## A Methodist Minister's View

At the beginning of a New Year, it is always interesting to read the newspaper articles which review the past year to see what happenings have caught the attention of the journalists. As I have looked at the reviews for 2023, the recurrent references seem to be the cost-of-living crisis and the strikes by railway workers and health service employees in this country, as well as our Prime Minister's five priorities.

Of his priorities, only one has been achieved. The wider concerns have been the climate issues and the conflict situations in Ukraine and Gaza. Some of these issues will be still with us in the coming weeks and months. It is interesting to look at the way in which ordinary people comment on and act in response to these situations. The cost-of-living crisis, for instance, had seen a remarkable response through the work of the foodbank and pantry projects, all of which rely on gifts from ordinary people as well as businesses and organisations. Our health workers have received a great deal of sympathetic support for their cause.

In response to the wider concerns, climate issues are discussed in many circles, especially as we have evidence of the impact, whilst there has been aid made available to Ukraine and Gaza and desires have been expressed for peace initiatives. One writer commented that our Western society has been informed and shaped through 20 centuries by the impact of the life and teachings of Jesus, so much so that the framework in which we live is thoroughly Christian. The nature of our responses to the current affairs illustrates this.

In the middle of February, we move into the Season of Lent – it does not seem possible. During Lent we are caused to reflect on the giving up of his human life by Jesus – God's Son, for the well-being of all humankind. On my bookshelf is a book called 'The Street Bible', which puts into modern terms some of the words of the Bible. The author, Rob Lacey, rewrites some words from John's Gospel thus: 'Jesus got the name 'God's Voice'... There's nothing that doesn't have the phrase 'made by Jesus' stamped on it somewhere. His words were life itself, and they lit up people's lives' (John 1:3-5).

I leave you to think through these things.

Several friends have told me they would like to step back from commitments but know that if they did, no one would want to take over. Older people feel they have done enough, younger ones have their hands full with work and family. Someone recently commented: "When you come to anything in the village, you know who will be helping. Where would the Carnival and the Village Lights be without the volunteers who work so hard? They are incredible people and we can't thank them enough. We lost the Carnival once before and we owe it to the current team for reviving it.

## **County Council**

I am writing this at the end of an extremely mild, but stormy, Christmas/New Year period. In terms of global warming, 2023 was the second-warmest year on record in the UK. Second only to 2022 – and probably only until we get the data for 2024!

Much has been made since the Paris agreement in 2015 of the collective ambition to limit global warming to well below 2°C, and preferably below 1.5°C. The stark truth is that for most of 2023, the world has already exceeded 1.5°C – and 2024 might be the first whole year above this target. Here in the UK, this has been reflected in the extreme weather patterns we have seen over the last couple of years, which have given us drought, exceptional rainfall and nationwide flooding.

Locally, the most obvious effects have been on our transport systems. Our single train line into the county has always been vulnerable. Once again, this winter there has been widespread disruption, with some parts flooded and others blocked by landslip.

The other casualty has been our rural road network. Most of our rural roads are tree-lined and – with the added danger of ash dieback – are often blocked by fallen trees and branches. But without doubt, the greatest hazard has been poor drainage and surface water flooding. Regrettably, one of the worst decisions made by the current administration at County Hall has been to reduce the funding for clearing drains. Around six years ago, we had a big push on road drainage and the positive benefit to our roads at the time was very noticeable.

Since then, we have experienced several more years of local government austerity, with councils nationwide pitching highways budgets against social care and children's services. We are inevitably seeing less investment in our roads at a time when the climate is demanding more.

The government response has been a sticking-plaster pothole fund, of which Cornwall received £5 million. Welcome though any additional funding is, potholes are the symptom rather than the root problem. How we manage water on our road network is going to be one of the major challenges of climate change, and an area where better and fairer funding for Local Authorities – especially in rural areas – will be needed.

In these conditions, deep potholes can develop very quickly, and these and other issues such as mud, water and poor surfaces can be reported through the council website on the dedicated reporting page – just type "report something" into the search box on the Council's home page. Once you have reported an issue (with or without a photo), you will get email confirmation that the problem is in the system and then an email update when the issue is resolved.

## **Parish Council**

Twelve Months of Community Action

St Teath Parish Council would like to wish everyone a happy and healthy New Year. We've had a very busy 12 months delivering new initiatives for the village, as well as progressing exciting projects for the benefit of everyone living or working in our Parish.

Works are now at last under way for traffic calming measures around the school. This has been a long and frustrating process for the Council, but we now have two new mobile speed cameras going up as well as some additional highways alterations, which we hope will encourage road users to take more care whilst driving through our village.

In the summer, we announced a new Community Sparks Fund enabling St Teath-based groups to pitch for funding support from the Parish Council. In October, the Council was delighted to award over £5,000 of financial support to eight local groups and organisations. As a result:

- The Grass Cutters, Community Gardeners and Allotment Association have been able to purchase new and improved equipment;
- The Community Centre has installed WiFi for its users;
- The Christmas Lights Committee was able to purchase and maintain even more lights for their fantastic display;
- Costs for the installation of a new defibrillator were covered for the Rosewater area;
- The Carnival Committee is able to explore new children's activities for this year's event;
- The Football Club was able to complete fencing and replace the old line-marker.

All groups were extremely grateful for the support and we hope everyone in the village will benefit in one way or another. Applications will again be encouraged in the summer for 2025 funding.

For our younger residents, new play equipment was installed on the Village Green, and we were given a tree to plant as part of the Forest for Cornwall initiative.

In November, we held a Community Consultation event for the Clocktower refurbishment project we are beginning later this spring. The tower is a registered war memorial that is owned and maintained on behalf of the village by the Parish Council. The consultation centred around which window designs the repair works should incorporate, and our Parish Clerk was amazed at how many people turned out on such a dreary afternoon to have their say!

Community consultation is important to the Parish Council, and over the coming months we will once again seek your opinions on a range of new and exciting plans for the year ahead. However, much as we'd like to undertake as many new projects as we can, we have to remain mindful of rising costs. As a result of the all-too-familiar increases, after long debate, the Full Council has agreed that it has no option but to raise the Parish Precept from £25,000 to £27,000, its first increase in many years. This raise is minimal in comparison with other parishes, but it will ensure the Council can cover rising costs as it continues to support the Parish.

Your Parish Council is here to protect, maintain and support our village, so please do continue to let us know about any ideas or queries you may have regarding how we can continue to make our village a happy, safe and welcoming community.

#### St Teath Rubbish Ramblers


2023 finished with a bumper pick. Fanning out towards Trelill, Trewiggett Lane and Trekee, the group collected six large black sackfuls that became almost too heavy to carry.

There could not have been much more of a contrast, weather-wise, between our Away Day on Polzeath beach on 28th November and our first December pick on the 7th. The first was in glorious sunshine and under a blue sky, whilst the latter was on one of the wettest days of the year. The main crop on the beach was dozens of little lengths of netting, presumably discarded overboard whilst repairs were made. Polzeath regular pickers are an especially assiduous bunch. Our St Teath pick was the usual crop of cans and bottles with a protractor (older readers might remember what that is) and an exotic comb as unusual finds.

The team meets informally every first and third Thursday of the month at 10 am by the White Hart pub. Upcoming dates are the 1st and 15th of February and 6th and 20th of March. New helpers are always welcome. Please dress visibly, wear gloves and bring a bin bag. Routes change from short and flat to the longer, hilly ones. Coffee and chat afterwards.

## St Teath Men's Shed: Inaugural Meeting

On Wednesday 7th February at 7.30 in the Community Centre there will be an introductory session to explore the possible formation of a Men's Shed in St Teath.

The Men's Shed is an idea that started over 20 years ago in Australia before travelling to other places, such as New Zealand and Canada, and eventually the UK where there are now over 800 shed organisations, four of which are registered in Cornwall.

The idea is this: that men of ALL ages gather together to talk, learn and laugh while participating in activities they wish to be involved in. This could be as varied as sorting out someone's IT problem, repairing someone's garden seat, fixing a bike or even learning to cook an egg. The list is endless. Sometimes the meeting place is an actual shed or, like us, will start in a community centre or similar.

This is just a short introduction to something that could be really exciting, very interesting and which has proved to benefit hundreds of men in this country.



#### POLITE NOTICE TO DOG WALKERS

Trevilley Lane has always been popular with dog walkers but this causes a problem for residents when some owners don't clean up after their dogs. It has been happening for years but still the complaints come in.

This is a source of annoyance to all residents, including those who are elderly or have mobility issues, who have to tread carefully, especially in the dark winter days, when careless dog owners leave the mess their dogs have created for someone else to clear up.
