## The Churchyards

We are blessed with many volunteers in our village, and the upkeep of our churchyards is no exception. Many thanks to our regular grasscutters and the Community Gardening team (some of whom are pictured below) as well as to Bob and all others who do their bit towards ensuring the churchyards remain a special place to remember our loved ones.

We have become aware of two unstable gravestones, which need attention. If anyone knows of surviving relatives for those named below, please do pass on any information to me. We would like to preserve the stones as they are, but cannot do so without seeking family permission.

### **GRAVE IN CHURCHYARD**

Thomas Greenwood Died at Rockhead, 2nd Feb 1901 (aged 75 years) Also Elizabeth Greenwood (his Wife) Died at Berrow, Worcestershire, 30th July 1905 (aged 78 years)

### **GRAVE IN NEW CHURCHYARD**

James Tucker Died Delabole, 26th August 1912 (aged 72 years) Also Mary Gove (his Wife) Died 20th August 1918

We do try to ensure the churchyards remain safe for all those wanting somewhere to pause and reflect. Please remember guidelines state no glass or plastic to be placed on memorial stones and particularly in the ashes plot area, to minimise trip hazards. An exception is made for children's memorials but otherwise no toys etc. should be placed on the stones. If you're uncertain what is allowed, do ask us!

## Methodist Musings – Light in the Darkness

It's that time of year when all is dark and sleepy. Some animals go into hibernation, and some humans seem to as well! Many don't like the cold winter nights and prefer to stay indoors where it is much warmer and more comfortable.

The trees have lost their leaves, some plants are sleeping beneath the soil and so many hours of the day are dark. It can often be seen as a bleak time when it seems that life itself slows down as the temperature falls and the morning cobwebs glisten in the morning dew.



There are many who suffer through the dark winter nights. Some people become isolated and even fear venturing out in the winter gloom, while some suffer from seasonal affective disorder, in which a lack of sunlight is thought to have an effect on our mental health.

Yet the winter months can also be a time of beauty, during which unsightful things are veiled by a blanket of frost and a greater view is seen through the bare trees. Sometimes, though, we fail to see creation in all its fullness or appreciate its majesty.

I used to work in the coal mines, one of the few places that we get true darkness. We used to carry a cap lamp and battery with us to enable us to see where we were going. On more than one occasion, my battery failed part way through the shift and I had to slowly feel my way toward the pit bottom, which could be a couple of miles away. I was never so glad to see the lights there shining ever brighter as I got nearer to them.

Light seems to shine brightest in the darkness. I love dark, clear nights when you can see the many stars that fill the sky, even with the naked eye. Apparently, the farthest distance over which the average unaided human eye can see a candle is about 1.6 miles.

We all need light in our lives – we thrive on it. As well as physical light, we also need the light of love, the light of family and the light of fellowship in our lives. I would also say that we need the light of Jesus in our lives.

In the darkest winter nights of our lives we benefit from all of the above, so don't just fumble in the darkness but seek the light of life!

"When Jesus spoke again to the people, he said, 'I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness but will have the light of life." (John 8:12)


> active mind can create from one man's trash! The joy it brings is incalculable.

### A Letter From Your MP

I was very pleased to visit a number of schools and colleges here in North Cornwall over the last few weeks, continuing my efforts to ensure young people feel empowered to get involved in politics and make their voices heard. I've stopped by Padstow Primary School, Callywith College, Sir James Smith's School, and Wadebridge Primary, where I had the chance to speak with pupils about what it means to be an MP and how our democracy works. They asked some brilliant, thoughtful questions and I left feeling hugely inspired, while making sure politics feels accessible and relevant to the next generation.



Alongside this, I've also been encouraging entries to my 'MP for the Day' competition, which invites under-18s across North Cornwall to send in a short video explaining what they would do if they were in my shoes for 24 hours. Entries were open until the end of October, so I'm looking forward to hearing the ideas young people want to share!

On the national stage, I was proud to speak at the Liberal Democrat Conference recently to propose a motion on legal aid. In my speech, I made the case for community-based Law Start Centres that could provide early advice on everything from domestic abuse to housing and debt here in North Cornwall. This is an issue affecting so many in our constituency, and having helped a number of constituents with their cases on access to legal aid, I'll continue to really push for proper access to justice for all.

I also made an appearance on Politics South West recently, where I repeated my call for urgent infrastructure investment to support Cornwall's rail links. Since the Dawlish line was washed away in 2014, we have still not seen the resilience or upgrades that our region desperately needs. I again made the point that North Cornwall is still without a single mainline station, which continues to hold our area back. I also spoke on the show about the housing crisis we face here in Cornwall, whereby the proliferation of second homes – and a lack of real affordable housing – is affecting so many of my constituents, especially the younger generation who are being forced to move far away to find somewhere to live.

I was very glad to host another local drop-in at Lanivet's One For All community centre recently, as these sessions are a great way to raise issues directly with me, and I'd encourage anyone nearby to come along and say hello over a cuppa at the next session. I'll be posting details on my Facebook page, so make sure to keep an eye out there if you'd like to join next time.

I am also proud that I'll be continuing to serve as the Liberal Democrats' Shadow Attorney General. In this role I have been able to speak up on a national platform about issues that directly affect North Cornwall, including failing police standards, the lack of a rural crime strategy, and more.

Finally, I learnt recently that Cornwall Councillor Rowland O'Connor has left Reform UK and now sits as an Independent on Cornwall Council. This means that North Cornwall no longer has any Conservative or Reform representation at council level, which I believe reflects a clear political shift locally, with residents choosing practical, community-focused politics over culture wars and division. I look forward to continuing to work constructively with Lib Dem and Independent Councillors like Rowland, to deliver on the issues that matter most to our area.



### A Lay Reader Writes...

Dear Friends,

Before my Mother moved across the country to Cornwall, she lived in a village just outside Newmarket, in Suffolk. Along the street is a beautiful, enormous, Georgian, dolls-house-style home, in which lived a former lady-in-waiting to the late Queen. From time to time Her Majesty would stay, incognito, with her. Who would recognise her when she walked the dogs alongside the river in wellies and waxed jacket?



There was an occasion when the Queen was staying there and the lady popped out, leaving the Queen alone. Someone knocked on the door (we don't know who – an Amazon driver, a lady collecting for the Poppy Appeal, a child asking for their football back...) but the Queen, in what was surely one of the very few occasions she ever did, opened the front door and responded to the visitor. Can you imagine? Who would recognise her? Who would expect any front door would be answered by the monarch? How would you feel if you were that visitor?

Now, why do I share this? Well, come the end of November, the Church will celebrate Christ the King Sunday. The final Sunday in the Church Year, the following one being Advent and the countdown to Ch----as (I didn't use the word!) On Christ the King Sunday, this year on 23rd November, we celebrate Jesus as the Lord and Ruler of all; present before the world was created, all-powerful and mighty. We also remember that he knows each one of us; he loves us, cares for us and will walk every step of our life with us; this doesn't mean there will never be hard times, but it means we are not alone in them – there is nothing he will ever shy away from.

Then when the time comes for our earthly life to end, Jesus is right there, too. The Bible tells us that when he was speaking to his disciples, on the night before he was arrested, then tried, found sinless, but still crucified on a stinking rubbish tip [for us, that we might be free] he says, 'In my Father's House are many rooms. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? ... I will come again and take you to myself, that where I am you may be also' [John 14;2,3] As he speaks to them, so he looks over their shoulders and speaks to everyone, through all time, including each of us.

Can you imagine what it will be like when Jesus answers Heaven's door personally to us, in turn, and shows us to our room? Not just the monarch of a few earthly countries, but Christ the King of All. The same King who, three days after he was crucified and died, rose again; destroying the darkness of death for all; forever. No wonder that we celebrate Christ the King.

## **County Council**

Cornwall Council is developing a Local Plan: a blueprint for how our towns, villages and countryside will grow and change in the next 20 years. This plan will guide decisions on everything from housing and transport to protecting our natural environment.

We all know the challenges we face: finding affordable homes, keeping our communities connected, and making sure our beautiful landscapes are protected for future generations. We also have a real opportunity to influence how things improve, that starts with hearing from you.



Importantly, the Local Plan is legally binding. That means once it's adopted, it will shape what gets built and where, including the over 4,400 homes a year we are being asked to deliver by the Government. We can't change that target, but we can influence what those homes look like, who they are for, where they go, and how they fit into our communities. Crucially, we can also push for an infrastructure-first approach, making sure that roads, schools, health services and public transport are planned alongside new housing – not after it.

I recently went along to one of the drop-in sessions in Bodmin and it was welcoming, informal and suitable for all. With interactive and thoughtful tasks to complete, asking a series of questions to help capture what's important to you in a home, in your local area and in the everyday interactions you have in our community. It's a great way to make sure your voice is heard.

Drop-in sessions are happening across Cornwall from now through January – find the sessions online by searching Cornwall Local Plan events. Let's make sure the future of Cornwall reflects what we love most about living here.



### Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor,

Earlier this year, I was caught doing 80 mph on the A30 in Devon. It cost me £100. Because I agreed to attend a speed awareness course, I did not get any points on my licence and my insurance remains unaffected. But note you can only attend one of these courses – after that, it's an automatic conviction.

I was a little sceptical before I went about the usefulness of what I was to be told, but that soon changed. It was so useful that I decided to share some of the information and put it alongside the valuable work of our Speedwatch team (above), because it affects our village.


Here are the main points that I discovered:

- Drivers who persist in going over 20 mph in our village are dangerous. Why? Because for every 1 mph over 20 mph, you become more liable to injure any person you collide with. So imagine hitting a child or anyone else who steps out in front of you! At 20 mph, you are likely to be able to stop. At 21 mph or over, you will be very unlikely to be able to stop. At 30 mph, you will hit and cause severe damage to whoever, or whatever, you hit.
- 'Ah, but what if I am in a hurry?' you ask. Tests have shown that if you are 30 minutes late for a 100-mile journey, the best you will make up is less than 50%. This means that if you are late for shorter journeys, you will remain late.
- A speed restriction starts (and ends) as soon as you pass the road sign showing the permitted speed. It is not as you pass any electronic indicator.
- A good way to limit your speed is to use your gears: 2nd gear for 20-mph zones, 3rd gear for 30-mph zones. Extensive testing shows that any increased fuel expense is minimal. All the data used on the course was validated by the main motoring associations and the independent testing organisation RoSPA.

I hope that others in the village can learn from this experience. We are lucky to live in such a relatively safe place. I think we should all try to keep it as safe as possible.


