Editor's note: A big thank you on behalf of everyone to all the committee and helpers who helped to make our Village Show such an enjoyable success.



In 1994, in Cadgwith Bay off the Lizard in Cornwall, a fishing boat sank, and its two crew sadly perished. This happened soon after many Coastguard lookouts had been closed down, and such was the depth of local feeling following the tragedy, the local community decided to establish a charity to provide a volunteer watch over that section of the coastline :the National Coastwatch Institution (NCI).

There are now 60 lookout stations around England and Wales where NCI watchkeepers provide eyes and ears along the coast, keeping watch and monitoring radio channels. They are there to alert HM Coastguard and direct the appropriate emergency and rescue services when people are in trouble. Our local station, Padstow NCI (pictured), is situated at Stepper Point and was built in the early 1920s to keep a watch over the approaches to Padstow and the Camel Estuary with its notorious Doom Bar.



HM Coastguard kept regular watches at Stepper Point until 1994, when the visual watches from Stepper Point watch house were abandoned. In 2006 it was renovated and opened as a fully operational lookout for NCI. Its full history can be seen on www.nci.org.uk by selecting Padstow.

If you are interested, visitors are always welcome to call in to the station if walking the coastal path. The walk up to the lookout is three-quarters of a mile, which is wonderful on a summer's day, but not for the faint-hearted.

At the present time, there are just under 60 local volunteers who cover a shift, between 3 and 4.5 hours depending on time of year, once a week or once a fortnight. If you are interested in volunteering, no previous experience is necessary. We have people from all walks of life, various backgrounds and all ages. Volunteers go through a training programme, which is mostly 'on the job' training.

Tales of The Acrewood Project

We opened our gates off Treroosel Road for the very first time this summer, for children to enjoy some time in nature whilst learning valuable skills at the same time. We've been fully subscribed to every session we've advertised, both for neurodivergent children and the locals of the village. We've been blown away by the community support with all our random requests for help.



Navigating the world of SEND is notoriously difficult, stressful and glacial, with what feels like hurdles around every corner. St Teath, however, and all of its groups, committees and individuals have welcomed us with open and incredibly inclusive arms. There has been zero resistance or hesitation in offers of help and invitations to be part of the village show, the carnival and volunteers galore! We hope that the village as a whole knows how much of an impact their kindness has had on children and whole families that visit Acrewood.

We had a very busy summer term with lots of home-educated children from the local area. The children learnt about caring for the animals, foraging for and growing food, wild cooking, food preservation, maintenance and construction, water conservation and biodiversity to mention just a tiny part of our activities.

As the term finished, we dashed headlong into our Summer Stay & Play sessions where local children were able to come and experience The Acrewood Project during the school holidays. The mud kitchen was messy, the chickens cuddled and cared for, the goats fed and foraged. Child-led building projects were started and we now have a marvellous water run on the side of the field shelter, made from scraps of guttering by a rather clever four year old!

The ducks nearly have their pond after long last. The community has once again come together to sponsor ducks and name chicks to raise funds to finish the fencing. Little "Andrew Marshall" is doing just fine despite her name! We'd love to show all those who have helped us along the way, so get in touch to visit.

Carnival was challenging to accommodate the needs of neurodivergent children who can struggle with loud noises and lots of people, but the committee was incredible and popped us at the end away from the big brass band! We had a lovely time and raised £191 in the collection buckets. Once again, the children felt included and valued.

We have attended a few fetes too, selling our eggs, vegetables and preserved produce all grown, made or harvested by the children. Thank you if you've bought anything at those to support us. The Village Show was a huge success for us and we felt truly welcomed by the committee. Many of the children that attend The Acrewood Project do not go to school or other groups, so to feel part

of something and recognised for their entries was very special. The sense of belonging is invaluable and we believe every child deserves to feel welcome and that they belong. To some it's a rosette or a certificate to add to many sports days or music trophies, but to others it may be treasured like gold.

Our aim is for the children of Acrewood to feel proud of themselves, able to make valuable contributions, to feel heard and to have enjoyed their childhood not just survived it. The 95 Bus and Parking around the Clock Tower

Dear St Teath folk and visitors to second homes and holiday lets,

We write with regard to the parking around the Clock Tower, especially near both junctions where the 95 bus has been forced to reroute due to safety reasons.

Because of this, the bus no longer passes through Trelill, Helstone or down Whitewells Road and along past Coldnorthcott towards Trelill. This has impacted those of us who do not drive, have a car or need to get to or back from the garage. At times, it has left us stranded in Wadebridge or St Teath and other places along the route – and has meant that we are unable to get out of our house without having to request lifts from friends.

We politely request that more care is taken to leave several metres of space before the junctions, particularly if your vehicle is large, and we ask that people do not double park.

Please will second-homers with paying guests and holiday lets leave information in your packs to this effect for your visitors.

We realise that parking is difficult in St Teath and, following the meetings with the councillors and MP, other bus options are being discussed and considered.

Thank you to those who signed the petition to have the bus reinstated and who attended the recent meeting.

Methodist Musings – Light and Dark

The nights are drawing in and it's time to snuggle up by the fire with a hot chocolate and a good book, or a cup of tea and our favourite TV soap. For some of us it might be time to reflect on autumn nights past, perhaps as children, when we'd have conker conquests or play board and card games with the family. Or perhaps we're planners and this time of year gives us the opportunity to prepare for the forthcoming festive seasons, making to-do and to-buy lists so we're ahead of the game.



However we choose to spend our evenings at this time of year, there's no escaping the fact that it's getting darker and we're hurtling towards the day when we 'fall back' and gain an hour's sleep as the clocks change (Sunday 26th October). Soon it will be lights on by 5 pm, and we'll have more time to enjoy the night sky in this beautiful part of North Cornwall, pleasantly bereft of light pollution, and enabling us to look up at the myriad of stars and planets (cloud cover permitting!).

Of course if we do go out for an evening walk, we now need to remember to take a torch in order to avoid the potholes and puddles we might encounter along the way. This always reminds me of those words of Jesus in the New Testament book of John, when he says "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life."

Nowadays, the word 'darkness' can have different meanings for each of us. For many people the world feels dark whether that is because of international discord, disease, poor mental health or just the challenges of day-to-day life. This darkness can feel frightening and overwhelming and we long for that light at the end of the tunnel, a little glimmer of hope to keep us moving forward.

These words of Jesus are really pertinent for us and the world today. If everyone did follow the way of Jesus – living the way God longs for by loving and respecting one another, thinking of others before ourselves and showing love and care for others and the world – then there really would be light instead of dark, hope instead of despair and peace instead of war.

Perhaps as we switch our lights on, attend our bonfire night celebrations and think about putting up the Christmas lights, we might remember that just as each light bulb, each spark, each flame lights up the darkness, so we can light up the darkness by doing our own little bit and following in the way of Jesus to bring hope and light into the darkest of places.

A Letter From Your MP

I've had a packed few weeks back in Parliament after summer recess. I was very proud to stand up in the House of Commons soon after returning to Westminster, to make the case for Cornwall during the Second Reading of the Government's English Devolution Bill. I made it clear that Cornwall must NEVER be lumped into a 'Devonwall' arrangement. In my office hangs a painting of the 1497 Cornish Rebellion, which is a clear symbol of our long-held resistance to unjust decisions imposed from Westminster. That same spirit lives on today. I spoke firmly in support of a Cornwall-only devolution deal, one that reflects our National Minority status, our unique way of life,



and the distinct challenges we face down here. I really believe that decisions for Cornwall should be made IN Cornwall, by an elected Cornish Assembly – not in Plymouth, Bristol or Westminster. The current Bill does not deliver on that, which is why I voted against it and will be working hard to push for changes during the Bill's Committee stage.

Alongside that, I've been raising urgent local issues with ministers. I called for a debate on access to hospital care in rural areas like ours, because many of my constituents are forced to travel for hours to access basic services. In North Cornwall specifically, where our public transport is patchy at best, it's really hard for many to get to their nearest district hospital, be it Treliske, Derriford or Barnstaple. That's why I've requested a debate on setting up new district hospitals, which could potentially be in towns like Bodmin, so that people can access the care they need closer to home.

I also met with Minister Chris Bryant and officials at the Department for Science, Innovation and Technology to raise several concerns from constituents. I pressed for immediate action on the digital switchover and its impact in areas like Boscastle, where one elderly constituent was left without help for hours during a power cut, because of the limited mobile signal there. I also raised issues around Wildanet's rollout of fibre internet, with some residents being quoted thousands of pounds to be connected (despite earlier promises of access). I also pushed for clarity on the Government's new Registration Scheme for Furnished Holiday Lets, and was told it is expected to launch by spring 2026, which I'll continue to chase and keep you all updated on.

I also recently voted to scrap the archaic system of hereditary peers in the House of Lords. For far too long, unelected individuals have been able to shape our laws simply by birthright. We Liberal Democrats have long called for a fully elected second chamber (one that reflects modern democratic values and, importantly, is accountable to the people). I'll continue pushing the Government to go further: ending political patronage, reducing the size of the Lords and ensuring that every lawmaker in Britain has a democratic mandate.

I've now officially launched my 'MP for the Day' competition, which is open to anyone under 18 in North Cornwall. I'm inviting young people to send in a 60-second video, sharing what they'd do if they were in my shoes for a day – their big idea, or the change they'd make. If you know someone who might be interested, I want to hear from them! Entries can be emailed directly to me.

My time otherwise has been filled with lots of meetings with campaign groups who are working on issues that affect us in North Cornwall. I look forward to seeing many more of you during a range of community visits in the coming weeks – but until next time, take care.





As summer gently winds down and the evenings grow cosier, it's the perfect time to hop aboard your local bus and enjoy the changing scenery. I'm working on requests to reinstate the 95 bus service through St Teath and onwards to Trelill. The service has been withdrawn due to the difficulties in turning at the Clock Tower in St Teath. We'd be really grateful if you could help by keeping the area around the tower clear, so the bus can safely turn onto the B3267. If this turning space remains accessible, there's a genuine opportunity to request the

reinstatement of the service. Your support could make all the difference.



As a scuba-diving instructor and someone who deeply values our coastline, I was proud to vote in favour of Cornwall Council's voluntary ban on plastic flying rings. Often left on beaches, they pose a serious threat to seals and other marine life. I've seen seals with deep wounds caused by these rings getting stuck around their necks. The ban encourages retailers to stop selling plastic rings and asks beachgoers to choose safer alternatives. It's not enforced by law, but it sends a clear message: we care about our wildlife and our environment. Let's spread the word and make thoughtful choices, helping protect the coast we all love.

At the last full council meeting, we passed an historic motion calling on the Government to formally recognise Cornwall as the fifth nation of the UK. This is about identity, voice and respect. We live in a parish that is rich with heritage, community spirit and a deep connection to the land and sea. Yet too often, decisions that affect our lives are made far away in Westminster, without our voices being heard. This motion is a call to change that. It's about ensuring Cornwall's future is shaped by us, for us. This recognition would mean more than symbolic pride – it could bring real investment, meaningful devolution and a stronger say in our own affairs.

This year's scarecrow trail and competition will take place between Monday 27th October and Saturday 8th November.


