Windows Into History

A Methodist Minister's View

This year marks the 200th year of the founding of the Royal National Lifeboat Institution: the RNLI. I was interested to learn that 4th March was the anniversary of the founding meeting of the organisation in London. The idea evolved from the practical thinking of Sir William Hillary, from the Isle of Man, who was concerned about the number of shipwrecks. He organised a meeting of people who were sympathetic to his idea, which was chaired by the Archbishop of Canterbury. Sir William was a member of the Quakers faith group.

I expect many of you have been watching the BBC TV programme 'Call the Midwife', which features the work of an organisation working alongside the National Health Service in the East End of London. It serves as an example – based on memoirs – of how many of our caring and other services were developed, with some then becoming mainstream government or local government services. Our hospitals, schools and libraries are examples of this. Often, the initiating groups were drawn from members of local churches. Some of the caring organisations that have developed in response to need in recent times have the same root, such as St Petroc's here in Cornwall working with and for the homeless, and our local foodbanks.

At the present time, many of our caring and welfare services are experiencing difficulties because of a lack of adequate funding from our government, and through them into local government. Many people will benefit financially from the reduction in National Insurance contributions in the recent budget, while many are suffering because of the lack of funding and its consequences. These things should concern us and cause us to do what we can to bring about a change.

As I was thinking in these terms, a chorus from a 20th-century hymn written by Graham Kendrick came to mind. The hymn is 'Beauty for brokenness' and has the chorus:

God of the poor
Friend of the weak
Give us compassion we pray.
Melt our cold hearts,
Let tears fall like rain,
Come, change our love
From a spark to a flame.

These words can form the basis of a prayer for all of us – for ourselves and others, from which action could follow.

Clock Tower Update

Works should now be under way for the refurbishment of our beloved Clock Tower (see front cover). Obviously, this will cause some pressure on parking around the Square, but the Parish Council hopes that the benefit of the works far outweigh any immediate issues.

Now our attention is turning to how we can celebrate the completion of the works and the unveiling of the new windows!

Village Green Entrance

The Parish Council has become increasingly concerned over the state of the walls in the entrance to the Village Green opposite the school. The Council has now contracted a local stonemason to repair both sides of the entrance.

Village Green Improvements

The Parish Council has submitted an application to the Cornwall Council Levelling Up Fund to hopefully receive some monies to help it improve the amenities in the Village Green. The Parish Council is specifically keen to ensure that the green is as inclusive as possible, and would like to receive ideas from everyone who uses the green. This could be anything from enhancements to the entrance gates, widening the paths for parents with pushchairs or the introduction of new play equipment for children with mobility issues.

County Council

One of the main reasons I wanted to get into local politics was to drive forward the green agenda and get meaningful action on both climate change and nature recovery. In 2019, it was my motion to Council which resulted in Cornwall Council formally declaring a climate emergency, and, more recently, I supported a motion to recognise that we are living through an ecological emergency.

I am pleased to say that both areas are being taken very seriously by the Council, with substantial progress towards decarbonisation of Council operations (well ahead of government targets) and with a team on the Council now taking the formal lead on Cornwall's Local Nature Recovery Strategy, a statutory outcome of the government's flagship Environment Act.

Notwithstanding this, it needs to be placed in the context that Cornwall Council only has direct control over 1% of Cornwall's emissions and can only influence around 40% more. The rest are in the hands of other businesses, organisations and residents.

We regularly get questions at Full Council and committee meetings from members of the public who are concerned that the action we are taking is insufficient to meet the challenge, and one of the key requests of many environmental groups is that we convene a citizen's assembly to drive forward change.

Over the past few months, a development group has set the foundations of a new Cornwall & Isles of Scilly Climate Commission, and I am pleased to report that a call for Commissioners has just been launched. Its role will be to challenge, catalyse and convene the region's leaders, organisations and communities to take effective action.

The first step now is to source a highly diverse range of people, with a wide range of skill sets, experience, geography, ages and backgrounds, to bring their unique perspectives to being Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly's first Climate Commissioners. Are you keen to see increased and more joined-up conversations and action in Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly in response to the climate and ecological emergencies? Could you bring your unique perspective and skills to making it happen? Could you be one of the first Climate Commissioners for Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly?

Applications are now open, with a deadline of Monday 8 April, and details on how to apply can be found at the Commission's website www.cornwallandiosclimate.org.uk



Revd. Nicki's Note

Dear Friends

Thank you so much for the warm welcome we have received from the churches and communities here, with many cheerful smiles and friendly conversations. As I enter into a new season in my life and ministry, I am reminded of the changing seasons, both in nature and in the church year. With the clocks moving forward at the end of March, we can now enjoy lighter evenings.



This year, at the end of March, the wonderful festival of Easter is celebrated in church, which culminates in the resurrection of Jesus Christ. This was a new season, both for Christ himself, and his disciples. In the period that follows the discovery that Jesus's body was no longer in the tomb, along with the message "He is not here, He has Risen," he appeared to his disciples and several hundred other people.

Each time Jesus appeared there was a profound effect on those who met with him.

- As he walked with two of his disciples on the road to Emmaus, their hearts were excited by his words and all he had to say.
- Thomas was sceptical and did not believe until he saw him with the wounds in his hands, feet and side and then declared "My Lord and my God."
- Jesus shared breakfast on the beach, after having guided his disciples to throw their nets to the other side of the boat where they caught a great catch of fish.
- Peter, who had previously denied knowing Jesus, was restored into a new relationship with Jesus, and Jesus then entrusted Peter to build His church by caring for, teaching and loving people.

So as we enter into this season following Easter Day, how do we respond to the news of the resurrection? Are we like Thomas, doubtful and uncertain and need to explore faith a little more to begin to understand? Are we like the disciples who were fishing, weary and tired, and need God's guidance and wisdom to discover the best plans and decisions for our lives? Or are we like Peter, in need of restoration in our relationship with Jesus and to be assured of God's love for us?

The Easter story is an act of love that can move people from despair and hopelessness to one of hope and transformation. We each have our own life story and we can often feel confused and bewildered at the complexities of life. Whatever season we find ourselves in, we can be assured that God is with us, ready to guide us, restore us and to love us unconditionally into a new season of life.

Just as the season of Spring sees new life bursting forth in nature, I pray that the resurrection hope of Easter will bring a season of hope, love and life to you as we remember the words of Jesus:

"I came that they may have life and have it abundantly."
