

The second phrase has been said by a number of people commenting on the National Health Service and other public services with the words, "It is broken." Thirdly, I have heard our Prime Minister say in response to a number of critical comments, "We have a plan."

As we enter into the month of March, we will be in the season of Lent, with Easter this year being over the last weekend of the month. Our clocks go forward on Easter Sunday, which means a short night for those thinking of being up for sunrise events on that day. Some people find the events associated with Good Friday and Easter Day difficult to understand and celebrate, despite the fact that they are at the heart of our Christian faith.

The sufferings of Jesus, God's Son, the Crucifixion and Resurrection arise from God's initiative and plan to draw all human beings back into his way for life and living. God has a plan for us to become forgiving, loving, relating people — but knows that left to our own devices, our lives would experience brokenness. Hence the Easter story is a message of hope for all of us, in that we can find our way into the life of God's Kingdom Way for us and experience life in all its fullness.

Jesus talked about his sufferings (see Mark 8:31, for instance) and his purpose in coming (see John 10:10). For our brokenness and need for hope, God has a plan with an eternal dimension. It is there for all of us to discover.

I wish you every blessing and a joyous Easter.

County Council

You might already be aware by now that the Conservative cabinet of Cornwall Council is proposing the maximum possible increase of Council Tax of 4.99% in April. With a safe majority in the council chamber, this will undoubtedly be ratified by the time you read this.

To be fair, over the last eight years I have only once known any cabinet of any colour or persuasion to propose anything but the maximum allowed. This is because behind each headline rise there has always been a continuing story of decline in the direct funding from central government, and ever-increasing demand for services such as adult social care and vital funding for children with special educational needs.

Many councils nationally have formally declared that they are no longer able to set a balanced budget – a key requirement of local government as we are not allowed to borrow for day-to-day spending. These councils are effectively bankrupt, and some, such as Birmingham, have been given permission to raise council tax by 10% whilst continuing to drastically reduce services.

In Cornwall, we have been very proactive in managing public services such as toilets and libraries through town and parish councils to keep the books balanced, and even managed to keep a healthy reserve fund of £40M for emergencies. No more. Even with the rise in council tax and further reductions in services, we can only set a budget for this year by dipping into this reserve pot. This is predicted to be all gone next year, with an even bigger gap in the budget forecasted.

To give you some idea of the figures involved, the proposal is to use £14M of the reserves this year; we are looking at a potential budget shortfall of £67M next year and £75M the next. There was some hope at the start of this administration that a Conservative government would listen more to our six Tory MPs (five of whom had previously been Councillors) and deliver a fairer funding package for Cornwall. Unfortunately, there has been no political gain from this, and councils of all parties nationwide are facing impossible funding demands and decisions.

The funding situation for local authorities is dire. We urgently need wholesale reform of the way we fund adult social care, which remains one of the key reasons that the NHS is unable to make any headway with the current record waiting lists. Council Tax itself is a very regressive way of raising money, hitting poorer households disproportionally harder because it is, unbelievably, still based on property valuations made on 1st April 1991.

We desperately need reform on both, and with a general election this year and local elections in 2025, I sincerely hope that the issue of local government funding moves up the political agenda and finally gets the recognition and attention it needs.

She threw herself wholeheartedly into everything the village had to offer and was always one of the first to volunteer her practical help and support for many of our organisations and money-raising events. She organised a coffee morning to raise money for the Australian wildlife when wildfires there caused such devastation and was a great support for the village fundraising for Ukraine and then the Turkish earthquake appeal.

She was the Hon. Treasurer of the Community Centre for several years and was the instigator of the grants from Cornwall Council that enabled the Centre to remain viable during COVID. She was also Hon. Treasurer of the W.I., the Joybirds and the book club.

A prolific knitter and crocheter, Sue ran the Knit and Natter club for like-minded ladies and many items flew off their needles – from red poppies for display in the church on Armistice Day to knitted birds for the children's Birdie Trail and little hats for the tiny newborns in hospital.

She and her husband Kevin were enthusiastically involved in organising the Village Show; the Pantomime, making costumes and organising funding; and she helped with the Allotment Soup Kitchens. Until 2023 Sue also compiled the Timepiece, which was quite an undertaking.

I had the privilege of working on several committees with Sue over the years and could never thank her enough for her considerable contributions to St Teath. She will be sorely missed by many. We extend our greatest sympathies to Kevin and the family. Rest in peace Sue.



Geoff Steer

Geoff and Viv Steer bought the Corner Stores in St Teath in 1979, and from 1981 to 2000 employed a succession of teenage Kingdons, Mewtons and Blewetts, among others from the village and beyond. These are some of our collective fond memories of working with Geoff, who sadly passed away on 20 January.

It was a point of principle for Geoff to keep customers queuing outside the shop until the clock tower struck, never opening a minute earlier, even if it was raining. We were trained like Pavlov's dogs to respond to the bell above the door, rushing from the back of the shop while hastily finishing a mouthful of crib or penny sweets — Geoff used to jokingly scold us for eating his profits. On Saturday afternoons, he would watch golf on TV in the lounge, sometimes sneaking 40 winks while we served customers or restocked.

Geoff was an unassuming and easy-going character, always golf-ready in a polo shirt and V-neck jumper. He had a listening ear for community news but was never a gossip; never rushed but always interested. When something tickled him, Geoff had an infectious physical laugh that made his whole body dance, often asking the narrator "Is that right?" then chuckling again.

Geoff and Viv trusted us to pay our own wages and lock up, and taught us about responsibility, customer service, professionalism and business sense. They were not just employers, but more like godparents, giving us opportunities, guidance, support and love. Thinking back, we all realise how much working for Geoff influenced our young lives, allowing us to form deep roots in our community that persist today, and to experience work and learn values that have benefited us. We're not sure any of us will ever have so much impact on just one other person as Geoff had on each of us. We send our condolences and sympathy to Viv and to the family and friends. Rest in peace, Geoff, and may the sun always shine on your game of golf in the sky.

A message from Reverend Nicki:

"It is with great excitement that I prepare to serve and minister in your churches and communities as your new Rector and Pioneer Priest. I look forward to meeting you soon and getting to know you, and I would like to take this opportunity to introduce myself...

I grew up in Hampshire with my parents and older brother where I regularly attended Church and Sunday school. During my teenage years, I engaged in a wide variety of activities and hobbies and did not actively make room for God in my life, so gradually drifted away from church.

In 1988, I married Andrew and, after we moved to Cornwall, I felt a strong sense that God was calling me back to Him, so Andrew and I started attending St Mary's Church in Callington.

After a few years of working in Lloyds Bank, I then became a full-time mum to our four daughters: Bethany, Kirsty, Rachel and Holly. Whilst they were growing up, I began my woodwind teaching practice. I found great joy in teaching many students to play instruments, helping them enjoy the love of music-making. 

Don't forget to move your clocks forward one hour at 2 am on 31st March. Honestly, who thought that losing an hour's sleep on Easter Day was a good idea?


When you have done that, allow an extra half hour while you remember how to change the time on the microwave and everything else in the house.

Or you could, of course, leave the clocks as they are until 26th October when they go back an hour, but you may be late for every appointment for seven months.




