St Teath Preschool

As many of us are aware, there are many varied clubs in St Teath. If you are new, feeling a bit blue or looking for something different, there is always something interesting to do in the village.

Yoga with Fran

On Tuesday morning, the Hall is full of St Teathians perfecting their half monkey in Francesca Gilpin's yoga class. Fran lives in Delabole and trained in vinyasa yoga in India in 2017. Vinyasa involves moving from one pose to the next in a flowing sequence that's coordinated with the breath. The 9.15–10.15 class is suitable for all ages and all abilities. The 10.15–11.15 chair yoga class is for anyone wanting to improve their mobility, posture and balance: all the exercises involve sitting down or holding on to a chair (pictured top right).

Classes cost £10 per session (or five classes for £45 if booked in advance). Both groups have proved very popular with ladies and gentlemen: the sessions are friendly and welcoming, and all Fran's students have improved their balance and strength. So, if you think you might be ready to try a warrior one (pictured right), pop along to the Hall on a Tuesday morning.





St Teath Art Club

The Art Club meets in the Community Centre on Wednesday afternoons. The artists bring their own work and materials to enjoy each other's company and some refreshments while working on varied projects (pictured below). The Allotment Association hold an annual Soup Kitchen in the Community Centre to raise funds that enable the committee to keep improving the allotment site. This year, the soup kitchen attracted a large number of people who enjoyed our wholesome soups, cakes and of course a raffle with some excellent prizes. The fact that the café was closed might have helped as well!

For £3, you could choose from Curried Parsnip, Leek and Potato, Spicy Bean or Carrot and Coriander soup with a roll! Value for money indeed.

For those who wanted dessert, we had a choice of seven cakes (some of which are pictured below being sampled by some familiar faces) and buns with a cup of tea or coffee: lunch for £5. The committee made enough soup for 80+ people, and at the end of the afternoon only a few portions of soup were left... and no cakes.

Thank you to the committee for the planning and hard work, especially to Lyn Gale who sourced in excess of 30 prizes for the raffle; made enough soup for 40+ people; waited front of house and even made special dietary soup for some people who requested it the week before.

But the biggest thank you has to go the lovely people of this village who turned up and supported us to the tune of £414.89. This will help pay for the access improvement as well as a second water butt on site – which will be a great help to all plot holders. We hope to do it again next year.





Reverend Jeffrey Writes...

I wonder whether you will be reading this in Advent as we again look forward to Christmas?

When we are children, I rather doubt that Advent makes much impact upon us other than the excitement of the daily opening of the Advent calendar and the discovery of the little treasures lying behind each unopened door. As parents of young children we are likely to be too focused on preparing for the coming festivities to find much time for reflection on the meaning of the season. And what are we to make of it when we have become 'empty nesters'? Is the season then



tinged with a little sadness? And what if you are single and lonely, or one of those for whom Christmas is always touched with sadness because it reminds you of a lost loved one or some other past trauma? Are you looking forward to enjoying Yuletide, or perhaps dreading a rather sadder Christmas than those happier ones of the past?

If Christmas is a sad time for you, do consider attending Rev. Geraldine's Blue Christmas service at St Thomas's in Camelford at 7pm on 5th December for comfort and, perhaps, a little healing.

But, whatever your situation, do find time to reflect on what Advent is really all about. Advent is a time of preparing ourselves for the coming of Christ at Christmas and is a mixed time of both penitence and joyful expectation. Penitence is appropriate: Jesus began his preaching by asking us to repent because the kingdom of God had come near. The kingdom is near if we approach Christmas in the right way, looking forward in expectation not only to the first coming of Jesus as a human baby two millennia ago, but also to His promised second coming when He returns to reconcile the whole of creation to Himself.

Seeking forgiveness for our failings in Advent is appropriate, but focusing overmuch on this can make Advent seem a time of darkness. That is not by any means the whole story, because Christmas is a time of joy and the other side of Advent is looking forward in joyful expectation of this.

15th December is Gaudate Sunday, named from the Latin for 'rejoice'. Pope Francis calls this the Sunday of Joy, when instead of fretting about "all they still haven't" done to prepare for Christmas, people should "think of all the good things life has given you".

Remember this if you are still panicking about getting ready for Christmas on 15th December or if you are, for some reason, feeling dark and blue; and allow yourself to experience the light and joy of the good news that the Christchild brings this, and every, Christmas.

A Letter From Your MP

Hello again, St Teath. Between constituency surgeries, visits to community centres and local businesses, and scrutinising the Government's budget announcement, I've had a busy few weeks.

I stood up to Labour in the Chamber recently and told them that we don't need damaging measures like the new 'GP Tax', the 'Family Farm Tax', or the Winter Fuel Cut. These policies will hit North Cornwall hard, impacting everything from health care to agriculture. In my Budget response, I urged the Labour Government to instead reverse the Tories' huge cut to the Big Banks Tax, which would raise



£4 billion per year. This could help with critical hospital building upgrades at Treliske, North Devon and Derriford hospitals – something our region desperately needs.

The £1-billion boost for special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) provision announced in the budget was a welcome one, and I'm proud of the role we played in pushing for this outcome following our SEND Summit in Bodmin. However, I'm very concerned that a large number of the government's plans will hurt the "working people" they claim to represent.

I've also been out in towns like Bodmin, Camelford and Bude recently, to hold face-to-face surgeries to connect with constituents and hear your concerns at first hand. Following the recent surgery in Bude, I spent the afternoon knocking on doors and engaging with residents directly in a doorstep surgery. It's essential to me that I remain accessible and responsive to your needs, and these visits are always invaluable. If you'd like to learn when I'll be coming to a town or village near you, and want to book a surgery appointment, please email me at ben.maguire.mp@parliament.uk. I also offer phone surgery appointments for those who might be unable to get out to one in person.

Community safety was another big topic on my agenda recently. I met with the policing inspector in Bodmin to address rising issues of anti-social behaviour and drug abuse. Ensuring our towns remain safe and welcoming for everyone is a top priority, and I'm committed to working closely with local authorities to find effective solutions.

And of course, last month marked an important moment of reflection. I laid a Remembrance Cross in the Remembrance Garden at the Palace of Westminster to honour the Cornish soldiers who gave their lives in conflict. Inscribed on the cross was the phrase Yn Kovadh (In Remembrance), complete with a small Cornish flag. It's vital that we never forget the sacrifices made by so many in our communities, and those who never returned home. I attended a service in Bodmin to lay a wreath on Sunday 10th November, and a separate service in Camelford on the 11th to pay respects.

Lastly, on a slightly lighter note, I'd like to give a huge thank you to all the children and schools who have participated in our Christmas Card competition. I am thrilled to say we received hundreds of creative and heartwarming entries from across North Cornwall. I'm looking forward to showcasing the winning designs soon!



Even though I am writing this in early November – and the weather is more like late September – our TV screens are already full of Christmas adverts, and so it does not feel too early to wish everyone a very Merry Christmas.

It is heartening to see so many villages still maintaining the tradition of Christmas lights. It is uplifting to see these community displays, so please give a thought to the hard-working committees for whom this is practically a

year-round job – with planning for next year starting almost as soon as the lights come down in January.



However, I am pleased to see that low-income households in Cornwall will once again receive payments to help with the ongoing cost of living crisis after Cornwall Council secured £4.5 million through the Household Support Fund (HSF).

Payments of £80 per person will be made automatically to those eligible, including pensioners receiving council tax support and vulnerable adults on a low income. In a change to the way HSF funds are allocated, this latest round will see an £80 payment made to an additional 3,000 pensioners in receipt of council tax support – previously only those in receipt of pension credit received payments.

Hopefully this will be of help to some of those who were affected by the punitive decision of this new Labour government to remove the Winter Fuel Allowance as a universal benefit – a policy my party does not support. A payment of £80 per child will also be made to low-income households who claim council tax support.

In addition, Cornwall Council will use any remaining funds to work with providers such as Citizens Advice Cornwall, Age UK, Community Energy Plus, Cornwall Carers Service and Disability Cornwall to ensure other financially vulnerable residents are assisted where appropriate. Please do contact any of these services if you feel you need help.

Meanwhile, I hope that you are all able to take some time to enjoy the many carol services and community events in the run up to Christmas and, more importantly, spend time with your extended families over the holiday break. These represent the true spirit of the season.

Methodist Musings – It's Traditional!

We're fast approaching Christmas and the New Year, when many of us will celebrate with family traditions either passed down through the generations, or perhaps more recently embraced. Perhaps you're visited by the elves during Advent, who get up to all sorts of mischief, much to the delight of younger members of the family, and often to the frustration of those who are a little older as they unravel toilet paper, spill flour on the kitchen worktop, climb the Christmas tree and so on.



Then there's the tradition of putting up the tree and decorations – do you do it weeks ahead of the big day, or just a few days before? Do you still send Christmas cards, or is that a tradition that has slipped now, preferring to send texts, messages or putting a post on social media?

Then there'll be the special and treasured traditions that are unique to your family. One of ours is Christmas morning breakfast – quite a unique menu originating where we grew up in the mining villages of the East Midlands! We enjoy nothing more than tucking in to a plate of ham, ox tongue and pork pie first thing on Christmas morning, listening to carols playing and enjoying the atmosphere of the day.

Of course, for us, Christmas wouldn't be complete without our most important tradition of celebrating the birth of Jesus. Sadly, we've noticed that in the majority of retail outlets and garden centres now, there is very little evidence of Jesus at all. One or two may have a nominal ornament depicting the nativity, but mostly we're offered snowmen, reindeer, Father Christmas, penguins and other festive decorations. These are all lovely, but it does seem that, in general, Jesus has been squeezed out of Christmas and has been replaced by these winter related items.

As Christians, we believe that what we celebrate at Christmas is the wonderful act of God stepping into a broken and hurting world, bringing the message of his love and well-being for all of creation, something that is needed and longed for just as much now as it was all those years ago. But Jesus isn't just a tradition that we repeat year on year, to give us a warm fuzzy feeling, but rather Jesus is, as one child told me "God with skin on", who came to show how great God's love is for each and every one of us.



"I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full." (John 10:10)


