Holiday Makers' Guide to Health Services on the North Cornish Coast



The year-round permanent population of Cornwall rises from 570,000 by an extra 350,000 visitors at any time throughout the peak holiday period from late July to early September, meaning several million visitors come each summer, bringing a lot of much-needed custom to our hospitality businesses.

Falling ill on holiday can be distressing, so we are providing easily accessible guidance of how to get the right advice as quickly as possible. An advice booklet is available online via the practice website, on our Facebook page and hard copies can be found at various shops, libraries and other public buildings within our practice boundaries (including the tourist hotspots such as Port Isaac, Wadebridge, Rock, Daymer Bay, Trebetherick, Polzeath and St Minver).

If you fall ill on holiday, first telephone or contact your own GP online – they have all your medical background close at hand. If you need a prescription, your GP can send it to a local pharmacy for you to pick up. You can find a pharmacy by clicking on https://www.nhs.uk/service-search/pharmacy/find-a-pharmacy if you are online.

Most local pharmacists are qualified to treat common conditions such as sinusitis, sore throat, earache, infested insect bite, impetigo, shingles and urinary tract infections in women under 65. You will normally get treatment more quickly than through a GP for these.

If you have unfortunately injured yourself, please use a minor injury unit or urgent treatment centre. These are there to help with injuries that need attention urgently, but which are not critical or life-threatening, such as cuts needing stitching; arm, foot and leg injuries (including broken bones); bites, minor burns and scalds as well as eye problems. Go online to click on the opening hours and live wait times or download the NHS Quicker App to your phone (which covers Cornwall, Devon and Somerset) for this information plus driving directions.


For out-of-hours care (between 18.00 and 08.00), and if you can't wait until the next day, call the much-improved 111 service at any time.

Please do not call 999 or go to the A&E unit at Treliske Hospital in Truro unless you believe the problem is life-threatening. There is only one major A&E to serve the whole county of over 1 million people during peak holiday months, and delays can be very long, especially at peak times.

By producing clear and easily accessible guidance, we hope we can keep both our permanent patients and our visitors safe, well and able to enjoy our wonderful county.

A Letter From Your MP

Hello once again, St Teath. In these last few weeks we've seen the introduction of the Government's English Devolution Bill – so our fight for a fair deal for Cornwall officially begins. I've said from day one that Cornwall's unique culture, history, and identity must be recognised with a distinct settlement, not one that lumps us in with Devon or treats us like any other English county.

That's why I'll be pushing hard to make sure Cornwall's voice is properly heard. I really hope that all six Cornish MPs can come together and work cross-party on this, because only by uniting can we make a

compelling case for real powers, proper funding and local control over issues that affect us.



After over a year of my repeated calls for her to resign, Susan Davy, the chief executive of South West Water, has finally stepped away from her post due to her constant failings to prevent sewage dumping. But while this is a huge win, this is far from the end of the problem – and I'll continue to fight hard to finally put a stop to sewage pollution once and for all.

Action is urgently needed on transport, specifically access to our rail network. I've launched a petition demanding urgent investment in step-free access at Bodmin Parkway station. For too long, disabled passengers have had to be physically carried over the footbridge between platforms, which is not just degrading but downright dangerous. So many constituents have raised the issue directly with me, and I've seen first hand just how inaccessible the station is for those disabled constituents. It's 2025 – and this sort of exclusion should be utterly unacceptable.

If you'd like to sign the petition, you can find a link on my Facebook page – just search 'Ben Maguire MP'. With strong local backing, we can keep the pressure on Network Rail, Great Western Railway and the Department for Transport to finally act.

I've been very pleased to see tangible progress in response to calls for increased safety and visibility of policing in Bodmin. Hotspot patrols and dedicated street marshals will now be supporting the town centre, which I've consistently pressed for after hearing concerns from residents and businesses alike. I meet regularly with Devon and Cornwall Police to discuss issues that are raised with me, and will continue to support them in any way I can to help keep our towns, villages and rural areas safe. And while this is of course welcome news, we still need a proper national Rural Crime Strategy – a promise I've secured from the Home Secretary – to ensure every community in North Cornwall receives the protection and support it deserves.

And finally, I'll end on something a little lighter. I'm delighted to share that I've managed to get Bluntrock Gold, a craft beer brewed right here in North Cornwall (St Minver!) by the fantastic team at Bluntrock Brewery, now officially served on tap in the Houses of Parliament. It's an incredible showcase for Cornish produce and a proud moment for us, and I'll be doing my best to convince colleagues from all parties to try a pint.

That's it for this month – so enjoy the sun, take care, and I look forward to seeing many of you across the Summer Recess period.







Revd. Jeffrey Writes...

On 8 May, we celebrated the 80th anniversary of VE (Victory in Europe) Day, but the Second World War did not end on that date: it continued until 15 August 1945. And so on 15 August this year, we celebrate the true end of the war on the 80th anniversary of VJ (Victory in Japan) Day.

There will be a service on 15 August at St Julitta's, Lanteglos by Camelford, to mark VJ Day. This will be the only Anglican service in the Camel-Allen Benefice and accordingly all in



Camelford, Delabole, St Teath and Advent are invited to join us in church. You may wish instead to mark it in your own way, if only to think about the ending of the Second World War – the largest and most violent military conflict there has ever been. Official sources estimate military deaths at nearly 15 million and civilian deaths at over 38 million.

Whilst the majority of UK citizens and military personnel who gave their lives did so in Europe, there were many who continued to fight in the east or who were held captive in appalling conditions in prisoner-of-war camps there. Many UK and Commonwealth allies fought in Burma (Myanmar) which was liberated by the 14th Army. An invasion of Japan was planned but, on 6 August, the first atomic bomb was dropped on Hiroshima by the United States, and, on 9 August, the second atomic bomb was dropped over Nagasaki. To avoid further devastation of its cities, the Japanese government accepted the Allied surrender terms on 14 August and the following day was declared VJ Day.

The joy of peace emerging after almost 6 years, which we will celebrate again on 15 August, must be tempered by the remembrance of all the lives lost; the millions more whose lives were devastated; and the unleashing of a new form of mass destruction and terror on the world.

The number of people still alive who have any actual recollection of VJ Day is now few. In an increasingly dangerous world where some again talk of the possibility of another world war, it is important that we who are too young to remember VJ Day, the vast majority of us, ensure that we never forget what VJ Day means in all its aspects.

So, please, mark this 80th anniversary by joining us by the war memorial at St Julitta's, Lanteglos by Camelford, at 6pm on 15 August. If that is not for you, maybe pause for a few moments to reflect on the terrible calamity for humanity that wars bring, and perhaps pray in your own way that these words from the Old Testament prophet Micah will yet come to pass:

"For out of Zion shall go forth instruction, ...

They shall beat their swords into ploughshares,
and their spears into pruning-hooks;
nation shall not lift up sword against nation,
neither shall they learn war any more;
but they shall all sit under their own vines and under their own fig trees,
and no one shall make them afraid;
for the mouth of the Lord of hosts has spoken".

As I sit down to write this, the unmistakable buzz of carnival season is all around us. The sun has been generous so far this year, and it's been wonderful to see so many of you out and about, making the most of the good weather. Events like this remind us how special our corner of the world really is. They bring us together, lift spirits and spark conversations that last long after the bunting has come down.



I've received a great deal of correspondence about the recent

changes to local bus services, particularly the 95, which now no longer stops at Trelill. Understandably, this has raised concern among residents and I share those concerns. In rural areas like ours, public transport is much more than a convenience. For those without access to a car, it is a vital link to work, education, health care and daily essentials. This change risks isolating some of our most vulnerable neighbours. I'm actively discussing the wider transport changes with a particular focus on connections across Cornwall and to Derriford Hospital. It's clear we need to work closely with bus operators and Cornwall Council to find a practical and inclusive solution. I'll keep you posted as these conversations continue, and will keep pressing to ensure our community stays connected.

Good news! Our council-run car parks won't be privatised, thanks to a reversing of the decision by our new Council administration. I heard from a lot of local residents who had real practical concerns about the impact this could have had for residents' passes, access through car parks and the businesses that have pop-ups in them. The reversal means that they'll stay under local control, which helps us make sure they meet the needs of our community. It's great to see common sense winning the day.

The exciting plans to extend the Camel Trail beyond its current endpoint at Wenfordbridge was given a funding boost. There is now a feasibility study into the extension, which could bring the trail directly into Camelford. With around 400,000 users annually, the Camel Trail is already a major asset, and extending it is seen as a major boost by local leaders and businesses. Whilst the news that the long-awaited Camelford bypass will not receive government funding is understandably disappointing, it also marks the end of years of uncertainty and the beginning of a new chapter. With clarity finally in hand, our MP Ben Maguire and our Cabinet member for Transport, Dan Rogerson, and others are already rallying around fresh ideas to tackle traffic and connections in our area. There's a renewed sense of purpose in Camelford. With the Camel Trail extension on the horizon, we are poised to attract more businesses for growth. Now is the time to ensure that infrastructure keeps pace with opportunity.




