REV JOHN HENRY BARFOOT

To local church congregations, John Henry Barfoot was a familiar figure. In the habit of a member of the Third Order of Franciscans and often in sandals, he was always willing to step in to take services when needed.

Yet few people would have known about an impressive and varied CV which included a degree in conducting, being a professional singer and training as a hair stylist with the famous "Raymond", otherwise known as Mr. Teasy-Weasy.

Originally from Southampton - Barfoot is a well known Hampshire name - John Henry settled in Cornwall, first living in Camelford and then in St. Teath. He was a familiar figure in the village with immaculately styled white hair and those who knew him well appreciated his very dry sense of humour.

John Henry was a Reader and became Priest-in-charge in Tintagel after becoming licensed. He was also chaplain to Camelford British Legion. After retirement he often stepped in to take services as a "relief", helping out in local churches when the resident priest was not available. These included St. Teath and other churches in our cluster. More recently, he had been assisting at Michaelstow. With his musical experience, he was also involved in starting a church choir in St. Teath, a choir that continues to thrive.

John Henry died peacefully in hospital after a long illness. Our thoughts are with his friends and family.

FROM OUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR

There remains considerable uncertainty as to how the current pandemic and restrictions will evolve through the Autumn and Winter and of course much will depend on how the new freedoms around tourism and hospitality affect the spread of the virus. The NHS and the Council are preparing for the potential eventuality of a significant second wave whilst simultaneously hoping that social distancing and other measures such the wearing of masks will contain levels sufficiently to make local lock-downs effective enough to keep the virus manageable until a vaccine can eventually be produced

We have now held our first Full Cornwall Council meeting online with all 123 members voting and all the other council committee work has now resumed using remote technology. Now that Councillors have got used to the online format it has rapidly become apparent that there are many advantages over using the meeting rooms at New County Hall - one of these being an increased public participation and a renewed interest in local democracy.

I am pleased to report that both St Teath and St Breward Parish Councils have now embraced virtual meetings using the Zoom platform and that these have been attended by members of the public and in one case an Affordable Housing Officer from Cornwall Council was able to attend and contribute. The technology is easy to access and there are also options for using phones for anyone who does not have a suitable device – however a smart phone has all the capabilities needed for full participation. It also enables the easy sharing of planning and other documents for councillors to view when discussing points on the agenda, and now that councillors are getting used to the format it is quite possible to make complex and important decisions. For instance, at the July meetings, both Parish Councils debated the risks associated with the reopening of play equipment against the potential harm to children of continuing to deny them access to outdoor play. I support both Councils in deciding to re-open their play equipment whilst displaying notices that will inform parents of the risk and their personal responsibilities.

Post Covid-19 I fully expect virtual meetings to become the norm rather than the exception at Cornwall Council, with the reduction of commuting being both time efficient and contributing to our carbon zero ambitions. With regard to Parish Councils the Government continues to advise that local councils should only consider a physical meeting if there is a very specific need which cannot be met in any other way, and this does not include conducting its normal business. Whether or not Parish Councils see any advantage in virtual meetings for the long term remains to be seen.

Owing to the current Coronavirus restrictions the Parish Council continue to hold virtual online meetings. The second meeting of this kind was held on the 7th July with two members of the public and our Cornwall Councillor attending. We are not sure when actual meetings will resume but anticipate it may not be anytime soon. Because we were unable to hold the AGM, councils were informed that officers can remain in place until the next AGM in May 2021. Therefore, Cllr Roger Lyle remains Chairman and Cllr Tracey Kingdon the Vice Chairman.

Delabole Park and the St Teath Village Green and Play Area – The play areas are now open and will hopefully remain so. Please take care if your children are using the play equipment and read the notices and guidelines displayed. The Parish Council are unable to clean the equipment so please stay safe and enjoy the outdoor play. The wooden climbing frame at The Village Green, St Teath is now in a state of disrepair and will be removed from site. The Council will consider a replacement item, so if you have any suggestions for the type of equipment the children would like, please let me know.

Traffic Speeds – Please drive carefully through our villages. We are entering the busiest time of year with all the holiday sites re-opening. We recognise that traffic exceeds the limit through Delabole and St Teath. Having spoken to our local Police Community Support Officer he confirms the Community Speed Watch Teams will be back and history tells us that many of those exceeding the limit live either in the parish or locally. It is so easy to become complacent with familiar surroundings please be aware of the dangers posed for pedestrians and children going to school.

Dog Bin – The Parish Council have agreed to purchase a new dog bin for Treligga Downs Road and honour the cost of £241 per year to have it emptied.

We have a break in August but owing to the fact the number of meetings held has been reduced over the Coronavirus lockdown we are holding a meeting on Tuesday, 4th August 2020. The following meeting will be on Tuesday, 1st September 2020. Please let me know if you wish to attend and I can ensure the log in details are sent to you.

Many of our readers have been unable to access online editions of Timepiece for the last few months, therefore we will be including items from those editions over the next few printed issues.

ST TEATH COMMUNITY BUS IMPORTANT NOTICE

The current Friday service will continue to run to Wadebridge Tesco and Wadebridge town centre. It leaves at 8.45 in order to get to Tesco before the queues build up. It will then call at the town centre returning to St Teath at 11.15.

It is hoped to start the service to Truro on Monday 20th July. This is a bookable service only. Ring 850401 to book. The number of passengers is limited to **seven**.

The organisers reserve the right to cancel either of these services if the current situation changes.

The Truro service will leave St Teath at 9.30 am and return from Truro at 2.00pm. The safety and health of our passengers is our first priority so all those using the bus are requested to note the following.

- 1. Always follow the driver's instructions. They will direct which seats are to be used and then direct you in order when leaving the bus.
- 2. Please sanitise your hands before entering the bus with gel provided by the driver.
- 3. Please wear a face mask whilst you are on the bus.
- 4. Note that the bus will be sanitised prior to each part of the trip.
- 5. Only carry on to the bus small items such as handbags, umbrellas etc.
- Shopping in bags will be carried at the rear of the bus and will be loaded and unloaded by the driver through the rear doors. No loose items or items other than shopping will be carried

COMMUNITY CENTRE NEWS

Following the Prime Minister's announcement considering the re-opening of some public places from 4th July, which includes Village Halls and Community Centres, the St. Teath Community Centre Committee would like to announce the re-opening of the Centre from September 1st, providing conditions stay as they are. We are implementing a one-way system and would ask users to follow the sanitising and cleaning guidelines signposted in the centre.

However, a maximum of **12** persons will be allowed in at any one time. This means that we will NOT be restarting our weekly Coffee Mornings just yet and large groups (e.g. St Teath Joybirds) will not be able to use the centre until Government guidelines permit.

As the school is growing in size - in September we shall have 119 pupils - we are currently looking at fundraising to install a new temporary classroom. We have an amazing team of builders supporting us in this endeavour and a fantastic PTA doing a great job of fund -raising. As we round off another year at school, in the strangest of circumstances, we say goodbye to a brilliant Year 6. I have only really known them for a term and in strange times, but they are a confident, funny, keen and bright group of children who will go on to achieve great things. They have taken no SATs this year, but we know that academically they will shine. We wish them all the best for the future and look forward to hearing all about their exploits in years to come.

I would like to round off by saying **thank you** to all my staff this term. It has not been the easiest term to join a new school, but it has been made so much easier by having a hard-working staff who have been willing to do anything to support their children through this difficult period. They have worked through their holidays, through their break and lunch times without complaint and they well deserve the rest that is coming to them next week. 

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
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
