Methodist Musings – Love is in the air

2025 is now well under way as we enjoy snowy landscapes, glowing hearths and firesides, warming winter fare and much more. Christmas seems but a distant memory and we prepare to celebrate the many festivals and events that will soon be upon us, the next being Valentine's Day, when we are encouraged to tell our nearest and dearest how much they are loved by sending cards, flowers, chocolates or maybe even giving a diamond ring!!



A group of 4–8-year-olds were asked how someone knows they're loved – here's a couple of their responses:

"I know my older sister loves me because she gives me all her old clothes and has to go out and buy new ones."

"Love is like a little old woman and a little old man who are still friends even after they know each other so well."

Love is a basic human need, essential to our well-being. It's something that experts tell us we experience in different ways. They call them "love languages": words of affirmation, quality time, physical touch, acts of service and gifts. Each of us will have a preference but will often respond to the others in some way as well. Love, of course, is also the basis of the Christian faith. Initiated by a God who loves the whole of creation – people, animals, nature and so on – all that ever has been, all that is, and all that ever will be. Indeed, not only do we understand God as being full of love and loving actions, but the Bible tells us that God IS love. In other words, love is God's DNA.

Of course, the sceptics would say that if God is love then there would be no war, disease, suffering etc, and space doesn't allow us to go into this discussion right now. However, when we consider the things that bring sadness and despair, we realise just how much the world needs love, the perfect love of God. In the Bible we read that "we love because God first loved us" (1 John 4:19) and it's when we fail to do so that life doesn't go as it should.

So as we approach Valentine's Day, whether we celebrate it or not, maybe we can stop and remember that, as the Burt Bacharach song of 1965 says, "What the world needs now, is love sweet love." It was a song borne out of the conflict in Vietnam, but it's a song that speaks into our times too, because if we all loved not only as God would like us to, but as much as we are loved by God, then the world would indeed be "a better place" for everyone, just as it's intended to be.

You might not be aware that you could be eligible for an Attendance Allowance. This is a benefit paid by the government. All the information below was taken from the Gov.uk website.

Although we are NOT experts, we are happy to help where we can. So, if you think you might be eligible – but don't know how to apply - contact one of us and we will try our best to help. You can contact us by e mail – or have a chat if you prefer.

Attendance Allowance helps with extra costs if you have a disability or health condition severe enough that you need someone to help look after you. **You do not have to have someone caring for you in order to claim.**

There's a different way to claim if you're nearing the end of life (for example, because you have a life-limiting illness).

It's paid at 2 different rates and how much you get depends on the level of care that you need because of your disability or health condition. You could get £72.65 or £108.55 a week to help with personal support if both of the following apply:

- You have a physical disability, a mental disability, or a health condition;
- You're State Pension age or older.

It does not cover mobility needs.

You could get extra Pension Credit, Housing Benefit or Council Tax Reduction if you get Attendance Allowance.

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- Your National Insurance number;
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- Details of the disability or health condition that you need extra help for;
- Details of your GP surgery or medical centre;
- Details of your care home, hospital or hospice if you're currently staying in one.

The new service will accept a limited number of applications each week.

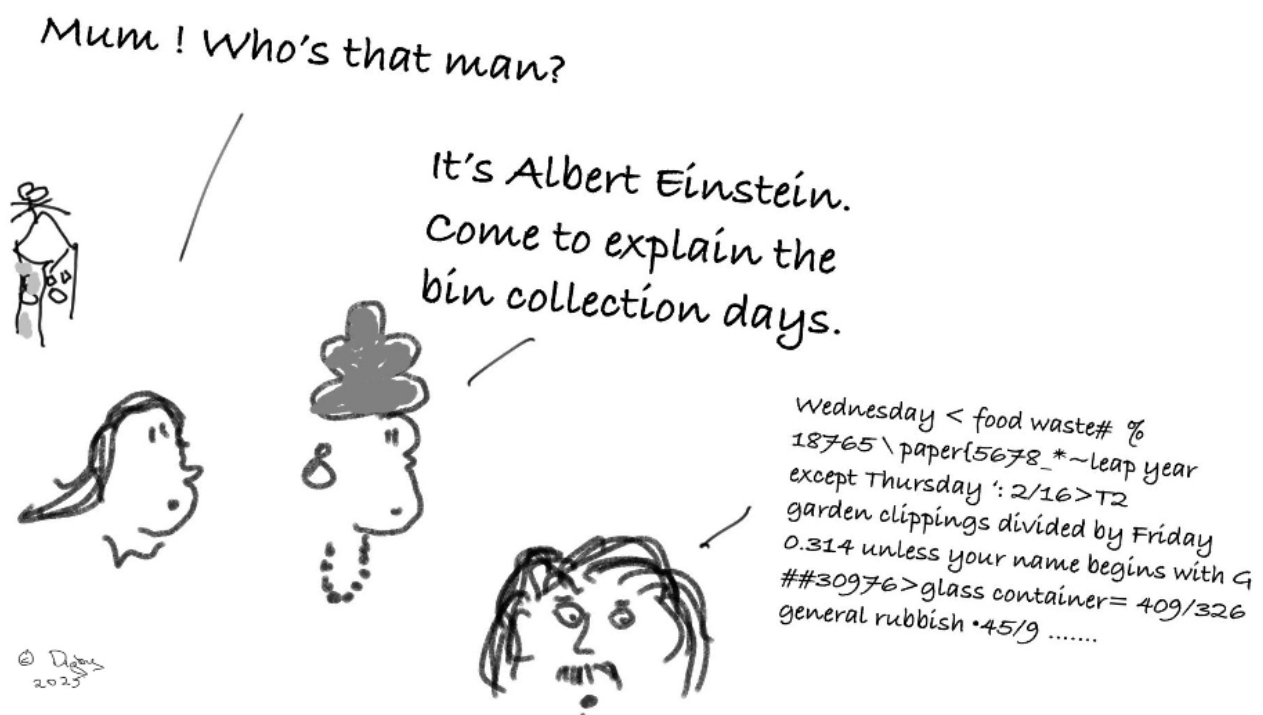

A Letter From Your MP

Happy New Year! The biggest update from these last weeks has undoubtedly been my call for the Chief Exec of South West Water, Susan Davy, to step down. In a letter co-signed by MPs from both the Lib Dems and Labour Party (while no Conservatives agreed to sign), we made it clear that the current leadership at South West Water has failed our region. Over 530,000 hours of sewage dumping were recorded in the South West last year, an 83% increase on the previous year. Here in North Cornwall specifically, where we pride ourselves on stunning blue flag beaches, there were spills that damaged our local businesses, our families' quality of life, and our precious environment that I know many cherish dearly. It has come to the point where enough is simply enough, and Susan Davy must go.



Despite repeated calls for new infrastructure to tackle this crisis head-on, South West Water has instead spent its time acquiring other companies, while simultaneously seeing a 10% rise in their revenue (£908 million last financial year), and hiking up customer bills. Susan Davy even increased her total compensation by over £300,000 to £860,000 a year - despite 'declining' a formal bonus. It's increasingly clear the company has prioritised profits over the vital investment needed in storm overflows, and our message to South West Water is loud and unambiguous: we have reached our limit. The people of North Cornwall, and indeed the whole of the South West, cannot keep tolerating a system that pollutes our beaches and rivers while charges soar. For nearly a decade, first as Chief Financial Officer and now as Chief Executive Officer, Ms Davy has presided over environmental neglect, skyrocketing bills, and inadequate solutions.

Outside of this issue, I also raised an important resilience measure in Parliament on behalf of one of my constituents, after concerns of how Storm Darragh battered our rural communities. I proposed mandating battery back-ups on all mobile phone masts, both existing and newly installed, to maintain vital communication services during power outages. For rural areas like ours, being able to call for help or keep in touch with loved ones during a major storm (or flooding event like we saw in Boscastle in 2004) can literally save lives. I'll keep pressing Ministers on this until we see genuine progress.

Meanwhile, I also held a constituent surgery and meetings in Bodmin this week, where I met local residents and campaigners including parents advocating for 'Ryan's Law'. They propose a change that would widen the definition of death by dangerous driving to include failing to stop, call 999, and give first aid. Their story is very emotional, and I will be proud to help champion their campaign in Parliament going forward.

Finally, Cornwall Council's plan to remove 28 car parks from its management has sparked significant concern. Many worry about effects on local businesses and accessibility, especially in our smaller towns. I've encouraged my constituents to submit their feedback on this issue before the closing deadline of the consultation. 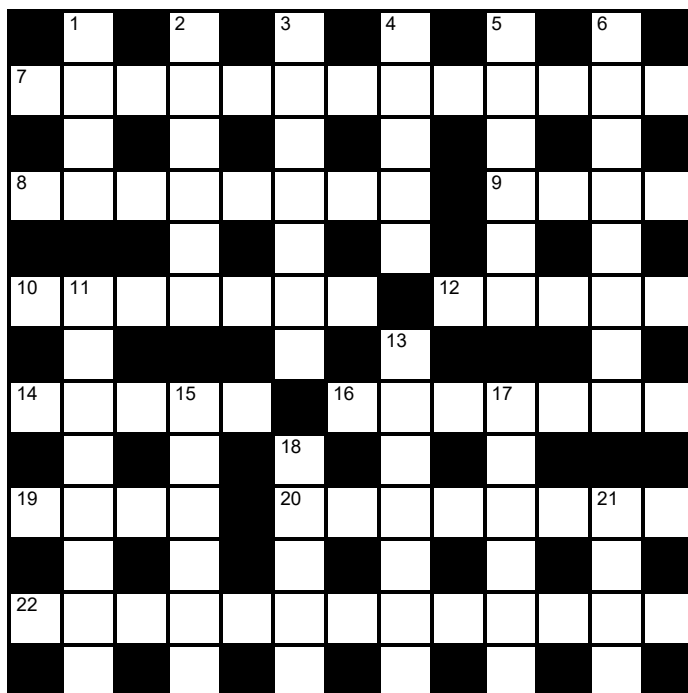

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Revd Nicki Writes...

Dear Friends

We love to talk about the weather. Over the last few months, we've experienced many different weathers, from rain and wind storms, to snow and sleet, right through to the beautiful, bright crisp days filled with winter sun. In our daily routines, the weather can suddenly throw a few curve balls where decisions need to be made on how to proceed with plans. Weather warnings are becoming more frequent, along with travel advice to be careful and only travel if you need to. Additionally, the raft of stories on Facebook with pictures and viewpoints of what people should or shouldn't do form a myriad of advice.



But how do we cope and respond when plans suddenly have to change, the unexpected catches us out or things turn out differently to what we anticipated? It is not just our travel plans that might have to be suddenly re-routed or postponed, but our life journeys can also take unexpected twists and turns that need to be navigated.

Our Church calendar takes us on a journey after Christmas through the season of Epiphany. This follows the journey of the Magi or Wise men, who followed a star to lead them to the Christ-child. It was a journey of many twists and turns involving a visit to Herod's Palace that filled them with concern, and a warning to find another route back. But with all that the journey entailed, it brought a moment of revelation – an Epiphany moment. A moment when the Messiah was revealed to the travellers but now also recognised in the Christian Church as a moment when Jesus was revealed to the world as a Light in the darkness. This was good news, although not recognised by everyone as such.

But here we are over 2,000 years later, and still people are having epiphany moments – that the story of Jesus Christ, his birth and death, are relevant and lead into a life-changing story of faith. It may not involve a long distance of physical travel, hampered by the weather, but often comes in the journey of one's life story where the twists and turns, challenges and joys can come unexpectedly and where it is difficult to anticipate the weather forecast of life with no advance weather warning.

These epiphany moments may come in a time of quiet, where you become aware of a peace which passes all understanding and recognise the peace of Christ with you. Or you may have attended a Christmas service or carol service where you felt a deep sense of joy listening to the Christmas story and singing the words of the carols, noting the profound impact these words were having on you. Or you may have an epiphany moment when out in the countryside or at the coast, when you recognise the beauty of God in creation and that your personal story of life is part of a story that is bigger than you can ever imagine.

So as we travel together in this journey of life in 2025, I pray that you will have those epiphany moments when you experience the love, hope, peace and joy of the Christ-child, and just like the wise men, you receive that revelation of Jesus's love, light and life for you. Every blessing for 2025.

CROCUS SUNDAY

The new Labour government has made some very bold policy choices since the general election - many of which have been very prominently covered in the press. In particular, both the removal of the universal Winter Heating Allowance and changes to Agricultural Property Relief (APR) for inheritance tax purposes have had deep implications for rural North Cornwall.



In my own opinion, there were reasonable grounds for looking at both of these issues – however, I also believe that on both policies they went too far. The cut-off point for pensioners should have been higher than simply choosing to retain payments for those on pension credits, and the £1M of APR for family farms is setting the bar far too low. In addition, by giving a discounted rate after APR, it will remain attractive to non-farming investors to keep buying land and so keeping the price of land artificially high and beyond the reach of new entrants.

The next big reform which will have a significant impact in our area will be the Planning and Infrastructure Bill which was announced in the King's speech.

Over the eight years I have been a Cornwall Councillor we have had a good record of housing delivery in Cornwall - especially of affordable housing. In 2016 we adopted a set of local policies under the Cornwall Local Plan and these have been very successful in ensuring that we build the right types of housing in the most appropriate places.

However, it cannot be denied that over this time, and especially since the pandemic, the housing crisis both nationally and in Cornwall has continued to deepen to the point where more radical thinking is both required and desirable.

Ahead of the Bill the government has already reintroduced mandatory housing targets for Local Authorities and in Cornwall we are being asked to deliver 4,454 new homes per year - which is a 60% increase on the old target of 2,707. This has had the immediate effect of rendering the Cornwall Local Plan as insufficient and inadequate to meet our housing needs in Cornwall and also means that many Neighbourhood Development Plans will no longer carry any weight in planning decisions.

None of the parishes in my division have gone down the Neighbourhood Development Plan route, however all planning applications now will be judged on national policies with a "presumption in favour of sustainable development." Again, I feel that this is too blunt an instrument and would have preferred to see a "presumption in favour" only in the case of developments that deliver an identified local housing need and were predominately social or affordable housing. We need more homes for local people than simply more houses.

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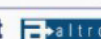
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Speedwatch

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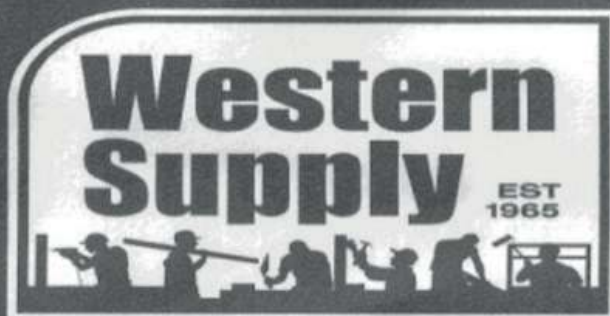
