Anne was a member of the St Teath W.I. from about 1995 (the W.I. preceded the Joybirds) and was involved in many activities including helping with the scrapbook records, taking notes at the meetings to report in the Timepiece and posting W.I. events in the village.

Many will remember that she took part in the 'Beating of the Bounds' of St Teath and gave riveting accounts of the history of the village at some of our meetings. If anyone wanted to know anything about the history of St Teath, we asked Anne. Others will remember Anne always sitting at the door of any village event selling tickets - always 'front of house'.

To sum up, in the words of one of our members "She was a fount of knowledge which she delivered in a very informal way. She had such an unassuming nature and was a friend to everyone."

A Methodist Minister's View

As I started thinking about my November contribution to this magazine we were hearing news of the floods in the city of Derna in Libya. Floods caused by the collapse of two dams which had not been properly maintained, causing the deaths of many people. Apparently, there have been rival administrations in Libya over the last 10 years or so hence some matters have not been properly attended to. You can probably recall the television and newspaper images which for me were reminders of pictures I have seen of some of the World War II damage in some of our English towns and cities.

The damage arises from human conflict. In early October we had further examples of the cost of human conflict. I am thinking of one of the missile strikes on a village in Ukraine when 50 people out of the population of 500 lost their lives. Seeing the rescue work taking place was harrowing and was preceded by warnings by the television presenters to that effect. The breakout of conflict between Israel and the Hamas in the Gaza Strip was just as alarming and harrowing to view. In this situation there were more than 1,000 deaths in 24 hours including 250 young people attending a Music Festival.

I mention all of this because one of the important periods in November is the Remembrance Weekend which this year is on Saturday 11th and Sunday 12th. At this time, we are caused to think of those who lost their lives in two World Wars and in other conflicts since. I hope that it is also a time of recalling the costs of human conflict over the years through to comparably recent times in order that we become advocates of Peace and encouragers of 'Peace Making' and Peace Initiatives'.

One of Jesus' Be-autitudes (beautitudes) is translated for us in the Good News version of the Bible as 'Happy are those who work for peace', God will call them his children'. (Matthew 5:9).

We can all have a part in 'peace-making' and praying for peace in our time and peace initiatives in the current conflict situations.

Anne

I stared at a blank screen. How do you describe Anne? Lots of words came to mind but none of them were right. Then I received a text message from a lovely friend: "She was a diamond". Problem solved. For Anne was indeed a diamond - sparkling, multi faceted, unique, irreplaceable, an absolute gem.

So many messages, so many emails, everyone was stunned. Not Anne. She was always there, always smiling, always involved, always supportive. I couldn't believe it either.

They were not just messages of sympathy. Everyone felt a personal loss, for Anne touched so many lives. From the time she arrived here more than 50 years ago, she loved this village and devoted much of her time to community life: The Village Show, the Community Bus, the school, the Community Centre, Joybirds, the Village Lunch, Coffee Corner in Wadebridge and, of course, Timepiece - forgive me if I don't list them all.

I can think of very few people whose loss has had such an impact on the village. A Derbyshire girl, who had lived in London and LA, she had travelled all over the world, and yet St Teath was the centre of her life. As she told me so many times, this was the best place in the world to live. She couldn't understand why people needed to go away on holiday when everything they needed was here.

Anne was always a glass three quarters full person but if she did have a bleak moment, relief came from her daily walks. She would just stand, gazing around her and gaining inner strength from the countryside she knew so well and loved so much.

First and foremost, the most important thing in her life was her family: Tanya, her mainstay, of whom she was so proud, and Phil, "the perfect son-in-law", Zoran, Tasha and Andrew and her beloved grandchildren, Chloe and Jay. They were not just grandchildren, they were her friends. She was so grateful for all the time they spent with her and was so very proud of their achievements.

For me, Elaine, Pat, Diana and many more, she was a very special friend. We talked for hours, emailing constantly if we couldn't meet. So intelligent, she had views on anything and everything. Just don't mention politics! She had strong opinions and, although she was rarely angry, that anger verged on the apoplectic at the mention of some decisions made in Downing Street and Whitehall.

We shared a love of the same things - Shakespeare, the theatre, reading. She was always there for me, she never failed me. She was also on hand with advice. She was still trying to convert me to stoicism and an interest in philosophy when we last met in August. We were both writers but she was the gifted one - children's stories, written with Tanya, the unique book about St Teath and the textbooks focusing on teaching English which have been so widely used around the world.

She despaired of me whenever I admitted I said "yes" to helping at some event or other. "Not again! What did I tell you about saying no?" But she always came to help, always my right hand, knowing how I liked things done, unfailingly supportive and caring. She always said she was useless at things like that but Anne, you were incredible. We were a double act, now what do I do?

Somehow we have to move on. It is hard for all of us but far worse for her family. The next weeks and months are going to be so difficult but I hope they know that we are all supporting them and will do anything we can to help.

Anne always said no-one was irreplaceable. For once she was wrong.

There is a void in St Teath which will never be filled.

The Indian Summer in October may well have helped many delay the point where they need to turn their heating on – but this will only be a brief respite in a cost-of-living crisis which is now entering a second winter. Whilst the headline inflation rate may now be gradually reducing, it is still well beyond the government target of 2% per year and the dramatic increases in food and fuel prices over the last year are now "baked in" and we must expect them to be the new norm.

All this means that this winter, energy prices will actually be higher for most of the population, as support is now only targeted to the most vulnerable. Food prices will remain at all-time highs, and all at a time when rents and mortgages are increasing.

If you are struggling, there is a lot of good advice available on the Cornwall Council website:

Aside from this, another important safety net is Citizens Advice Cornwall who offer free, independent advice to anyone to help solve their problems and improve their lives – from consumer issues to problems at work, and from benefit applications to debt relief and homelessness.

They currently have an office in Bodmin in the Shire House which is open on Tuesdays between 10 am -11.30 am and are hoping to open a regular office in Bude in the near future. They also have a couple of free phone lines on 0800 144 8848 and on 0800 240 4420 which is specifically for debt advice.

They have seen demand for their services rise dramatically since the pandemic with Universal Credit, family breakdowns and fuel debt common themes and with compassion and empathy they help thousands of people across our county every year.

If you are in a more fortunate position financially and can spare one or two days a week you might consider volunteering with Citizens Advice Cornwall and making a real and positive impact on the lives of people in our area. There is full and continuous training and support available, and with enough volunteers it might even be possible to open a hub in North Cornwall so that our residents do not have so far to travel.




St Teath Rubbish Ramblers



The primary school will make sure the grotto is ready for local children to meet Santa and there will be a hog roast in The Square.


As well as stalls and refreshments in the Church Hall, the cafe will be open for food and hot drinks to keep you warm on a chilly winter's evening.


Raffle tickets are available in the cafe now or you can buy them on the night before the Big Draw.

Before the switching on, there will be two fundraisers for the lights:







New Parish Nursing Service in Camelford Starting 18th October 2023







The service is a professional one; parish nurses are registered nurses who are trained and accredited by Parish Nurse Ministries UK and validated by the Nursing and Midwifery Council and the Royal College of Nursing. The service is set up and run by a registered nurse who is a Christian, focusing on wholistic health, wellbeing, and healing, who targets the health needs of the local community and is inclusive of all faiths and none.

Parish Nursing sits within the existing wider healthcare system between primary care and family-based personal healthcare and is a community-based service which promotes health and extra healthcare to support people in times of need.

Parish Nurses do not give medical treatments or direct nursing care and they do not replace NHS, local authority nurses or services or specialist nursing charities such as MacMillan nurses. Neither do they preach or convert people. However, they do offer health education, health screening, health support, spiritual care, and support at the end of life.

Why set up a service like this now? Timing is everything and since the pandemic there has been so much change and stresses on healthcare services. The hope is that parish nursing in Cornwall will grow & flourish, bless the local primary care services, the churches and the local communities.

To date it has been welcomed and used by many of the local community who have found it invaluable and have given good feedback.

The Churches within the Camel-Allen Cluster are setting up a Health and Wellbeing Hub at St Thomas' Church in Camelford. The Hub will run every Wednesday afternoon from 1pm till 4pm from 18th October and amongst other things will include the Parish Nurse Drop-in clinics, refreshments and visits from other health and wellbeing agencies.


