When Guy Fawkes was hiding in cellars under the Houses of Parliament with 36 barrels of gunpowder for company, he could never have dreamed that his name would be familiar to virtually every child in Britain 400 years later. Next week fireworks will celebrate the day the Gunpowder Plot was foiled. Effigies of Guy (who preferred to be known as Guido) will burn on the top of bonfires. Yes, I know. It could be tempting to think of other dummies that may be eligible for ridicule.

And that brings me to the B**** word.

I have been writing this "editorial" (you may have another word for it) for over a year now and I have fought con-stantly to avoid mentioning one of my passions - politics. I am that sad person who sits up all night to hear the latest election results, with snacks and a small glass of alcohol to keep me company, I wait anxiously for the latest vote in parliament. I shout: "The ayes have it, the ayes have it" before the Speaker, John Bercow. My television has often been at risk as I have lost patience yet again with one particular political editor.

Then came B***** and I admit defeat. I have watched people in the House of Commons behave in a way that would be deplored in a kindergarten. I have watched endless pundits ramble on about possible scenarios, I have watched MPs changing sides faster than Watford scores goals (I like football too). But this isn't the politics I love and I admit that I, along with millions of others I am sure, have had more than enough of it. By Halloween, every- thing should have been sorted, according to the people in charge. As I write this, that seems unlikely. But I admit it - enough.

Just imagine we had a time machine and could go back to the beginning of January, 2013. David Cameron doesn't announce a referendum, no-one has to choose in the greatest vote of its kind since we joined the EEC in 1973. What would have been in the newspapers in those intervening years? Which laws would have been passed in the time that has been taken up in parliament by THAT controversy? Which projects went on to the back burner because there hasn't been time to debate them?

However we all feel about this emotive subject, it has divided friends and families. It has caused fury to boil over, even threats to be made. Social media has given misguided followers of one side or the other an opportunity to launch verbal attacks on those who disagree with them. This isn't the politics I have followed for so many years. When - and if - this chaos comes to a conclusion, I hope that rifts can heal, tempers cool and that MPs concentrate on doing the job we asked them to do.

Guy Fawkes and his fellow 12 conspirators didn't like parliament very much either but their solution was drastic - blow the king and parliament to pieces and start again. As Guy told his accusers, he wanted to blow the king, James I, back to Scotland where he came from. An anonymous letter to the authorities led to a check on the cel- lars under the Houses of Parliament and Guido was on his way to the Tower of London.

James ordered annual celebrations to remember November 5th, 1605, when the plot failed. It has been a reason for bonfires and fireworks, toffee apples and sparklers ever since.

How will future generations look back at everything that is happening in parliament now? I hate to think.

FROM OUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR

Following on from my piece in last month's newsletter about the Community Governance Review that is being undertaken by Cornwall Council, I have booked two parish consultation events for early November.

The review is looking at a wide range of issues for parish and town councils including the possibility of amalgamating or creating new parish councils where there is community support. I have long held the opinion that both villages would benefit from the creation of a separate parish council for Delabole and believe that the case for doing so is entirely positive and will deliver advantages to all residents from both villages.

The events will be held on the following Saturday afternoons and at the following venues:

Saturday 2nd November 2pm - 6pm: Delabole, St Johns

Saturday 9th November 2pm – 6pm: St Teath, Community Centre

I hope as many residents as possible will be able to spare a few minutes to come and give their views and both events are open to residents from both villages. Please come to whichever one is more con-venient to you.

There will be an extraordinary Full Council meeting of Cornwall Council at New County Hall on the 10th December when all of the various proposals from across Cornwall will be debated and decided and I am using the consultation events to gather evidence and opinions from as wide a range of residents as possible.

The importance of parish councils in being the closest representatives of residents should never be underestimated and they are increasingly important in planning decisions and have a pivotal role in devel- oping Neighbourhood Development Plans. They also deal with a raft of other issues such as footpaths and maintenance of public open spaces and are often the first port of call when community groups need support.

Parish Councillors give up their time on a voluntary basis and I believe that having a parish council for each village

will make their workload much more manageable and avoid any possible conflicts of inter- est when dealing with the public purse. I will welcome all opinions and hope that you can find time to talk over the issue and give your views.

Sub Committees – Within the Parish Council there are a number of sub committees that assist in the day to day running and work of the council. These enable projects to move forward between meetings and are able to focus on specific issues. Recommendations can be proposed by sub-committees who then bring their views back to the Full Council for a final decision. In certain circumstances they can have delegated powers to pursue specific matters. The planning committee spend a lot of time considering applications and carry out many site visits. They also report back on matters that are deemed to be non-compliant with the conditions of an approved application or raise questions about any form of development where planning has not been obtained, or seek clarification on permitted development sites. We are happy to investigate any development matters that need reporting or clarification.

Cornwall Council Governance Review – Several councillors along with myself and residents of both vil- lages attended the second Stage of the Governance Review at St Issey on the 2nd October. Parishes with- in the Wadebridge & Padstow Community Network Area, along with St Teath from the Camelford Community Network had expressed a wish to change their parish. Many wanted to review their parish boundaries, but St Teath had submitted an enquiry to look at splitting the parish and creating two separate parishes for St Teath and Delabole. The panel will now consider all submissions and produce their recommendations later in the year, or early 2020. If they decide to move forward with a review for our parish, a public con-sultation will be held. This is the first opportunity in over 40 years where parishes can apply to make changes. Both Delabole and St Teath have grown in population over the past four decades and the needs of the electorate can be different although some things remain the same. There is a lot to consider. If you have any queries or questions at this stage please do not hesitate to get in touch. Further information on the Governance Review can

Litter – Please help to keep our parish tidy by using the bins provided or taking your litter home. Having attended the Cornwall Council training event, as Clerk, I can now complete incident cards for littering, fly tipping and dog fouling that with sufficient evidence will be sent to Cornwall Council who will issue a fine on the offender. Parking / Speeding -These seem to be regular topics at our meetings and we ask that you all be respon- sible when parking and please slow down when passing through our villages. The Cornwall Council traffic enforcement is now back and although the time spent in the parish is limited we hope that random visits will help to address the parking problems with the issuing of fines. Parish Council website - Councillors have recognised that the current website is not the easiest to ac- cess and sometimes information is unavailable so they have agreed this will be replaced. Our website de- signer has been instructed to set up the new site and as soon as this is live the www. address will be publicised. We know that some old sites are still live and these should have been shut down, however this has not happened and does cause some confusion. There is nothing the Parish Council can do about this but can assure you that our current site will be removed once the new website is active. St Teath Village Green - The Parish Council have agreed to lift the ban on dogs during organised events on the Village Green at St Teath. This means that dogs will be allowed, under the supervision of their own- ers, to go onto the green but must be kept under control. Remembrance Sunday will this year be held on Sunday, 10th November 2019. Please support the com- memorations in our villages to honour and remember those from our parishes that have been killed in con-flict, whether this be at war or in service, and for those injured or families that continue to grieve for loved ones. Camelford Leisure Centre – The Parish Council have once again decided to give a donation to the leisure centre that is heavily reliant on support from local councils. The centre offers a wide range of recreational facilities for all ages and abilities and we are proud to have this service so close to our villages and widely available for our residents.

The school has once again enjoyed a very creative month. All the children thoroughly enjoyed making their entries for the village scarecrow competition. Sycamore class created a fantastic caveman as part of their Stone Age topic. Elm class made a wonderful juggling clown and Oak created a deeply soulful rock musi- cian! It was also my pleasure to be invited to judge the other entries in the village. There were so many super ideas: 'Outstanding in their field!'

Staying with the creative theme, the school once again was incredibly lucky to be selected to work with a local artist, Reg Payn, to create an entry for the Bikelights Festival, which this year was held in both Wadebridge and Bodmin. THE W.I. SCARECROW TRAIL

We gained a few extra residents in the village on Saturday 5th October when 29 scarecrows were erected in gardens, on verges, under porches and tied to railings — anyone walking or driving through the village could not have missed seeing a few of them. St Teath W.I. organised a scarecrow competition — the first of its kind in the village, they believe — to help raise funds for the new village bus.

Our committee were a little apprehensive when the idea was first mooted in case no one was interested, but it seemed to appeal to individuals, to businesses and associations and to the school children, and some very entertaining 'crows' were exhibited. We had Father Christmas, a deep-sea diver, witches, a caveman, 'proper' scarecrows, a wizard, a rock guitarist, a ballerina, a horse in chorister's clothing and a golfer, to name but a few. They were judged very ably by Rev Angela Cooper and Mr Paul Howard, acting head teacher at the school. Judging was extremely difficult because the entries were so good, and the final points allotted were very close (marks out of 10 given in each of 3 categories: (a) originality, (b) build quality and (c) 'Wow factor').

Maps to show the position of the exhibits were sold to those who wanted to take the Scarecrow Trail, and home-made soup and luscious puddings were available afterwards from the Community Centre because the Allotment Society had their annual soup kitchen lunch on the same day.

The winning entries were: "What do we do with a drunken sailor" by Marion Sinclair (individual class); "Barry" by the White Hart (in the association and business class) and "Paddington Bear" by Willow class from the school.

We would like to thank everyone who stuffed, garbed, painted and positioned their 'crows', and all those who made their way around the village to view them. It was a truly entertaining day. A Methodist Minister's View

We readily associate the month of November with Remembrance Sunday, which this year is on 10th No-vember. Even if you do not attend your local Act of Remembrance, you will be associated with the day at least through watching the relevant news items on the television. Through these, we will be reminded that thousands of people in many differing situations across the world will be sharing in Remembering the Fallen of the Two World Wars and other conflicts.

The past few years have been particularly significant as we have been reminded of some of the key bat- tles of World War 1 and its conclusion in 1918. During 2019 we have had cause to remember the out- break of World War 2 in 1939, 80 years ago. This year also marked the 75th anniversary of the D-Day Landings in June 1944, one of the significant events that led to the conclusion of World War 2.

In recent years, the French government has recognised that country's indebtedness to our British service personnel, and a number of our veterans have received France's highest military award, the *Légion d'honneur*. This is a reminder to us of our indebtedness, too, to all who served in those major times of conflict, and those who have served in other conflicts since.

In recent weeks, I have been reminded of the cost and consequences of human conflict on seeing young men in Barnstaple and Exmouth with prosthetic limbs going about their everyday business in these com- munities. It is a salutary lesson in these times in which we are sometimes complacent about the issues arising from war. The current Sunday night drama series on BBC1 'The World on Fire', which concludes on Remembrance Sunday, raises a number of issues associated with World War 2, and serves as a re- minder to us of the range of consequences of human conflict.

We may feel sheltered and protected from such consequences, but I think that it is good for us to 'remember' the suffering of so many and what it achieved for us, and to continually pray for world peace. Many live amidst political and human conflict at this time.

It prompts the question: 'What does Remembrance Sunday mean to us?'
