for each of us individually?

It is possible for us to become so involved with various aspects of Christmas preparations that we lose sight of the things that are the real reason for the season.

The tragedy for Christmas 2023 is that the countries in which the Christmas celebrations all started are engaged in conflict. I wonder what will be happening in Bethlehem at Christmas this year. This is a sobering thought as we share in celebrating the Christmas story through our family gatherings, Nativity plays and carol services.

Two members of the Iona Community in Scotland, John Bell and Graham Maule, cause us to think about the real meaning of Christmas in a carol they wrote to the tune of Scarlet Ribbons. I quote the first verse from our newest Methodist collection of hymns, Singing the Faith:


Who would think that what was needed
To transform and save the earth
Might not be a plan or army,
Proud in purpose, proved in worth?
Who would think, despite derision,
That a child might lead the way?
God surprises earth with heaven,
Coming here on Christmas Day.

At its heart, Christmas is about God's love, care and concern for all of us, shown in his sending of Jesus amongst us — God sending his Son to share our human life and enabling us to learn of His way for each of us.

County Council

Without doubt 2023 has been another very difficult year. Nationally, we can only hope interest rates have now peaked and inflation remains on a downward trend. However, these historically high fuel and food prices are now baked in, the steep rise in interest rates over 2023 have yet to work their way through all households' mortgages, and rents have climbed well beyond affordability for most working families.

Internationally, the war in Ukraine is rapidly approaching its third year and the unrelenting horrors of the current conflict in Israel and Gaza are constantly relayed through our phones and televisions daily — leaving one feeling quite helpless in the face of such senseless inhumanity. I sincerely hope that by the time you are reading this, some progress towards a cessation of the violence and a political solution is starting to take place.

Locally we continue to lose vital rural services such as village shops, post offices, bus routes and banks, and access to health and social care remains very challenging — with our local NHS continuing to work under considerable pressure.

Where I find most hope is within the strength of our local communities. All the parishes I represent now have very strong, proactive Parish Councils and, in turn, I know that they support a wide range of community groups.

As we approach the new year, our Parish Councils will be debating their precept on the Council Tax. The amount that the parish receives is only around 3% of your total Council Tax bill, and for my money this element provides the best return for residents, with all of it being spent on services within your parish.

These are not easy decisions for local Councillors, and I hope you will support them in any increase that they might decide is necessary. As other public and private bodies withdraw from rural areas, they are best placed to support community groups and villages to help themselves.

Lastly, I hope you all find time to spend with your immediate and extended families over the Christmas and New Year period, and enjoy the many community events and displays of lights that have always been such a hallmark of life in our area. There is an awful lot to be thankful for in our special slice of North Cornwall.

Parish Council

Clocktower Window Designs Decided

Just over 100 people either turned up, or sent representation, to vote for their choice of window design planned as part of the refurbishment works for the Clocktower in the new year: the new coloured glass option being the most favoured choice.

The public ballot, held in the Community Centre, which was open to everyone who lives in the village irrespective of age, received 72 votes for incorporating new, stained glass designs, whilst 21 opted to stay with refurbished opaque glass as the Clocktower currently has.

The new stained glass designs come as a pair: with the window above the memorial depicting poppies representing those who fell serving our country. The window facing Central House incorporates images which relate to our village's history, heritage and position in North Cornwall.

Work, which is being funded by a very generous donation from a local resident, will begin on the refurbishment in April next year — when the weather is milder. In the meantime, the Parish Council will be working with a local stained glass specialist to start creating the new windows.

Community Sparks Fund Update

The Parish Council was delighted to receive a strong collection of Community Sparks applications for funding in next year's budget and has agreed grants for eight local groups.

In addition, the Parish Council agreed to fund the ongoing provision of WiFi in the Community Centre, so that everyone using the venue is able to use it effectively.

Next year's Community Sparks Fund will open in August 2024 with applications to be in by 30 September 2024. All organisations and local community groups based in the village are able to submit funding requests for the Parish Council to consider.



Join us as we use coloured tissue paper to make our very own stained glass windows.



Some of us are fed up with it before the festive season starts, especially when we have seen tables groaning with food; extended, well-dressed families coming together, laughing, hugging, having a great time; parties with loads of food, champagne and fun; perfect trees surrounded by stacks of beautifully wrapped presents. When the shops we visit push Christmas as a time to spend, spend, and all around are visions of a 'Happy Christmas'.

What about reality, though? What about those who cannot, will not, perhaps again, have a 'Happy Christmas'? 
Friends, that is not the reason for the season, God's gift is, and it really is Good News:
