FROM OUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR

As the work at Cornwall Council moves from the emergency response to Covid-19 into a recovery phase, there are a lot of decisions to be made around projects and committee work that were put on hold, with a view to which areas can now be completed in the last seven months of this administration before the next local elections in May 2021.

Ever since my election to Cornwall Council in 2016, I have been working consistently on three major projects in the Parish and I am pleased to report that all of them are to be taken forward and have both the commitment from Cornwall Council to complete and the funding in place.

Cornwall Council has had a statuary obligation to conduct a **Community Governance Review** which sought representations from all 213 Town and Parish Councils in Cornwall to see if their governance or boundaries could be amended to improve local democracy. I have long held the view that both villages in the parish would benefit from each being represented by individual councils. This view was overwhelmingly backed by residents from both villages during my consultations and those conducted by Cornwall Council. This review will now be taken forward, and **Delabole will become a parish in its own right from May 2021 with its own parish council**. I will provide further details in the coming months, but this will present opportunities for both villages and make it much easier for each village to concentrate on their own priorities in the future.

Shortly before I was elected, a girl was struck by a car in St Teath and one of the first requests from residents was to ensure that Cornwall Council made good on a report for **traffic calming in the village.** This was completed in December 2016 with several options for a 20-mph zone, and after a village consultation a consensus around a potential scheme was reached. Securing funding for the preferred scheme has been a challenge – however working closely with our planning officers and a local developer funding has finally been secured through a s106 agreement on a small development at the entrance to Bramble-side which is nearing completion. I can confirm that the scheme has the green light from Cormac and will progress in 2021.

Finally, the most consistent traffic issue raised to me by residents in Delabole has been the pinch point in the High Street adjacent to the entrance to Charlottes Way which causes traffic jams on a daily basis, and often can only be resolved by cars and lorries mounting the pavement leaving pedestrians at best inconvenienced and at worst at risk of being hit. This problem is long-standing and has escalated as traffic numbers have increased year on year. I have had many reports that this summer has been one of the worst. Through multiple consultations in the village, many options have been explored and eventually a potential solution has emerged. This has now been worked up by a firm of highways consultants and will come back to the village as a formal consultation by Cormac this autumn. Despite the significant price tag of the proposal, I have commitment from Cornwall Council for full funding as they recognise the considerable work that has gone into listening to the views of the community in shaping the scheme and understand that this has been a problem that has blighted the village for many years and will benefit the wider area.

Tony moved to St Teath over forty years ago from Birmingham where he was born and brought up. Tony's mother came with him, but died soon afterwards, leaving him to lead a solitary and unconventional lifestyle from then on. To those who took the time to get to know him Tony was a very well-informed, interesting and kind-hearted man, who was always ready to help anyone out.

Those who knew Tony best believe that his very strict upbringing, followed by the death of both parents in quick succession, had the effect of suddenly giving him total freedom to enjoy all he had been denied in childhood. This started with acquiring all kinds of gadgets and gradually led to the obsessive hoarding of anything and everything, that became his hallmark over the years. The astounding accumulation of material of all kinds in his house and garden could also have been due to Tony's kindly nature, not wishing to hurt people's feelings by refusing whatever he was offered, no matter what it was.

Marc, Tony's friend and neighbour from *the Poplars* is intending to plant an apple tree on the triangle in memory of Tony, this self-effacing character, who is sadly missed by many more people than he would ever have imagined. We send our condolences and sympathy to Marc, Terry and Richard, Tony's close friends.

The current Friday service to Wadebridge Tesco and Wadebridge town centre will now revert to its normal times. It will leave the White Hart at **9.30am** returning to St Teath at **12.00 pm**. The cost of this trip is still £3.

The **Monday Truro service** is a **bookable service only**. Ring Tom Imber on 01208 592711 to book. The number of passengers is limited to seven. The cost of this trip is still £5.

The organisers reserve the right to cancel either of these services if the current situation changes.

The Truro service will leave St Teath at 9.30 am and return from Truro at 2.00pm.

We understand that people are cautious about using the bus, but we would like to reassure everybody that we are taking all the necessary COVID precautions to keep everybody safe. To help us achieve this, please note the following:

- Always follow the driver's instructions. They will direct which seats are to be used and then direct you in order when leaving the bus.
- Please sanitise your hands before entering the bus with gel provided by the driver.
- Please wear a face mask whilst you are on the bus.
- Note that the bus will be sanitised prior to each part of the trip.
- Only carry on to the bus small items such as handbags, umbrellas etc.
- Shopping in bags will be carried at the rear of the bus and will be loaded and unloaded by the driver through the rear doors. No loose items or items other than shopping will be carried.

As we come back to the start of the new year, we have so many thankyous to say. Staff and volunteers have been busy over the summer transforming the school and grounds. Rooms have been repainted, fencing has been mended, the grounds and flower beds have been weeded and the front wall repainted. We are so fortunate to have such a great team of people willing to give up their spare time to support the school and we are truly grateful.

Besides this, our PTA have been running a fundraising project to get us a new temporary classroom onto the school site. When we started this, we were picturing an old, second-hand container building that would serve its purpose. Instead, with the amazing support of our incredible community, we have ordered a **brand-new** classroom cabin that will be delivered in the last week of September. Volunteers have already prepared the ground for us and we are very excited about the classroom's imminent arrival. I can't thank everyone enough for their contributions and support. This project will transform education at St Teath School once more. I will issue a full list of our benefactors next month as I want to be sure that no one is left out.

We have welcomed a brand-new cohort of pupils. This year we took 24 pupils into Reception Class. This is a huge cohort for us, pushing our overall number of pupils to 119. As well as this, we took in a few more students throughout the school, all going to show what a successful, thriving school we have. All our new children seem to have settled in well, despite the slightly different arrangements we have in place to protect us in this new environment. Handwashing is the new norm here, taking a large percentage of the school day, but the children have taken it all in their stride and everyone seems happy to be back to some sort of normality.

Our two new teachers have also settled in well. Miss Goodman and Mr Harvey have both made a great start to life at St Teath and are already popular with pupils and parents. We are hoping to welcome back volunteers in the coming weeks, so if you would like to help out regularly in school, please get in touch and let us know.

A Methodist Minister's View

I recall reading a newspaper article a few weeks ago which indicated that a large majority of the television programmes available to us at the present time are 'repeated' programmes. That is understandable in the present climate, but even prior to the prevailing pandemic the 'repeats' were in the majority. However, when you see a programme for the second time round you often learn something different from it.

Quite recently there was a repeat of a Piers Morgan interview with the athlete, Mo Farah, which was originally made in 2016. Mo Farah was knighted in the New Years Honours list of 2017 for his services to athletics after his successes at the 2016 Olympic Games. The learning point for me from the programme was that Mo Farah had established a Trust Fund to make provision for the people of his village in Somalia, which he had visited with his family. Here is an example of a person seeking to share with those very much less privileged from his personal resources, and probably using his influence amongst other potential givers.

This story came my way at a time when I had been thinking about the situation amongst most of our charitable organisations at this time. Our charities are finding their work hampered because their income streams have been affected by the current crisis.

Some are trying various on-line schemes to prompt people to give. My shrewd guess is that those schemes will not produce the same income as some of their regular annual events and appeals. Our local charities such as the Hospices and the Air Ambulance are starved of funds as well as the national charitable causes like the Cancer appeals and Christian Aid, although still continuing to work albeit perhaps on a smaller scale.

Caring for people in need has been a concern throughout the ages right from biblical times. We find references for the need to make provision for the poor in the Old Testament e.g. see Leviticus 19: 9 & 10, and the New Testament e.g. James 1:27. The current situation is a challenge to us to respond, perhaps with direct giving in the absence of the fund raising events which you support in a year. Hopefully, we are all concerned about the situation and will respond as we are able.






