



A Letter From Your MP

Dear Residents of St Teath,

I'd like to start by saying what an absolute privilege it is to be asked to contribute to your newsletter. Small, close-knit communities like yours make up the beating heart of North Cornwall, and they are always a delight to visit.

To update you on my work, it's been a very busy month for me both here in Cornwall, and up in Westminster fighting on your behalf. I made my maiden speech in the Commons, focusing on bringing



well-paid, highly-skilled jobs to Cornwall. As the new Government promises more housing developments, I made it clear that we need homes that, crucially, local people can actually afford – not just executive builds. These issues have affected Cornwall for generations (dating even as far back to my predecessors John Pardoe and Paul Tyler), and I will be fighting to ensure that new homes come with the infrastructure and opportunities our community needs.

I also had the opportunity to ask the Prime Minister, Keir Starmer, if he will meet all six Cornish MPs to address some of the most critical issues facing Cornwall – including chronic underfunding of public services, the lack of affordable housing, and the challenge of retaining young talent in the region. I asked the Prime Minister for this meeting so that we can talk about devolution for Cornwall and the establishment of a Cornish Assembly. Such an assembly would recognise our distinct culture, language and national minority status, while giving us the power to unlock Cornwall's full economic potential. I'm pleased to report that the Prime Minister has committed to meeting with us to explore this crucial issue further. I will update you all on this in due course.

We also recently marked 100 days since the election, where I took the opportunity to get out and speak with residents in Wadebridge and Bodmin. It's essential to hear directly from you, the people I'm working on behalf of, about what issues need addressing. I'll also be holding more surgeries across North Cornwall in the coming weeks, so whether you want to discuss casework or give feedback, please don't hesitate to get in touch to book an appointment.

I'm also very concerned about the underspending in the agricultural support budget, with £350m left unused over the past three years. This is funding that could have supported farmers across North Cornwall. With the Basic Payment Scheme being reduced, many farmers are left uncertain about the new Environmental Land Management (ELMS) schemes. I'll be meeting with Farming Minister Daniel Zeichner in a few weeks, so please reach out and share how this is affecting you. Your input will be invaluable as I push for more clarity and support for our agricultural sector.

Lastly, I was proud to meet with CAMRA (Campaign for Real Ale) recently to discuss how we can better support our local breweries and pubs. Small brewers often struggle to compete with massive global companies, which dominate the market. Local pubs should be free to stock a wider variety of beers, and I'll continue advocating for policies that help our independent brewers and pubs thrive. Now is the time to get behind our local businesses, and they need our support more than ever.



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Revd Nicki Writes...

Dear Friends

As the evenings draw in and the days get shorter, we move into November and find ourselves in a place of remembering.

The profile of Remembrance Day and Remembrance Sunday services has steadily grown momentum over the last few



decades. Poppies, a sign of remembrance for all those who gave their lives in service during the wars, have become more varied in design. We now see many artistic creations on display both in our communities and as a personal badge as people wear their poppy as a sign of never forgetting. Services across our churches and at war memorials will gather people as they pay respect to the memory of those both named and unnamed on war memorials in the area.

Remembering at this national and community level is just one area of remembrance that takes place. 1st November is All Saint's Day. This is a day to remember all the saints and martyrs during Christian history. This is then followed by All Soul's Day on 2nd November to commemorate those who have passed within the faith. This brings remembrance to a personal level as we think about and remember our loved ones.

Remembering is an important aspect of the Christian faith. Throughout the Old Testament, God's people were encouraged to remember all that God had done for them and to pass these memories onto the next generations. It was through remembering that God's people were empowered to keep going during times of struggle and it was through remembering that God's people were filled with praise and sang many hymns and songs to reflect this. The Psalms give a vast arsenal of ancient hymns that help us to deal with a wide range of emotions.

In the New Testament, we note the importance Jesus placed on remembering, when at The Last Supper while preparing his disciples for his impending death he said, 'Do this in remembrance of me.' Each time we celebrate Holy Communion we too, as his disciples, remember what Christ has done for each of us through his death and resurrection. It reminds us of the price he paid for sin, and the love he has for each of us, as he affirms our value and worth through his sacrificial love. As we remember this, we too can be empowered to deal with the struggles of life and in turn this gives us hope causing us to sing God's praise.

Wherever you find yourself in this season, whatever you find yourself remembering, maybe you might like to turn to the Psalms to find words of comfort and hope. Alternatively you may like to remember the story of Jesus and read through one of the Gospels.

May God bless you in this season of Remembrance.

County Council

Back in 2017, I led a small committee at New County Hall that was put together to look at all aspects of the Council's waste and recycling policies, and specifically to make recommendations to the Cabinet regarding the renewal of the household collection contract with Biffa.

Our remit was to see whether we could make changes that would improve overall recycling rates in Cornwall, which at the time were a little over 30% and some of the poorest in the



country. We took evidence from a very broad range of witnesses, including other local authorities from as far away as North Wales, and commercial firms right through the waste and recycling supply chains.

The resulting 158-page report led to several key recommendations, some of which are finally now being rolled out in North Cornwall. Two of the key aspects are the introduction of a weekly food waste collection and the issuing of wheelie bins to most households for a fortnightly general black-bag waste collection.

When we looked at evidence from our current no-limit black-bag collections, we found each bag contained around 22% of waste that could already be recycled using the current service and that 35% of each bag was food waste. This is quite a shocking figure – especially in a time when food inflation has been such a key part of the recent cost-of-living crisis.

The early statistics from areas such as South East Cornwall – already up and running with the new collection service – are that recycling rates are now consistently well over 50%, which is comfortably above most international standards and better than most authorities in England.

These changes are something that I am very proud to have played a significant part in. They are estimated to reduce Cornwall's carbon footprint by 18,000 tonnes of CO₂ per year. Hopefully, this is only the beginning of our progress towards a greener, more circular economy, and we still have much that we can learn from Wales, which is now cited as the second-best recycling nation in the world with rates of around 70%.
