Petition over the 95 bus route

As many in St Teath will be aware, the number 95 bus between Wadebridge and Bude was rerouted in April, with the route no longer including Trelill and the St Teath bus stop having been changed. The route now goes through Delabole, which is already covered by the 96 bus, and also leaves residents of Helstone without a service. The posted timetables are confusing, and buses are cancelled or changed with little or no notice. It is causing problems for many residents.

Simon and Val Thomas in Trelill, who rely on the 95 service, have started a petition to raise awareness of the issue and to try to resolve it to the satisfaction of those who have been negatively affected. They intend to take the petition to County Councillor David Garrigan and MP Ben Maguire. Petition forms are in the cafe and pub, so please do sign it if you wish.

After Simon's phone conversations with Go Cornwall, which operates the bus service, it transpired that the reason for the rerouting was car-parking issues around the St Teath Clock Tower, especially at holiday times when there can be additional parked vehicles in the Square from holiday lets, visitors and so on. This apparently caused safety issues for the drivers turning left before the Clock to go towards Trelill or right when coming back from that direction. It is not known whether there were any attempts or requests to resolve the inappropriate parking behaviour before altering the route.

Simon has also written a letter to Go Cornwall setting out his concerns and suggesting a different route that includes Trelill but avoids the Clock Tower. Should you wish to use his letter as a template to write to Go Cornwall with your own details over how the rerouting has affected you, please contact the editors (Anne or Jo; details on page 24) and we can forward it to you.

I'd like to say a very big thank you to all the parents who have come to our Stay and Play sessions at the preschool. We have loved working with them. We have also loved working with Revd Nicki Farr and the Open the Book team, who have been supporting us every week in school. The children have appreciated the wonderful learning and support the Church has given us.



As Summer term 1 came to an end, pupils and staff celebrated the hard work and dedication of our amazing Year 6 pupils, who completed their SATS tests. They enjoyed a SATS celebration at Polzeath beach with surfing and ice creams. As we move into Summer term 2, Year 5 and Year 6 are busy practising for their end-of-term performance, as well as the upcoming legendary 'Teathletics'. The whole school created wonderful displays for the Royal Cornwall Show and were proud to support this fantastic event. We were honoured to receive commendations and awards.

Oak Class have really enjoyed designing, sculpting and painting. They made some weird and wacky designs for the Mad Hatter's tea party. The children in Sycamore had to design a collage out of natural materials. They used leaves, grass, twigs and pasta, to name a few. The themes were Jack and the Beanstalk, Wind in the Willows or the Wizard of Oz. In Elm Class, the topic is 'Beside the Seaside', and they been learning about the story of the 'Lighthouse Keeper's Lunch'. I dread when my computer wants to update, as so often difficulties follow as changes occur, or my phone does something new unexpectedly, but unless they update and reset, the difficulties can be even more problematic. Having a low battery can also

be quite frustrating, especially if we have to make or receive important calls, and so we recharge at the earliest opportunity.

Whatever you do this summer, I pray that there will be opportunity to rest and recuperate, and that you will have the time to recharge your batteries.



A Letter From Your MP

Hello, St Teath! It really feels like we're making so much progress at the moment, with lots more on the horizon. Perhaps most significantly, I officially presented my 'AirBnB Bill' to Parliament recently. For too long, wealthy second-home owners have been allowed to flip properties here into holiday lets and avoid paying council tax, while local families are priced out of the communities they grew up in. This bill would require planning permission for short-term lets, restoring local control and accountability. It's a simple change, but one that could make a real difference in rebalancing our housing system and giving young people a fair shot at getting onto the housing ladder.



Also in the House of Commons I raised the urgent issue of the number 11 and 12 bus service cuts, which have left many residents completely stranded. My inbox has been flooded with people making their voices heard on this, including those who need to get to work, attend hospital appointments at Derriford or connect with neighbouring towns. I know how vital these routes are for many constituents, which is why I stood up in Parliament and made the case on behalf of North Cornwall – as well as writing to the Transport Minister requesting a formal meeting to push for funding and service restoration. I'll be sure to let you all know his reply, and keep pushing further on your behalf.

Unfortunately, these bus issues do seem to be part of a wider pattern of rural neglect. The Government recently announced a £15-billion national transport package – and left Cornwall out of it entirely. Not a single penny was earmarked for our Duchy, which is simply unacceptable. That's why I've written jointly with the new Cornwall Council Leader Leigh Frost, as well as Cabinet Member for Transport Dan Rogerson, urging the Chancellor to rethink this decision and provide fair investment for Cornwall's transport infrastructure. It's great to work closely with Cornwall Council on this issue, which is of vital importance. It does seem that anything further southwest than Bristol gets overlooked time and time again – which is something I'm fighting hard to end.

I've also continued campaigning on rural crime, which remains one of the top issues I hear about day in, day out from constituents (including those, of course, in areas like St Teath). The types of crime vary drastically – farm machinery theft, fly tipping, illegal hare coursing, antisocial behaviour... the list goes on. Rural communities are too often left behind by national policing priorities, which is why I appeared on ITV News to reaffirm my call for a proper Rural Crime Strategy, and the resources needed to make it a reality. Our rural communities here in North Cornwall deserve the same level of protection as anywhere else.

Finally, I want to share a very welcome bit of good news. The Government officially adopted the Liberal Democrat policy to expand free school meals to all children on Universal Credit. We've been calling for this since July last year, and it's a huge win for families on the breadline. Cornwall is one of the most deprived areas of the country, with around 6,500 children in North Cornwall under the poverty line. I'll be pushing ministers hard to ensure this isn't funded by slicing money out of school budgets, and instead paid for by reversing unfair tax breaks for big banks or greater taxes on multinational tech companies.





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Revd. Nicki Writes...

Dear Friends,

I write this after seeing the film 'The Salt Path', which tells the true story of Raynor and Moth Winn and their journey along the South West Coast Path following some devastating circumstances. It tells how they navigated a new season in their life and took in the beautiful coastline that includes Cornwall, while slowing the pace of life and travelling light due to necessity, yet discovering different and new blessings.



Whilst our lives may be different from those in the film, there is much to be said for creating space to slow down, notice our surroundings and being curious. A few weeks ago, a group of people from our churches and the local community embarked on a walk that travelled around the five churches in our group. Starting at St Thomas in Camelford, we walked along the river to Fenteroon bridge and up to St Adwena in Advent. From there we journeyed over stiles and fields to arrive at St Julitta in Lanteglos. After a picnic lunch, we continued our pilgrimage to St John's Church in Delabole and finally walked up past the quarry and down through the woods before the final stretch, which brought us to St Teath (see page 19).

In each location, we took our time to stop and pause, to take in our surroundings and offer up our praise and worship to God. We followed a series of readings from the Bible book of St John, sang a hymn of praise and prayed for our community. We were delighted to welcome the new Bishop of Truro, Bishop David, who was excited to explore the local area and pray for us all.

We allowed plenty of time on the journey so that we had the opportunity to take in and notice the beautiful countryside, the far-reaching views, the local landmarks as well as the delicate intricacies of the trees, plants, flowers and nature. This pilgrimage enabled the making of new friendships and the deepening of others as we had time to walk and talk together. It also reminded us that every parish in our group of churches is unique and wonderful, and that we are truly blessed to have such astonishing beauty on our doorsteps. Journeys and pilgrimage have always been a part of human life, a time for fellowship and pondering.

God's people pilgrimed through the land singing songs of praise to God. These have been recorded and are known as the Psalms and are full of emotion as they recognise both challenges and joys. You may find some of these words helpful as you journey through life. The famous Psalm 23, The Lord is my Shepherd, speaks of God's provision, of quiet resting and restoration, of comfort, goodness, mercy and blessing. So as we move into the height of summer, I invite you to take time to stop and pause, to look around and notice, and give thanks for the beauty of the place in which we live, perhaps dwelling with some words from the Psalms.

When Will and Brave took on the world



May saw Will Bacchus, a former pupil of St Teath School, once again heading off to the World Agility Open Championships with his youngest dog, Brave – a three-year-old cocker spaniel (pictured).

It was Will's fourth time at the championships in Ermelo, the Netherlands, but Brave's first experience of anything on this scale. Via Team Scotland try-outs, they had won a place in both the biathlon and pentathlon competitions against the very best in the world. Teams from 43 countries were competing, and Brave was facing challenges on courses that he had yet to encounter in UK competitions.

Will gets 8 minutes to walk each course, in which time he commits it to memory, works out his handling preferences and the quickest route to guide Brave around the course. Over 500 dogs had qualified to compete, and in Will and Brave's classes (which are separated out by height), 96 of the world's best were ready to face the challenge.

As you would expect for a dog of Brave's limited experience, there were some ups and downs, but overall the pair finished well in the top half of their class.

The definite highlights included Brave's first international run, which resulted in just one error going into the weaves, and five faults. This was followed by a stunning agility run in the main arena – in front of noisy Scottish support – and a clear round, giving the pair a tenth-place finish. In their final run of the seven, they completed another clear round that gave them a sixth-place finish.

The last day of the event saw the closing ceremony and lots of shirt-swapping as souvenirs. Will bagged shirts from Brazil, Mexico, Colombia, South Korea, China, Switzerland, Canada and Germany as the perfect representation of this truly global event. What a fantastic experience for Will, aged 19, and his young dog! Many thanks to the Team Scotland management and the World

Agility Open Organisers – a really wonderful event and celebration of agility.

County Council

Walking into New County Hall for the first council meeting after the local elections, I felt a mix of cautious optimism and the weight of responsibility. Change is always met with questions. Can we deliver? Do we understand what people need? Councillor Leigh Frost, now officially leading Cornwall Council, stood before a packed room, speaking with conviction about his vision. "Cornwall belongs to all of us, and the decisions we make should reflect that."



He has assembled a cabinet that blends experience with fresh ideas. From transport and housing to community safety and economic regeneration, this team has some big challenges ahead. But in their first statements, they have emphasised the importance of working closely with and listening to residents, something I believe is vital for progress.

Whilst standing alongside our elected Cornwall Councillors, I could not help but reflect on the power of local engagement. We often think of council decisions as distant, something happening elsewhere, when in reality, you as a community can shape them. Whether it is through attending meetings, joining local parishes or simply emailing to share your views and concerns: your voices can push priorities forward.

Our administration has already emphasised open dialogue, something we need more of. The first step is to get involved. If you are passionate about green transport, attend a council meeting. Concerned about affordable housing? Reach out to the cabinet member. Even small actions, like joining local community groups or signing petitions, build momentum.

From my own experience in the last few weeks, I have heard at first hand the issues that matter most in our community. I have been getting out to our six parish meetings and having meetings with local people about everything from speeding concerns, parking difficulties, planning and grass cutting to the Camel Trail extension.

There is no denying that challenges lie ahead, and time will tell if our Cabinet can turn promises into progress. However, one thing is clear: the more people engage, the more Cornwall Council will understand your needs. That is exactly how democracy should work.

So, the real question is not just about whether this administration will deliver. It is about whether we as a community will step up together and help shape Cornwall's future. Let's make our voices heard.

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
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St Teath Community Bus

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
