FROM OUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR

Cornwall Council are inviting comments on proposals to implement a road improvement for the A39 Atlantic Highway to provide a bypass to Camelford.

The proposed improvement to Camelford aims to remove the through traffic from the A39, where it passes through Camelford, by providing a new road passing to the west of the town.

The new road will join the A39 to the south of the town to the A39 north of the town and have a number of benefits including;

Reduce congestion within Camelford especially during the summer tourist season

Remove HGVs from Camelford.

Improve air quality within Camelford.

Improve the centre of Camelford to make it a more vibrant community hub that will encourage residents and tourists to visit, shop, carry out business, and socialise within the town.

Improve the north south journey time along the A39 corridor.

Improve connectivity for non-car users by enhancing the provision for pedestrian, cyclists and equestrians around Camelford.

Environmental enhancement including new woodlands. Build on legacy of Environmental Growth projects.

Encourage investment in Camelford and along the A39 corridor

Reduce accidents on existing road network

TYLER'S STORY

January 15th 2018 was the day our world got turned upside down. It was the day our 5-year-old son, Tyler was diagnosed with Type 1 Diabetes. The next three days in Treliske were a scary, uncertain time as we, as parents, tried to process all the information about highs, lows,ketones, carbs and insulin ratios, as well as our own emotions thinking our little boy would have to live his life full of injections, finger pricks, blood tests and no more sweets or chocolate. There were many tears, screams and struggles each time Tyler had to have an injection or blood test.



On the third day we were allowed to take Tyler home with all the medication and supplies to keep him alive. It was a huge responsibility. Leaving the security of the nurses and doctors we actually had to take our son home and keep him safe. We felt very nervous. Over the next few days Tyler still struggled with the injections and we just muddled through. We needed something positive to focus on. JDRF, a charity specifically for children with Type 1 Diabetes, supported us during Tyler's diagnoses and they also lead research to find the latest technology and eventually, we hope, a cure.

I decided to apply for a place with JDRF in the 2018 London Marathon and to my horror was granted a place! With only 12 weeks to go until race day I had some serious training to do and serious money to raise. Luckily friends and family got behind us to make sure this happened. Our dear friend, Kerri offered us the café to host *Tyler's Coffee Morning*, which was a huge success. This together with the Just Giving page raised a staggering £3,405. The Marathon was hard and hot but it was fantastic to throw all our energy into something positive, knowing it would benefit Tyler's future and one day, hopefully, find him a cure.

In 2019 we held another *Tyler's Coffee Morning* and I ran for JDRF in the Brighton Marathon and the Great North Run. We raised another £1,445 and we were so grateful for the way the



village came together once again for Tyler and gave us such overwhelming support. At the end of the Carnival we held *Tyler's Big Breakfast* in the marquee and raised a further £1,050.

Tyler has a Dexcom, a device fitted to his arm that reads his glucose levels every 5 minutes and sends it to an app on the phone, so no more finger pricks and he now has an Omnipod, another little device which delivers his insulin, so no more injections! We can't describe the sense of relief this has brought to us as a family. Tyler now throws himself into everything, playing cricket and football and is becoming so much more confident in managing his own diabetes.

Our 3rd annual *Tyler's Coffee Morning*, held in the Church Hall on March 8th received a huge amount of support and raised £1,100, bringing the total raised in just over two years to a massive £7,000! Andy and I would like to say a HUGE thank you to each and every one of you that baked a cake, showed your support, donated and came along to a Coffee Morning or Breakfast. We will always be so grateful and it's down to you that Tyler's future is looking so bright!

The Vine are offering a FREE delivery service of vegetables to your door, Kerri has plans to help with takeaway meals etc. and Lynne at the Shop is setting up a delivery service too.

Whilst it seems harsh to take away our liberty, we are not alone, all over the world people are going into self-isolation, let us take comfort that we live in a caring and supportive community where we all help one another. In the meantime, please take care and stay safe and we look forward to welcoming everyone again when all this is behind us and we can have a big celebratory party.

The Joybirds were treated to an illustrated talk by Yvonne on *How the Other Half Live*. And how they live! Yvonne has led a fascinating life and was heavily involved with the Girl Guides (politically incorrect name probably). Her Guides, accompanied by a few adults, travelled extensively to poor countries in the Southern Hemisphere to help build homes and teach crafts and other skills to cultures completely different from our own. We saw a brief

snapshot - a representative sample of 100 from the 1,000 images that Yvonne has - that best described *How the other half Live*.

It was fascinating to see both inside and out of houses in Mexico – and the innovative people who use anything and everything to good effect: such as the tops of coca-cola bottles for washers to stop rain ingress from the screws holding what looked like entire houses built of wooden crates together; and electricity 'borrowed' from richer neighbours by tapping into their lines with 'spiders' (thin wires which they run from the electric poles into their own houses). The talk continued through India and Kenya, where houses were roofed using tin cans, with the food contents eaten, the top and tail removed and then hammered flat into tiles. Finally we saw orphanages and hospitals in South Africa and the work done there by the church. All in all, a real eye-opener!

Lynne thanked Yvonne for an interesting insight into life lived in other parts of the world. She also thanked all those who had helped make the Joybirds' Australian Bacon Butty morning and, more latterly, the Trelawny 'Shout' such successful undertakings.

Next month nothing definite has been arranged, as it was felt that with the ongoing health crisis it is better not to try to plan too far ahead. The committee will keep in touch with all members. Keep safe and well.

A METHODIST MINISTER'S VIEW

We are living in unprecedented times with the World in turmoil because of the Coronavirus pandemic. As I write this in mid-March it is difficult to see how things are going to work out for us over the coming weeks which include Mothering Sunday and Easter. I imagine that all of us feel trepidatious about the coming days and increasingly it seems we will be restricted in differing ways. I cannot ever remember a time for instance when all professional sport was stopped and air links between some Countries brought to a halt. We live in a 'Worldwide Village' in the normal everyday life of travel, trade and communication. Solutions will need to be found for the way forward for some of our supplies such as food and medicines, let along the reliance of industry on parts coming from differing parts of the World. It all looks a bit worrying.

However, some things in our local communities are heartening – I have heard of three of our local businesses who are offering to deliver goods. Already new possibilities are opening up so be encouraged amidst the chaos.

As I was thinking these things through, I was drawn to Psalm 46 in our Bibles. These words have been around for many years and have inspired some of our hymn writers. Martin Luther's hymn, "A safe stronghold our God is still", written in 1529 has been translated into 183 languages, and a contemporary hymn written anonymously is based on the closing verses of the Psalm. The three verses are of three repeated lines which are: -

- !. Be still and know that I am God
- 2. I am the Lord that healeth thee
- 3. In Thee, O Lord, I put my trust.

Richard Bewes hymn 'God is our strength and refuge, our present help in trouble' sung to the Dambusters March is also based on the Psalm. The closing verses of the Psalm from the 'Message' translation of the Psalm are helpful where it is written —

Attention, all! See the marvels of God!

He plants flower and trees all over the earth.....

Step out of the traffic! Take a long loving
Look at me, Your High God, above politics,

Above everything.

Jacob-wrestling God fights for us,
God of Angel armies protects us.

Let these words encourage us all at this difficult time. In the midst of it all I hope that Easter is the best that it can be for you.

ST TEATH PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Parish Council Vacancy - The Parish Council were pleased with the response and interest shown in the recent vacancy for the Delabole ward, and welcome Mandy Upsall who was co-opted at the March meeting. Mandy will join us for her first meeting in April.

Housing Need Survey – The closing date for the consultation for the housing needs survey finished on the 10th March 2020. Thank you to everyone who responded online or returned their response by post. By the time the newsletter is printed the result should have been sent to the Parish Council, Ward Member and published on the Cornwall Council website.

Governance Review – The Cornwall Council Governance Review panel are now concluding their recommendations as the process has now gone through Stage 3 of the consultation and the final public meeting in Wadebridge was held on the 27th February. It appears that the parish of St Teath will split from the elections in May 2021 and Delabole will become a parish of its own. There is much work to be done to finalise the new parish boundaries, number of councillors and the legal and admin process. If you have any questions or concerns please do not hesitate to get in touch.

Parish Seats – We have over 30 seats throughout the parish that are maintained by the Parish Council. Three are to be replaced owing to their deterioration over the years and these will hopefully be in place over the next few weeks.

Delabole Millennium Clock – The clock has been repaired and is now telling the correct time. A new electric mechanism has been installed that should prevent any further problems. However, if there is a power cut, the clock will restart exactly twelve hours after the time it stopped.

Traffic calming – Over the past three years, Cllr Dominic Fairman has worked with Cornwall Council to design traffic calming schemes for both villages. Funding is one of the main issues why these schemes have not been implemented, but we remain hopeful that proposals for Delabole will move forward as soon as possible.

By now you will all have noticed that our new Community Bus arrived in the village on the 24th March. Hopefully it will give us many happy trips to Truro, Wadebridge and beyond.

Please remember that the Community Bus is now entered in the Green Token Community Scheme at Asda in Bodmin. Please vote for us if you are shopping there.

Remember that the bus cannot accommodate bulky items: this applies to all items carried by all passengers. It is essential, for safety's sake that the doors to the rear of the bus are kept clear at all times. We ask that you do not put our drivers in a difficult position by attempting to carry unsuitable items on the bus. Thank you for your understanding.

We respectfully ask **all** passengers to queue for our Community Bus at the bus stop outside the White Hart. Please do not wait next to the bus in the car park.

The bus is available for private hire by local organisations and private individuals but we respectfully remind anyone hiring the bus that they are responsible for settling the cost of any penalties incurred during their period of hire. Please note: to hire the bus the driver must have a D1 permission to drive on his/her licence. The bus is **not** available for hire to commercial organisations. For any bus enquiries other than bookings, please phone Mandy Woods on 01208 851346.

Any passengers on the regular Friday run wishing to visit Tesco, Aldi or Wadebridge Library, please let the driver know when you get on the bus in St Teath and he or she will ensure you are dropped off as close to them as possible.

CAMELFORD AND DISTRICT OLD CORNWALL SOCIETY

On March 9th we had a lovely evening with Jacky Nowakowski telling us all about Tintagel, the castle, the history and its people from an archaeologist's eye view. The aerial photographs were beautiful and showed us the site from a different perspective. We wondered why so many people, over millennia, had built houses, traded and made a life for themselves, and their families, on an outcrop of rock jutting out from mainland Dumnonia (the name given to Cornwall, Devon, Dorset and a part of Somerset back in the 5th century.)

With the weather as it been, wet and windy for months, we wonder if the fields will ever dry out and allow the farmers, and their animals, to get back on the land. Farming has never been an easy life but with bad weather, economic worries and seasonal uncertainties it becomes ever more difficult.

Our speaker on April 13th will be Terry Faull who will tell us about a time when farming got so bad that riots broke out. 'The Agricultural Workers Riots of 1830' will give us an insight into how bad things got, and what changes were brought about by this uprising. It promises to be another illuminating evening.






