# St Teath Village Show

The people of St Teath have pulled it off again. Despite the horrendous summer that we have all had, the competitors produced some of the finest fruit, vegetables and flowers that we have seen. And, once again, there were some excellent arts and crafts entries for this year's Village Show.

The largest section was the fruit and vegetables categories, in which there were 150 entries! In the Cut Flowers section there were over 100 entries! Overall, there were just over 570 entries – almost a new record – to make it one of the best St Teath Village Shows yet. My thanks go out to our dedicated committee, the judges, stewards and volunteers, this year's President Bob Fox, but mostly to the people of St Teath, who never fail to amaze me.

### St Teath Arts Fest 2024

Lambs and goats grazed peacefully on the lawn at the Old Vicarage, watched over by a dolphin, rook and seagull, while fish assumed uncharacteristic poses nearby. Yet all was not as it seemed. These were some of the spectacular displays created for St Teath's Arts Fest, an August bank holiday celebration of the arts created and performed by talented local artists, including children.

The church was a blaze of light and colour, art and crafts filling every available space. Visitors enjoyed paintings, ceramics, stained glass panels, woodwork, miniatures, photographs – a huge range of work by professional and amateur local artists. St Teath Art Group exhibited their work in the Hall. Members created an eye-catching display of ceramics,



portraits and landscapes in a variety of media, exhibiting their creativity, talent and enthusiasm.

'Words and Music for a Summer Evening' invited the weather to be unkind, and so it proved. Stubby's Jazz Band, along with guest soloists, soon brightened up the evening. Sue Bowden read works by John Betjeman, perfectly expressing the beauty and timelessness of our coast. Pimms and Prosecco offered a summer boost despite the rain and cold.

A highlight was the presentation of prizes by Bob Fox and Polly to the winners of the inaugural Anne Worrall 500 Words Short Story Competition – won by Cole Clements (above right), Eliana Cowles (left) and overall winner of the children's classes, Liam Curnow (below right).

Entries were of such a high standard that it was difficult to choose an overall winner of the competition, but judge Chloe Banks selected Reg Payne (below left) for his uplifting "Beat of the Wing". Congratulations to the winners and special thanks to Barbara Strachan for coordinating the competition and to the Banks family for their support.

Sunday afternoon's Organ and Choral concert given by Gareth Stubberfield and St Teath Church Choir continued the celebration of local music-making. A superb closing performance of Widor's Toccata

earned Gareth a well-deserved standing ovation. And the cream tea was enjoyed too!





Arts Fest proved to be a hugely successful community event, bringing people together and raising £1,250. This is to be shared between St Teath Church, £750 towards new carpets, St Teath Man Shed, £300 for materials, and St Teath Art Group, £200. # Methodist Musings – Be thankful!

Autumn seems to have arrived with a vengeance! The leaves are falling from the trees and our gardens are enriched with hues of red, brown and gold. So, as we leave summer behind, we look forward to approaching a season of celebrations.

As I write this, we're just starting a number of Harvest Festivals in our chapels and many of us will be looking forward to singing the ever popular "We plough the fields and scatter" and "Come ye thankful people come". Harvest Festival services, meals, auctions and sales are times when we come together to give thanks for God's provision.



We also look forward to other festivals and celebrations. In the Christian Church, rather than focusing on the increasingly popular Halloween, we tend to think more about All Hallows' Eve, when we're encouraged to remember and give thanks for people who've passed away, many of whom will have passed on 'God's story' or have been a positive influence in our lives. It's on this occasion when I remember people like my grandma, who always made time to chat and listen to me, no matter what she was doing, often offering words of encouragement, reminding me of relevant passages of scripture and sometimes giving stern advice! I wonder who you are thankful for, people who have enriched your life and without whom your life would've been impoverished?

The other big celebration is Bonfire Night, originally a thanksgiving for the failure of the plot to assassinate King James I, when Guy Fawkes was caught guarding gunpowder under the Houses of Parliament. Nowadays, we continue to celebrate with bonfires, fireworks and seasonal food as we get together with friends and family, and whilst the original reason for the celebration may have faded into the background, it's still a time to give thanks and celebrate life and light in the darkness. In the church, it reminds us of Jesus, who brings the light of God's love into what often seems to be a very dark world.

Although life can be challenging at times, we're told that being thankful can be very beneficial for our wellbeing. Indeed, the late Dr Michael Mosley advocated that as we climb into bed at the end of the day we count our blessings, thinking of three things that we're thankful for. Apparently scientific research shows that this not only makes us happier, but can bring physical health benefits too.

So as we travel through this season of celebrations, perhaps we can adopt an "attitude of gratitude" and maybe our lives will be enriched as we remember all the blessings we enjoy.

# **Community First Responders Update**

Firstly I would like to thank the 45 or so people who came along to the coffee morning in St Teath. Everyone seemed to have a good morning and, hopefully, all left much more confident in their ability to save a life if they ever have to face treating someone having a cardiac arrest. When we run these events it is always great when people say, as they leave, they now feel confident to "give it a go".

As first responders we try to get to calls as fast as possible and nearly always arrive before an ambulance but, with local geography being what it is, we are always relieved to see someone has started resuscitation. We may be able to do a bit more than you but your early efforts will make a huge difference in those circumstances.

The coffee morning raised £135 which goes to the South West Ambulance Service Trust Charity, ring fenced for items to assist your local first responders. We are funded jointly by it which has the role of expanding our ability, and by the Ambulance Service which provides the basics such as supplies. The Charity, for example provides the Raizer Chairs that you may have seen for lifting casualties off the floor. In this case the money is going to supply uniform jackets that not only keep your local responders warm in the winter but, are sometimes pressed into action to keep patients warm prior to the ambulance arriving.

The big news is that we now have 3 local First Responders with backup from the Tintagel and St Breward groups, which should greatly increase our availability.

Some of you may have seen the Responder Car which we had at the Delabole Carnival Services Day and at the St Teath coffee morning. These cars are provided by the Charity funds and allow responders to be much more mobile. They are often dual crewed and respond across the county as required. Currently, we only have one in Cornwall, but the charity has just started fund raising for a second one for us so we hope to have one based out of Bodmin and another out of Redruth. They cost (including the conversion and fitting out) is £30,000 so we have a steep hill to climb. All donations will be welcome. Finally we are considering more events to offer more training. At these events we will always cover resuscitation for people who haven't tried it before or who want to practise as that is vital. We are considering some other topics, possibly control of serious/catastrophic bleeding since that is another area where rapid and early treatment is essential.

# A Lay Reader Writes...

#### **Dear Friends**

Our villages and town have seen weeks of busyness and activity: shows, carnivals, festivals and more, all of which have been a success, due mainly to people coming together – using their talents to plan and organise, prepare and labour. A huge thank you for making this part of Cornwall such a special place in which to live.



How do you approach organising an event, whatever it may be? Do you write lists or wing it? Do you seek the help of others or rather work alone? Do you have countless sleepless nights before an event, or are you as cool as a cucumber? However you play it, some events require much planning...

When a new baby is due to arrive, there are many preparations to be made. They have many particular needs and they arrive with absolutely nothing to their name – they even have to be given that. Many young families struggle at this time, as the financial squeeze tightens. Do you know that Baby Basics operates in Cornwall?

"Baby Basics are a volunteer group aiming to support families who are struggling to meet the financial and practical burden of looking after a child," says organiser Jayne Reed. "We are trying to make things better for new mums and families with newborn babies and children up to 5 years old, working with health professionals to give support directly where it is needed. We provide donated equipment, toiletries for mum and child, clothes, toys and books. We buy new mattresses to supply with our cots, moses baskets and new sterilisers." Baby Basics works with midwives, health visitors and other professional groups; further details can be found at https://baby-basics.org.uk/

# **County Council**

One of the early decisions of the new Labour government has been extremely controversial – namely the dropping of the Winter Fuel Payments as a universal benefit for all pensioners.

This is something that the Lib Dems are challenging both locally at Cornwall Council and in Westminster – however, with such a large majority in the House of Commons this remains entirely in the hands of the government, and at the time of writing both the Prime Minister and the Chancellor of the Exchequer appear to be determined to push this through.



In Cornwall, around 119,600 pensioners will be affected by the change in eligibility criteria, meaning roughly 88% of pensioners currently eligible for Winter Fuel Payments will no longer be able to claim this support from this winter onwards. This is at a time when the Energy Price Cap is due to increase by 10%, which will add an additional £149 to the average household bill.

The Winter Fuel Payment will still be available to pensioners who claim Pension Credit but there is widespread concern that only 63% of eligible individuals are receiving it, leaving over a third without this vital support. This probably equates to well over 1500 pensioners in North Cornwall alone.

Pension Credit gives you extra money to help with your living costs if you're over State Pension age and on a low income. Pension Credit can also help with housing costs such as ground rent or service charges. If you have reached State Pension age and your weekly income is below £218.15 (or £332.95 if you live with a partner) you could be eligible – even if you own your home or have savings.

Even if you are close to these income levels and only eligible for a small top up – you will also become eligible for other help such as the Winter Fuel Allowance, Housing Benefit (if you are in rented accommodation), Council Tax discount and a free TV licence if you are over 75.

You can claim online through the GOV.UK website or you can ring the Pension Credit Hotline on 0800 99 1234 and they can fill in the application form for you over the phone.



Will and Rudi took part in several competitions at WAO and the number of high quality competitors



our pair would be facing was clear from the start. Agility round 1 was in the main arena and a steady, well-handled clear round was exactly what was required. This clear round was good enough to see them through to rounds 3 and 4 despite an elimination in Round 2. The jumping course was a lovely one for Rudi to finish on, overcoming some fatigue to produce one final clear round. What a super way to finish a stellar career at the World Championships! There were plenty of celebrations, and not a few tears from supporters and Scotland team members, as Rudi took the final jump. Will and Rudi, in a pentathlon class of nearly 100 of the world's best pairings, finished in a very creditable 35th place.

On his retirement, we should say a few words about Rudi. This incredible dog was rehomed aged 17 months and Will was told by his previous owner that he was untrainable. Nothing could be further from the truth. Despite his late start, Rudi has had an incredible career with Will. The pair have twice brought home gold medals for Team GB from the Junior Open Agility World Championships, have a record breaking 7 Young Kennel Club titles together at Crufts, countless championship final appearances, a fourth place finish in the final of KCI - the biggest agility show in the world, and Rudi won an International Tour event meaning Will became the youngest ever handler to achieve this feat. All of this when lockdown robbed Rudi of nearly two years of competition in the middle of his career when he was at his absolute peak. He is the most loving, loyal and easily trainable agility dog you could wish for - a true star.

Rudi is now enjoying his well-deserved retirement, whilst Will is focussing on the next agility dog in the family, Brave, who has already started to move up the grades. 


