#### Want to help shape our community?

In May, all of the seven parish councillor positions will be up for election in the county's local council elections. Anyone who lives within the parish boundary is allowed to stand for election and if successful, they will serve a four-year term.

The primary role of a parish councillor is to represent your area and those who live in it: acting as a bridge between your community and the Council. As well as being an advocate for local residents and signposting them to the right people at Cornwall Council and other relevant organisations and helplines, you will also keep them informed about the issues that affect them.

#### New year, new budget

The Council has spent the last few weeks finetuning its budget for the year 2025 – 2026, which begins on 1 April. The Council has some exciting plans for the future of the Parish and is working closely with Cornwall Council to find solutions to some of the issues we face as a community.

In light of the rise in operating costs however, the Council has agreed to increase the Precept request of Cornwall Council to £31,000 to ensure it can not only cover its ongoing costs, but also deliver the major devolution project for the village with the Pre-school building, Football Club and associated grounds coming under the Council's ownership. It is worth noting that the Council has only increased its Precept once over the past four years, and, for context, with the introduction of the new second home tax within the county, this will mean that a Band D annual community tax contribution will rise by £3.36.

#### Helping our more vulnerable residents

The Council is keen to understand how many vulnerable residents are living within our community. It especially wants to consider how it could feasibly support those who may be vulnerable and need extra help in case of power-outage affecting their emergency communication needs following the national roll-out of the new voice over Internet telephone service.

# Staying Connected in St Teath: the BT Digital Switchover



Any change can be worrying, especially if it involves things we use every day. So, the members of St Teath's Man Shed have been thinking how we can help our community to navigate the changes that are being made to our phone lines.

#### What is happening:

The way our landline phones operate is changing. (This will not affect mobile phones.) The copper cable that links your phone to the BT lines is going to be replaced. This might have been done already: if your house is linked to the Internet by a cable, you are halfway there.

When the switchover happens, your landline phone will be linked to the broadband Internet cable – not the old copper phone lines.

BT will provide you with a new box. This is the link to broadband. You will need to plug your phone into this box. You might get help from BT with this.

Your phone will now have some additional features. Learning about these is important. The change should mean:

- Clearer calls: Say goodbye to crackling and fuzzy lines. Digital calls are usually much clearer.
- New features: Caller ID, voicemail and call waiting often available at no extra cost.

But there are some important things to remember:

- Broadband needed: Your phone will now rely on your broadband Internet. If your Internet is down, your phone won't work.
- Power outages: If the power goes out, your digital phone will also stop working. It's a good idea to have a mobile phone handy for emergencies. A cheap, call-only phone will be good enough.
- Alarms and health-care devices: If you have a personal alarm, a burglar alarm or any other device connected to your current phone line, it's crucial to contact your provider. They will need to make sure it works with the new digital system. Don't delay this it's very important for your safety and well-being.

Don't worry: BT is there to help. They have dedicated support teams to guide you through the process. If you have any questions, don't hesitate to contact them.

#### So what now?

It is important you keep and read any information sent to you about BT digitalisation.

St Teath Man Shed members are putting together a plan to help our elderly community with this change, and it will be readily available to all. We will be using Timepiece, the village website and St Teath Facebook page to offer suitable advice.

We will attend the weekly Tuesday village coffee morning to offer advice and answer questions. Look out for special guides we will be producing. These will be made available around the village. We will provide any necessary one-to-one support and home visits. Meanwhile, if you are worried or want advice about these changes give me a call. If I can't help, I know a man who can.

#### A Letter From Your MP

Hello again St. Teath! Quite a few updates for you all – with one of the most heartfelt of these being when I had the privilege to speak up in Parliament for the family behind the Ryan's Law campaign.

Their son, Ryan Saltern, tragically lost his life when he was hit by a car just outside the village. The driver received a mere four-month suspended sentence despite failing to stop, call emergency services, or render aid. I took to the House to urge the Solicitor General to work with the CPS and the Department for Transport to strengthen our dangerous driving laws. Ryan's family – and our wider



community here in North Cornwall – deserve justice and much tougher penalties to ensure no family has to suffer such loss again. I will be giving my full support to the campaign going forwards as always, and want to thank them for their tireless work so far.

On another crucial front, several constituents have got in touch about the closure of local bank branches, notably Lloyds and Halifax in Launceston. In response, I proposed in Parliament the introduction of mobile banking hubs for our rural areas. The initiative would be designed to ensure that everyone in towns like Launceston and Wadebridge have easy and reliable access to essential banking services, even as traditional branches face closure (which we're seeing more of at the moment especially). I will also be reaching out to LINK to see whether we can have a permanent banking hub installed in Launceston, just like the one in Bodmin, and will keep you updated on my progress.

There's also some welcome news from Launceston that I'm excited to share. Following a constituent's concern about the removal of the bus stop at Tesco, I'm delighted to report that the stop will be reinstated soon. Reliable public transport is vital for rural communities like ours, where it can be very difficult to get around. Having this stop restored will help to ease daily commutes and support local commerce, and I'm glad the Tesco Services Manager and Store Manager were very proactive in helping get things sorted.

I was also pleased to gather our North Cornwall Liberal Democrat candidates, to prepare for the upcoming Cornwall Council elections. Our team is very united in its determination to challenge Tory dominance and work towards a more responsive local government here in Cornwall that truly represents our community's needs. I encourage anyone interested in getting involved or learning more about our campaign to reach out and join us!

I had another very productive visit to a GP surgery, this time at Petroc Group Practice in St Columb. It was a great opportunity to discuss a few casework items with the practice manager, as well as to hear about some of the wider issues GP surgeries here in North Cornwall are facing.

Lastly, I have a few casework surgeries coming up in various towns near St Teath soon – and these face-to-face sessions are really invaluable to my work as your MP, because they provide direct insights into the issues that matter most. 



### Rev. Jeffrey Writes...

Anyone even remotely interested in the affairs of the Church of England is likely to be aware of the almost seismic reverberations with which it has been rocked in recent years, months and weeks over safeguarding issues. No right-thinking person, whether a regular churchgoer or not, could feel anything other than disgust and horror at some of the revelations to which we have been subjected in recent times.



A YouGov poll in February revealed that the number of people holding a favourable view of the Church of England fell from an already low 32% before the recent resignation of Justin Welby, the Archbishop of Canterbury, over safeguarding issues to just 25% now. Even among Anglicans the number has fallen from 66% to just 54% over the past few months.

As I write, the first General Synod of the Church following the resignation of the Archbishop of Canterbury is about to be held: the future of safeguarding in the Church of England is high on its agenda. The General Synod has the opportunity to make a clear statement that mistakes, serious mistakes, have been made in the past and that a wholesale change of approach and culture must now be made.

The most serious mistakes, it must be said, have been by those in some of the most senior positions. While their stories are the ones that hit the headlines, they do not reflect the position on the ground, certainly not here in the Diocese of Truro, which has a good track record on safeguarding and an excellent safeguarding team, along with committed local safeguarding officers in the parishes.

I am reminded of the Bible story when Peter, who has spent the night fishing unsuccessfully, is told by Jesus to put the boat out into "the deep water" where, to Peter's amazement, a huge catch is made and he is told that, henceforth, he will be a fisher for people. The deep water is a place of darkness and danger, but perhaps the Church itself needs to listen to Jesus and push its own boat out into the deep waters to understand the pain, hurt and distress of those who have been lost there as the result of abuse at the hands of those purporting to represent God and the Church, and try to bring them back to a safe place of healing and reconciliation. By so doing, it might again become a fisher for people and might just make the miraculous catch of some of the apparently alienated 75% of the population.

By the time you read this, we will know how firmly or otherwise the General Synod has grasped this particular nettle.




# **County Council**

Devolution is a word that you have probably heard repeatedly in the local and national news and press lately. It is also one of the main issues that I promised to support and promote at the last local elections in May 2021.

Devolution should describe bringing political power down to the lowest practical level – closer to the people it affects. At the time, my intention was to support the devolution of assets and decisions down from Cornwall Council to Town and Parish

Councils. I still believe in the principle that power and decisions work best when made at the lowest possible local level.



embrace this philosophy. Their intention is to give a few powers to a newly created regional level while simultaneously taking some powers back out of the hands of local councils, and then consolidating them all under an elected mayor who will sit above a collection of local authorities.

To achieve this, they are axing any remaining district councils and asking unitary authorities to work with their neighbours to create Combined Mayoral Authorities. Is this devolution or further centralisation? I would say more of the latter than the former.

While this system may have some merit around the larger cities in England – and has been very successful in London – it is much more of a challenge in rural areas and offers very little choice or benefit to Cornwall. Our only option would be to work under some sort of "Devonwall" mayor, and our unique character and challenges could easily be lost when competing for attention and support with cities such as Exeter and Plymouth. At Full Council in January, we voted heavily in favour of supporting a Cornwall-only footprint for any future devolution, and the concept of an elected mayor has never found much favour in the Duchy.

Over my time as a Cornwall Councillor, I have been very pleased to have achieved some modest levels of devolution locally. I have supported St Teath Parish Council taking ownership of the playing field and preschool building for the benefit of the parish; I have helped St Breward Parish Council take control of a condemned bus shelter, which they have refurbished and brought back into service; I have helped Tintagel Parish Council and the Surf Life Saving Club take back the clubhouse and toilets at Trebarwith with a financial deal to refurbish; and I have facilitated the creation of Delabole as a stand-alone Parish Council so that decisions in that village could be taken solely by their own elected councillors.

This is proper devolution and more moves like this would help to preserve local services and put residents at the heart of local democracy.





# First Responders Update





DATE FOR YOUR DIARIES: SATURDAY 22nd MARCH 9:30 am-12 noon in the Community Centre

Following on from our Coffee Morning last year, when so many came along and learnt the basic skills of resuscitation and how to use a defibrillator, the Community First Responders are back again for another morning.

Our aim at these sessions is to pass on skills that you can use before either the responders or an ambulance arrive. These first moments are often critical and we are always glad to see that someone has started the necessary treatment and stopped the situation getting worse before we arrive.

This year we will, once again, be helping you learn and practise resuscitation and use of a defibrillator as this is absolutely essential during a cardiac arrest and early application of both has been shown to be critical for survival.

In addition, we hope to cover some aspects of trauma such as serious bleeding and fractures. I hasten to say for those that do not like the thought or sight of blood we won't be too graphic. Serious bleeds, if not treated quickly, are life threatening and certainly if you can start treatment before we arrive it will help. Fractures, as we all know, can be very painful and often patients are best left until the ambulance arrives but recognising them and thinking through when it's best to self present at hospital can be useful.

As before, we will be taking donations and hope to have a raffle. We are currently collecting to fund a second First Responder Car for Cornwall. The current car alternates being based for a month in Bodmin and Redruth. It has been shown to have expanded the availability of First Responders to attend calls throughout the county and the second one is much needed. We will also use he donations to support the local responders with new equipment and additional uniforms

Currently the three local responders are covering around 36 hours per week usually daytime 6 days per week. Our workload has been variable from zero calls per day to a peak of 5 in a day. The surge in flu, covid and RSV has increased the load on the Ambulance service and our attendance at calls has been even more urgent so we can give some early help.

As ever, I hope to meet you all on the 22nd but, not on a professional basis before then...






